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**Administrative or Policy Goal:**

A solid foundation in municipal finance supports many policy goals of the City Council. More granularly, this work session series in an outgrowth of a 2024 council goal to develop improvements in financial transparency.

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**Background:**

The City’s finance division, collaborating with the City Manager’s Office, has been working to improve financial transparency for the past several years. This work started small, with a redesign of the budget publication in 2019, and has grown and morphed since this time into a larger initiative. Accomplishments to date have included launching an open data tool for Laramie’s budget and spending (made possible by the City’s new financial software), establishment of the City Manager’s Budget Advisory Committee, and publishing more concise financial information (the Community Financial Report and the Budget in Brief).

The journey toward transparency continues with this work session series, where financial topics will be explored in bite-sized chunks determined by the City Council. At each work session this spring, leading up to budget season, there will be a short presentation and discussion.

# What is the SPET tax?

"SPET" stands for Specific Purpose Excise Tax - it's also casually known as the 6th penny. This voter-approved tax, collected by amount rather than term, pays for specific projects that are included on the ballot. Tax collections, and even the interest earned on them, must be kept separate and restricted for approved projects.

# Who benefits from this tax?

In general, local voters benefit, which is why they get to choose whether they approve the tax. Governmental entities receive funding based on the uses stated on the ballot. The 2026 SPET includes funding for Albany County, City of Laramie, Town of Rock River, and Laramie Regional Airport projects.

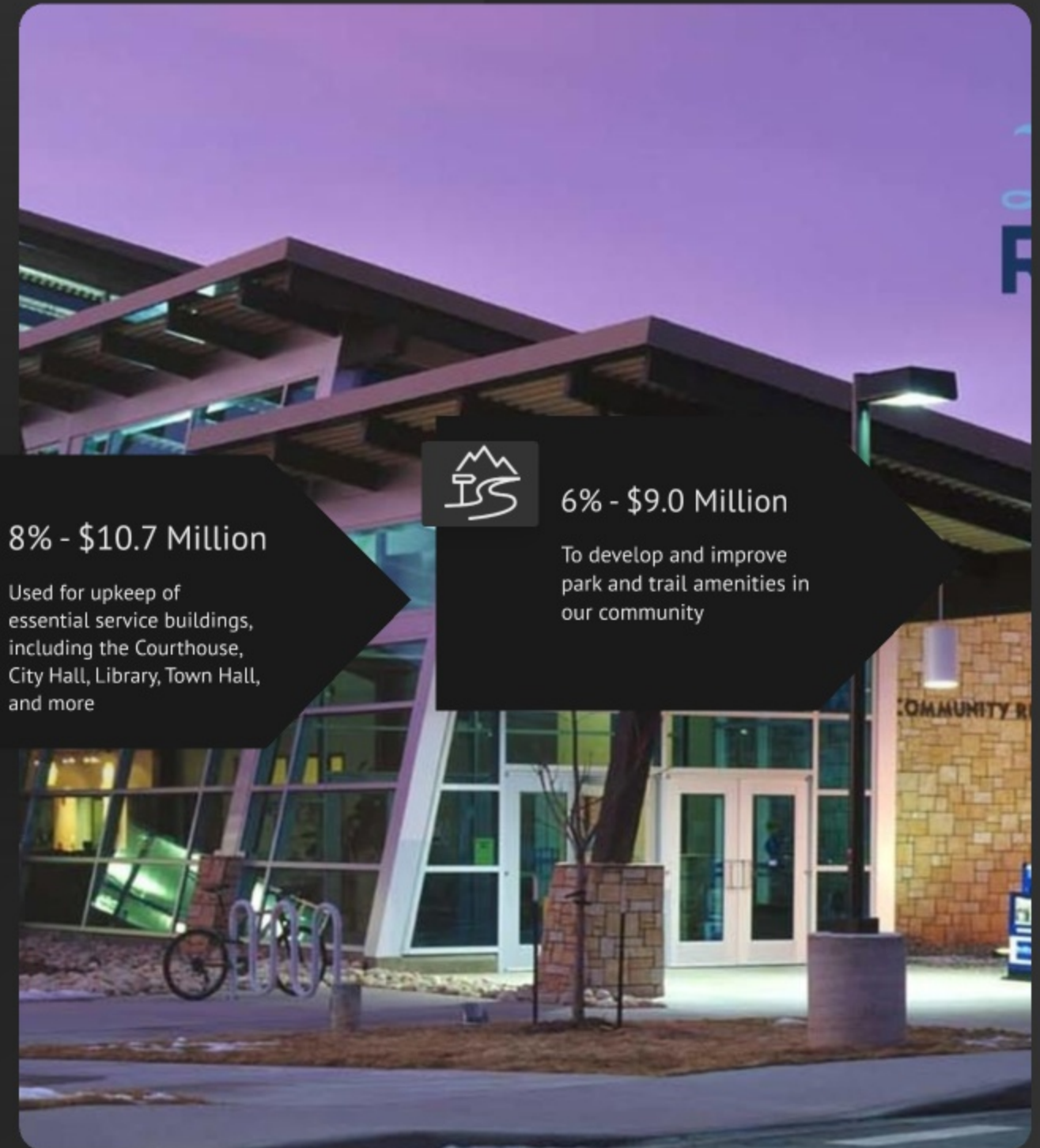

**BACKGROUND**

Each year, the City provides funding to local agencies from the General-Purpose Penny Tax (“5<sup>th</sup> Cent”) in two ways—through the Community Partner Program (CPP) and via fee-for-service contracts. In FY25-26, City Council awarded a total of \$521,272 from the 5<sup>th</sup> cent sales tax for the two programs, of which \$231,272 (due to rounding) was awarded via the CPP to multiple local agencies and \$290,000 was paid via fee-for-service contracts to the Laramie Regional Airport, Laramie Chamber Business Alliance, the Laramie Main Street Alliance, and Tough Guys/Winter Lights Festival.

- Historically, organizations eligible to request funding through the CPP fall within one of three categories:
- *Civic/Quasi-Governmental Agencies* – like Albany County Public Library
  - *Social Service Agencies* – like Big Brothers/Big Sisters, Downtown Clinic, and Interfaith-Good Samaritan
  - *Recreational, Arts & Cultural Agencies* – like the Laramie Plains Museum, Laramie Historic Railroad Depot, and Relative Theatrics

Thirty-seven agencies applied for CPP funding for the upcoming fiscal year beginning July 1, 2026. Submitted requests total \$441,825.00.

**FUNDING RECOMMENDATION**

Given the state of the City’s overall penny tax receipts, I would recommend a zero adjustment to the previous year’s disbursement of \$231,255.00 to CPP agencies.

Tele-Hope is requesting funding to expand our youth-focused workshops in Albany County, supporting mental health, connection, and suicide prevention for students ages 11-18. Funds will be used to cover curriculum materials, facilitator stipends, travel costs, and hiring additional staff to reach more schools and students across the county. Funding will allow us to deliver four interactive workshops per school, including activities that teach students to listen, build relationships, and support one another. This investment ensures every student can participate at no cost, reducing barriers to access.

Funding will also support training for community partners and research, helping to create a sustainable impact beyond the workshops. Stipends for facilitators and new team members ensure consistent, high-quality programming. 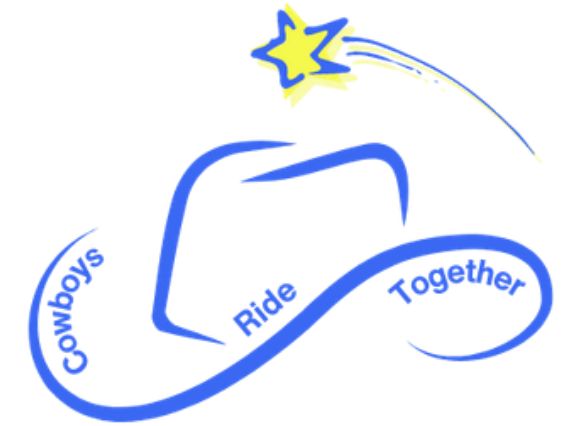

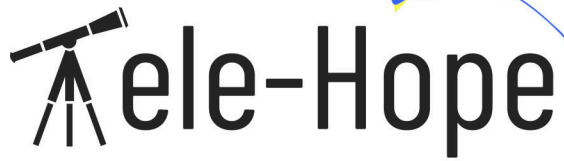

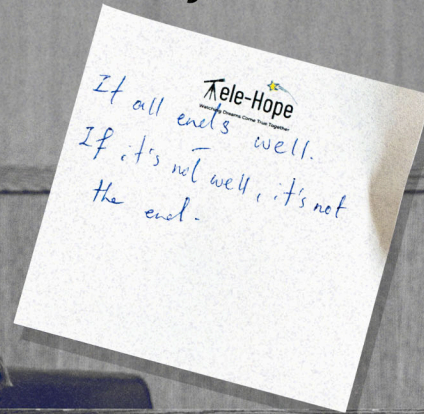

These funds will be used to offset the ever increasing costs of healthcare for the clinic supplies, treatment, and birth control that we pay out of pocket for; while we are able to recoup some of this with our sliding fee scales and insurance, for our lowest socio-economic status they do not pay anything for our staple services. Some of these funds are also used to pay for a very small portion of the physician's salary, which is our highest expense, but necessary for their expertise.

We get funds currently from Title X that we use for some of the staff salaries, but it doesn't cover all of it, of course - we receive \$109,000 currently from them which decreased by \$12,000 last year and is expected to continually decrease over the next 3 years. We also receive \$31,000 to cover certain services through Albany County - CSBG, but we will write off over \$100,000 a year to ensure that everyone has equitable access to reproductive healthcare.

With our new Executive Director we are hopeful to get more funds from fundraising to assist in supplementing the budget, far more than we ever have in the past.

Describe the positive effects and benefits the requested funds would provide to the organization and the community, including goals the organization hopes to accomplish. \*

The funds provided would assist us as we move into the primary care space to ensure those who are low income and with insurance also have access to primary healthcare, but on a sliding fee scale, similar to our current sliding fee scale. This is a new program that we launched at the beginning of 2026. We hope that this will be available for all the community after the mid-2026 - we want to grow responsibly and mindfully of the provider's capacity. If this is successful we will hire more providers and medical assistants to fulfill the need - the first half of the year will be gathering data to show the need. We would like to see at least 50 patients for general health being mindful that it is not what we are known for, but working heavily to market to current patients and in the community.

We assist with the maternal healthcare dessert that exists in our area of the state by ensuring those that are trying to get pregnant/have positive pregnancy tests and want to keep their fetus are taking prenatal vitamins, they can access free/severely discounted bloodwork through the partnerships we have through our labs, and we will test for a multitude of STIs that have been shown to lead to poor birth outcomes for both mom and child - especially in relation to trichomonas infections, chlamydia, syphilis, gonorrhea, and HIV.

Public Health is reporting an increase in HIV at the most recent kick off for the CHNA that Iverson does and it is important to note that we follow the protocols to prescribe PeP/PreP at our location.

We partner with all the local non-profits to assist with patient's needs as they are varying at times; from mental health, housing, to food insecurity. Because we are a first touch for those experiencing domestic violence, human trafficking, and sexual assault, we are well versed in the nonprofits that assist these survivors with long term support; however, if they choose not to engage or report, we follow the same protocols that a hospital would for sexual assault when it comes to their treatment.

Our biggest partner, however, is the Downtown Clinic (DTC). We refer patients to them who don't have insurance for primary care, and they refer patients to us who need reproductive healthcare and who may not meet their criteria for their services for primary care. When we started thinking of venturing into primary care we discussed with DTC, with them reporting that this is an "All hands on deck situation"; and ensuring the proper referrals means we can both maximize the resources we have while filling distinct needs/gaps in the community.

We work with the schools to provide factual physiological changes that will be starting next year to 4th and 5th graders since it was pulled as a requirement from the legislature which we are very excited about.

# Albany County and City of Laramie Community Partner Organization Funding Request Application FY2027

**ALL APPLICATIONS ARE DUE ON OR BEFORE 5:00 P.M. ON WEDNESDAY, MARCH 11TH 2026 AND WILL ONLY BE CONSIDERED IF ALL PREVIOUS FINAL REPORTS HAVE BEEN COMPLETED.**

The City of Laramie and Albany County provide funding to local community partner organizations through their annual budget making processes. Organizations receiving these funds do not operate within the formal structure of city or county governments but may utilize support from these governments to achieve their missions or fund special projects. Community partner organizations generally have a strong presence within the community and provide vital services, products, or activities that serve to improve the community in a variety of ways. Only non-profit/not-for-profit entities are eligible to apply for funding. For-profit entities are ineligible.

Historically, organizations requesting funding fall within the following three categories:

***Recreational/Arts and Culture:*** These organizations exist to promote, sustain, and develop recreational, cultural, and leisure activities within the community. These organizations may also sponsor educational and community events and celebrations designed to encourage a diverse cultural and active lifestyle while promoting a strong sense of community.

***Social Services:*** The primary objective of these organizations is to support or engage in activities designed to enhance the wellbeing of individuals and families within the community. These organizations provide a variety of services that focus on basic human needs, access to programs and services designed to maintain human dignity and health, and the overall welfare of citizens.

***Civic Organizations/Quasi-Governmental:*** These organizations have been established within our community to A) work for the overall improvement, advancement, and economic health through civic involvement, economic development initiatives, and fostering community spirit; or B) provide services, programs and other opportunities for the betterment of the community through the organization of Joint Powers Boards or other Quasi-Governmental Organizations that work collaboratively with the City of Laramie and/or Albany County on shared goals, concerns, and interests.

This Community Partner Funding is available from funds collected via Albany County's 5th Penny Tax and historically has funded approximately \$250,000 in County requests and \$235,000 in City requests. In their sole discretion, the City and County each reserve the right to waive any informality in any application and/or reject any application.

Organizations can submit a request to both the City and County. If an organization is awarded funding, the organization is solely responsible for its costs including, but not limited to, operations, personnel, taxes,

maintenance, and insurance coverage against public liability and property damage.

**Priority of requests is as follows:**

- Requests that improve the community.
- Requests that are not more than 20% of organization's general operating budget and do not exceed \$20,000 each from City or County.
- Requests to either City or County that are less than 20% of organization's general operating budget but in excess of \$20,000 are considered on a case by case basis and may affect the priority of the organization's request.
- Demonstration of multiple revenue sources for organization.
- The number of people served by organization.
- Clear identification of those who benefit from the organization's work.
- Demonstration of the organization's partnership with other organizations in the community.
- Requests that do not duplicate efforts already existing in the community.

For-profit entities are not eligible to apply. Only non-profit/not-for-profit entities are eligible to apply for funding.

**Schedule for Decision Making Process and Availability of Funds:**

**City:** Laramie City Council intends to make its preliminary funding decisions in early to mid-April 2026 and final funding decisions will be announced upon adoption of the City's FY2026/2027 Budget in June 2026. The City's award payments to successful organizations will be made on or around August 1, 2026, pending receipt of the fully executed agreement.

**County:** The Albany County Commissioners make their final funding decisions upon the adoption of the County's FY2026/2027 Budget in June 2026. Agreements will be sent to successful organizations in July 2026. Pending the County's receipt of the fully executed Agreement, the County's award payments to successful organizations will only be made on a reimbursement basis.

Funding from the City of Laramie and Albany County will support Laramie Climb's free services for low-income single mothers, including:

- 1) Pre-program Stabilization: Connecting moms to critical resources for basic needs and work readiness, including food, shelter, transportation, childcare, legal aid, and more.
- 2) Intensive Career Training: 12-week programs including industry-specific training and certification, life and financial skills development, mental health counseling, and local job placement.
- 3) Graduate Services: ongoing support and guidance to ensure lasting personal and professional success.

In particular, funds will be utilized for direct service personnel, participant training, work experience, program contractors including mental health providers and life skills speakers, and facilities. See budget for more detail.

In FY2027, we anticipate serving over 100 low-income single mother families in Laramie and Albany County through our suite of services above. Training topics will be tailored to real-time market and employer needs, and focus on jobs with family-supporting wages, benefits, growth potential, and career pathways. This hyperlocal approach builds mutually-beneficial relationships by meeting employer and employment needs with highly-skilled and motivated employees.

In order to remain sustainable Climb's programs are funded through diverse public and private funding sources. Secured funding from major contributors includes: Anonymous Foundation (\$10,000), Cross Charitable Foundation (\$6,000), Hughes Charitable Foundation (\$25,000), John P. Ellbogen Foundation (\$12,500), Newell B. Sargent Foundation (\$4,000), and FNBO (\$4,000). Climb has other corporate and foundation grant applications pending; and we plan to reapply this Spring for Albany County Community Partnership Initiative and TANF Families Becoming Independent funding.

Climb Wyoming's comprehensive program isn't just about getting a job – it's about economic prosperity for families and prioritizing mental wellness and social capital, leading to communities that flourish. Since 2004, hundreds of moms have graduated from trainings in Laramie in office, commercial driving, healthcare, and skilled trades careers – and on average more than doubling their salary before and after Climb. As these moms increase their education and income, their children directly benefit from greater access to academic and extra-curricular activities, more stable schedules at home, and role models for career success. The local community and economy are also strengthened as families move out of poverty and workforce gaps are filled by trained and committed workers.

In FY2027, our goals include:

- Serve over 100 low-income single mothers through pre-program stabilization efforts, intensive industry training and job placement, and ongoing graduate support.
- Offer two trainings in in-demand industries localized to Laramie/Albany County.
- Among participants, at least 85% will successfully complete the career trainings.
- 80% of participants who complete the program will earn higher wages than when they entered the program.
- 100% of participants will receive individual and group mental health counseling and life and workplace skills development.
- 75% of graduates will be placed in full-time positions at program end.
- Participants will show improvement in executive functioning skills (e.g. sustained attention spans, working memory, planning and organization, emotional control, self-monitoring, task initiation, and cognitive flexibility).
- Graduates will show a decrease in dependence on government benefits including food stamps, childcare assistance, Medicaid, and other benefits.

Climb's free job trainings transform women's lives and their families' futures. City and County funding supports this important work, and leverages additional funds, thus increasing the impact of the investment.

Local collaborations are essential due to the complexities of combating poverty for single mothers. Climb partners with an extensive, long-standing network of State and local agencies and health and human service organizations for resources and referrals. Some examples include: Department of Family Services, Department of Workforce Services, Albany Community Health Clinic, Family Promise of Albany County, Feeding Laramie Valley, Laramie Connections, Laramie Interfaith, My Front Door, SAFE Project, and more. This coordinated approach avoids duplication and maximizes Climb’s range and impact.

Laramie Climb staff also work closely with local employers and industry experts to inform training topics and job placements. Some employer partners include: Albany County School District #1, Cook and Associates, P.C., Hospice of Laramie, and Premier Bone and Joint Centers to name a few. These employers, in particular, have partnered with Climb for multiple job placements.

Climb also engages with local professionals for life and workplace skills training, including: parenting, nutrition, budgeting, resume development, and mock interviews.

Employer partners and community partners are essential to the success of Climb’s programs. Through these partnerships, we support families in need, improve our workforce, and enhance the health and well-being of families in Laramie and Albany County.

The City of Laramie and Albany County provide funding to local community partner organizations through their annual budget making processes. Organizations receiving these funds do not operate within the formal structure of city or county governments but may utilize support from these governments to achieve their missions or fund special projects. Community partner organizations generally have a strong presence within the community and provide vital services, products, or activities that serve to improve the community in a variety of ways. Only non-profit/not-for-profit entities are eligible to apply for funding. For-profit entities are ineligible.

Historically, organizations requesting funding fall within the following three categories:

***Recreational/Arts and Culture:*** These organizations exist to promote, sustain, and develop recreational, cultural, and leisure activities within the community. These organizations may also sponsor educational and community events and celebrations designed to encourage a diverse cultural and active lifestyle while promoting a strong sense of community.

***Social Services:*** The primary objective of these organizations is to support or engage in activities designed to enhance the wellbeing of individuals and families within the community. These organizations provide a variety of services that focus on basic human needs, access to programs and services designed to maintain human dignity and health, and the overall welfare of citizens.

***Civic Organizations/Quasi-Governmental:*** These organizations have been established within our community to A) work for the overall improvement, advancement, and economic health through civic involvement, economic development initiatives, and fostering community spirit; or B) provide services, programs and other opportunities for the betterment of the community through the organization of Joint Powers Boards or other Quasi-Governmental Organizations that work collaboratively with the City of Laramie and/or Albany County on shared goals, concerns, and interests.

This Community Partner Funding is available from funds collected via Albany County's 5th Penny Tax and historically has funded approximately \$250,000 in County requests and \$235,000 in City requests. In their sole discretion, the City and County each reserve the right to waive any informality in any application and/or reject any application.

Organizations can submit a request to both the City and County. If an organization is awarded funding, the organization is solely responsible for its costs including, but not limited to, operations, personnel, taxes,

maintenance, and insurance coverage against public liability and property damage.

**Priority of requests is as follows:**

- Requests that improve the community.
- Requests that are not more than 20% of organization's general operating budget and do not exceed \$20,000 each from City or County.
- Requests to either City or County that are less than 20% of organization's general operating budget but in excess of \$20,000 are considered on a case by case basis and may affect the priority of the organization's request.
- Demonstration of multiple revenue sources for organization.
- The number of people served by organization.
- Clear identification of those who benefit from the organization's work.
- Demonstration of the organization's partnership with other organizations in the community.
- Requests that do not duplicate efforts already existing in the community.

For-profit entities are not eligible to apply. Only non-profit/not-for-profit entities are eligible to apply for funding.

After 30 years serving Laramie as a nonprofit independent living community, Regency Retirement Residence is preparing to expand its campus to include an assisted living wing directly connected to its existing residence. This expansion will create a true continuum of care, allowing residents to age in place, maintain meaningful relationships, and avoid the disruption and isolation that often accompany increasing health needs.

Laramie faces a critical shortage of assisted living options. The community currently has only one for-profit assisted living facility, which remains consistently full with an ongoing waiting list. As a result, many seniors must leave Laramie to access appropriate care. Our project responds directly to documented housing studies and the growing demand for senior services in Albany County.

The requested grant funds will support the salary and associated costs of our Development Director as we build and implement a comprehensive capital campaign to fund construction of the assisted living wing. Campaign activities include cultivating major donors, preparing grant proposals, coordinating community presentations, and implementing a strategic funding plan.

The assisted living wing will provide:

- 24-hour personal care assistance, including bathing, dressing, and medication management
- On-site Registered Nurses and Certified Nursing Assistants
- Nutritious, freshly prepared meals in a restaurant-style dining room
- Social and recreational programming
- Scheduled transportation for appointments and errands
- Maintenance-free living in a secure, comfortable setting
- Close proximity to Iverson Memorial Hospital and local urgent care clinics
- Immediate access to the Laramie River Greenbelt

Additional funding will come from a combination of individual donor gifts, private foundation grants, sponsorships, and financing. Our goal is to complete a successful capital campaign and establish a sustainable operating model that provides excellent value to residents without requiring ongoing community fundraising for operations.

Regency Assisted Living is not simply adding beds; we are creating a compassionate home that prioritizes dignity, connection, and quality of life.

Laramie's aging population is driving increased demand for high-quality assisted living services. With an estimated 7.5% of adults age 65+ requiring assisted living, projections indicate that between 262 and 395 seniors in Laramie and greater Albany County may need this level of care. With a projected 2.4% growth rate in the senior population, demand will continue to rise.

By supporting our Development Director and capital campaign efforts, this grant will directly accelerate the creation of additional assisted living capacity in Laramie. The project will:

- Allow seniors to remain in their community as their needs evolve
- Enable couples to stay together within one campus
- Reduce emotional and financial strain on families
- Strengthen rural health infrastructure
- Support workforce stability by allowing adult children to remain in Laramie, knowing their parents are cared for locally

Regency views this as more than a housing expansion. It intersects with housing availability, healthcare access, and economic development. Communities thrive when seniors can remain connected to family, faith communities, and social networks.

As part of building community support, Regency will host presentations with local civic groups, senior organizations, and service clubs to educate residents about continuum-of-care planning and long-term housing options. These conversations will not only strengthen campaign support but also encourage families to proactively plan for aging with dignity.

Laramie currently has no nonprofit assisted living option and lacks a graduated care facility where seniors can age in place while remaining connected to friends and loved ones. The existing for-profit assisted living facility operates at or near full capacity with a consistent waitlist, demonstrating unmet demand rather than duplication.

Regency is intentionally collaborating with community partners to strengthen, not duplicate, existing services. We are working with faculty and students from the University of Wyoming's Family and Consumer Sciences Department and Aging Studies program to support staffing development and applied learning opportunities.

We are also consulting with leadership at Iverson Memorial Hospital to ensure coordination with local healthcare systems. In addition, we maintain open communication with local assisted living providers, home health agencies such as Enhabit Home Health and Hospice of Laramie, financial institutions, and professional advisors to align services and financial planning.

Our Board includes community leaders and volunteer advisors with expertise in healthcare, law, business, and finance, ensuring responsible oversight and strategic coordination.

Rather than competing with existing providers, Regency's expansion fills a documented service gap and creates a nonprofit, mission-driven alternative within Laramie's senior care continuum.

The City of Laramie and Albany County provide funding to local community partner organizations through their annual budget making processes. Organizations receiving these funds do not operate within the formal structure of city or county governments but may utilize support from these governments to achieve their missions or fund special projects. Community partner organizations generally have a strong presence within the community and provide vital services, products, or activities that serve to improve the community in a variety of ways. Only non-profit/not-for-profit entities are eligible to apply for funding. For-profit entities are ineligible.

Historically, organizations requesting funding fall within the following three categories:

***Recreational/Arts and Culture:*** These organizations exist to promote, sustain, and develop recreational, cultural, and leisure activities within the community. These organizations may also sponsor educational and community events and celebrations designed to encourage a diverse cultural and active lifestyle while promoting a strong sense of community.

***Social Services:*** The primary objective of these organizations is to support or engage in activities designed to enhance the wellbeing of individuals and families within the community. These organizations provide a variety of services that focus on basic human needs, access to programs and services designed to maintain human dignity and health, and the overall welfare of citizens.

***Civic Organizations/Quasi-Governmental:*** These organizations have been established within our community to A) work for the overall improvement, advancement, and economic health through civic involvement, economic development initiatives, and fostering community spirit; or B) provide services, programs and other opportunities for the betterment of the community through the organization of Joint Powers Boards or other Quasi-Governmental Organizations that work collaboratively with the City of Laramie and/or Albany County on shared goals, concerns, and interests.

This Community Partner Funding is available from funds collected via Albany County's 5th Penny Tax and historically has funded approximately \$250,000 in County requests and \$235,000 in City requests. In their sole discretion, the City and County each reserve the right to waive any informality in any application and/or reject any application.

Organizations can submit a request to both the City and County. If an organization is awarded funding, the organization is solely responsible for its costs including, but not limited to, operations, personnel, taxes,

maintenance, and insurance coverage against public liability and property damage.

**Priority of requests is as follows:**

- Requests that improve the community.
- Requests that are not more than 20% of organization's general operating budget and do not exceed \$20,000 each from City or County.
- Requests to either City or County that are less than 20% of organization's general operating budget but in excess of \$20,000 are considered on a case by case basis and may affect the priority of the organization's request.
- Demonstration of multiple revenue sources for organization.
- The number of people served by organization.
- Clear identification of those who benefit from the organization's work.
- Demonstration of the organization's partnership with other organizations in the community.
- Requests that do not duplicate efforts already existing in the community.

For-profit entities are not eligible to apply. Only non-profit/not-for-profit entities are eligible to apply for funding.

Approximately 90% of requested funds will support staff salaries and benefits of clinical and direct care staff, with the remainder covering direct program operating costs such as supplies and client services. Our workforce is both our greatest expense and our greatest asset. Sufficient staffing enables Cathedral Home to provide comprehensive mental health, social, emotional, and behavioral support to children and families across Albany County, including 24/7 crisis care and youth shelter services that must be available around the clock regardless of demand fluctuations.

With mental health needs continuing to grow in our community and state, stable funding for personnel is what allows Cathedral Home to respond consistently and equitably – meeting people where they are, eliminating barriers to care, and ensuring services are accessible regardless of income or insurance status. Community Partner funding has been instrumental in building program sustainability, strengthening prevention services, and decreasing the need for more intensive and costly levels of care downstream.

Previous Community Partner awards have helped Cathedral Home eliminate barriers to care, supply 24/7 crisis and shelter services, build program sustainability, and strengthen community-based prevention. This request continues that trajectory, allowing our team to maintain safe, welcoming spaces where children, youth, and families can build the social, emotional, and behavioral skills that promote long-term well-being.

Describe the positive effects and benefits the requested funds would provide to the organization and the community, including goals the organization hopes to accomplish. \*

Iverson Memorial Hospital's Community Health Needs Assessment identified mental health and social services as the community's highest need and priority area. Cathedral Home's prevention programs exist precisely to address that gap, ensuring families in crisis – particularly those with low incomes or limited access to private services – have options for early intervention and support.

In 2025, the Laramie Youth Crisis Center provided 606 emergency care days and 645 days of group home care, serving 199 individuals. Youth reduced their feelings of crisis by 68% and parents by 67%. The Community Resource Center served 342 people, increasing social and emotional well-being by 16% – connecting Albany County residents to parenting education, concrete support, and social-emotional resources that research links to better long-term outcomes for children and families.

Cathedral Home's goal is to sustain a continuum of care, from Wyo Text to counseling, shelter, residential treatment, and aftercare so individuals and families receive the right support at the right time. Public funds are essential to keeping these entry points open, particularly for those in immediate need regardless of income. Long term, Cathedral Home seeks to strengthen family resiliency, reduce barriers to help-seeking in a region where rural norms often discourage it, and position Laramie as a model for community-based youth mental health services statewide. This funding keeps those foundational goals within reach.

Cathedral Home Community Programs maintains active partnerships across a broad network of local, county, and statewide organizations to ensure continuity of care, eliminate service gaps, and avoid duplication of efforts throughout Albany County and beyond.

To stay aligned with other providers and systems, Cathedral Home participates regularly in multi-sector coordination meetings allowing Cathedral Home to stay informed about what services are available elsewhere in the community, identify unmet needs, and coordinate responses so that clients are connected to the right resources without redundancy.

Our key community collaborators include Albany County School District #1, Care Solace, the University of Wyoming Counseling Center, Laramie Interfaith, United Way of Albany County, Albany County Safe Project, Downtown Clinic, Ivinson Memorial Hospital, the Albany County Mental Health Board, Big Brothers Big Sisters, the Coalition for Suicide and Substance Abuse Prevention, and Meadowlark Pediatrics. Partners actively refer clients to Cathedral Home's services and help spread awareness of available programming and financial assistance opportunities, ensuring that individuals and families receive critical support in a timely manner. In turn, Cathedral Home refers clients to partner organizations when their needs are better met elsewhere, creating a coordinated ecosystem rather than isolated, competing services.

Cathedral Home's membership in the Wyoming Youth Services Association and the Association of Children's Residential and Community Services ensures that our programming reflects current evidence-based research and promising practices. These affiliations keep Cathedral Home connected to broader conversations about best practices in youth-serving and residential care, reducing the risk of duplication with peer organizations while continuously improving the quality and relevance of our services.

Taken together, these partnerships reflect Cathedral Home's commitment to functioning as one part of a larger, well-coordinated continuum of care – not as a standalone provider, but as an integrated community resource working in concert with others to serve Albany County residents as effectively as possible.

***Independent Auditor's Report***

**Report on the Audit of the Financial Statements*****Opinion***

We have audited the financial statements of Cathedral Home for Children (a nonprofit organization), which comprise the statements of financial position as of June 30, 2025 and 2024, and the related statements of activities, functional expenses, and cash flows for the years then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

In our opinion, the accompanying financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Cathedral Home for Children as of June 30, 2025 and 2024, and the changes in its net assets and its cash flows for the years then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

***Basis for Opinion***

We conducted our audits in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAS) and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards* issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. **1. NATURE OF ACTIVITIES AND SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES**

Nature of activities

Cathedral Home for Children (the Organization) is a nonprofit corporation providing housing, care, therapy, spiritual opportunities, schooling, recreation, and welfare to qualified children primarily from the Western Region of the United States of America.

The Laramie Youth Crisis Center (LYCC), a department of Cathedral Home for Children, was established with the intent of providing meaningful, high-quality care to “youth in crisis” from birth to 18 years of age, primarily from Albany County. The purpose of LYCC is to provide a temporary facility with a home-like atmosphere that will eventually solve the youth’s emotional or personal problems. The program’s goals are to return participating youth to their primary family home and alleviate the source of their crisis. A secondary goal is to facilitate interpersonal communication among family members.

Basis of presentation

The Organization follows Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) Accounting Standards Codification 958, “*Not-for-Profit Entities*,” as the basis of presentation of its financial statements. Therefore, the Organization reports information regarding its financial position and activities according to two classes of net assets: net assets without donor restrictions and net assets with donor restrictions.

*Net assets without donor restrictions* – Net assets for use in general operations and not subject to donor (or certain grantor) restrictions. The governing board may designate, from net assets without donor restrictions, net assets for any purpose.

*Net assets with donor restrictions* – Net assets subject to donor (or certain grantor) imposed restrictions. Some donor-imposed restrictions are temporary in nature, such as those that will be met by the passage of time, purpose or other events specified by the donor. Other donor-imposed restrictions are perpetual in nature, where the donor stipulates that resources be maintained in perpetuity. Donor-imposed restrictions are released when a restriction expires, that is, when the stipulated time has elapsed, when the stipulated purpose for which the resource was restricted has been fulfilled, or both.

Cash and cash equivalents

For purposes of reporting cash flows, the Organization considers all certificates of deposit purchased with an original maturity of three months or less to be cash equivalents.

Accounts receivable and allowance for doubtful accounts

Accounts receivable are recorded at their estimated fair value less an appropriate allowance for uncollectible accounts. Allowances are based on historical experience and management’s analysis of specific balances. An account is written off when it is determined that all collection efforts have been exhausted. An allowance for doubtful accounts has been established for amounts management believes may not be fully collectible. For the years ended June 30, 2025 and 2024 the allowance for doubtful accounts totaled \$68,000 and \$90,000, respectively.

Revenue recognition

Revenue for services provided, and related accounts receivable, are recognized when services are performed.

Grant revenue is recognized when services are performed. Revenue is deferred for grants that are advanced before service is performed.

Contributions are recognized when the donor makes an unconditional promise to give to the Organization.

All donor-restricted support is reported as an increase in net assets with donor restrictions. When a restriction expires (that is, when a stipulated time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished), net assets with donor restrictions are reclassified to net assets without donor restrictions and reported in the accompanying Statements of Activities as net assets released from restrictions.

The value of donated services, with the exception of donated rent, is generally not recognized in the accompanying financial statements because no objective basis is available to measure the value of such services.

Investments

Investments in equity securities, with readily determinable fair values, are measured at fair market value in the accompanying Statement of Financial Position. The unrealized gain or loss on investments is reflected in the Statement of Activities. Investment income and gains restricted by a donor are reported as increases in unrestricted net assets if the restrictions are met (either by the passage of time or by use) in the reporting period in which the income and gains are recognized.

Land, buildings and equipment

Expenditures for the acquisition of property and equipment in excess of \$5,000 are capitalized at cost. Depreciation of equipment and furniture is computed on the straight-line method over the useful lives of the assets.

Leases

The Organization has elected to apply the short-term lease exception under ASU 2016-02; therefore, leases with an initial term of twelve months or less are not recorded on the balance sheet.

Deferred revenue

Revenue received for future years is deferred and will be recognized in the periods to which it relates.

Promises to give

Unconditional promises to give that are expected to be collected within one year are recorded at net realizable value. Unconditional promises to give that are expected to be collected in future years are recorded at the present value of their estimated future cash flows. The discounts on those amounts are computed using risk-free interest rates applicable to years in which the promises are to be received. Amortization of the discounts is included in contribution revenue. Conditional promises to give are not included as support until the conditions are substantially met.

Income taxes

The Organization is a nonprofit agency and exempt from Federal income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. Management evaluated the Organization's tax positions and concluded that the Organization had taken no uncertain tax positions that require disclosures in the financial statements.

Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenue and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Concentration of credit risk

The Organization maintains its cash in bank deposit accounts which, at times, may exceed federally insured limits. The Organization has not experienced any losses in such accounts. The Organization believes it is not exposed to any significant credit risk on cash, as the bank has pledged securities to cover deposits.

Statement of functional expenses

The costs of program and supporting service activities have been summarized on a functional basis in the statement of functional expenses. The statement of functional expenses presents the natural classification detail of expenses by function. Whenever possible, expenses are tracked using direct identification methodology of charging specific expenses as either program, management and general, or fundraising and development. There are certain categories of expenses that are attributable to more than one program or supporting function, therefore, these expenses require allocation on a reasonable basis that is consistently applied. Such expenses mainly include wages and benefits, which are allocated based on estimates of time and effort.

Subsequent events

Events occurring subsequent to the Statement of Financial Position date have been evaluated for financial statement impact or disclosure through August 28, 2025, the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

**3. INVESTMENTS**

The Organization accounts for marketable securities under FASB ASC 820, Fair Value Measurements and Disclosures. ASC 820 defines fair value as the exchange price that would be received for an asset or paid to transfer a liability (exit price) in the principal or most advantageous market for the asset or liability in an orderly transaction between market participants on the measurement date. ASC 820 also establishes a fair value hierarchy which requires an entity to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs when measuring fair value. The standard describes three levels of inputs that may be used to measure fair value:

- Level 1 – Quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities;
- Level 2 – Observable inputs other than Level 1 prices, such as quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities; quoted prices in markets that are not active; or other inputs that are observable or can be corroborated by observable market data for substantially the full term of the assets or liabilities; and
- Level 3 – Unobservable inputs that are supported by little or no market activity and that are significant to the fair value of the assets or liabilities.

**5. DONATED LAND AND BUILDING**

Albany County and the City of Laramie lease the land and building for the LYCC program to the Organization under a 40-year commitment, which expired on May 7, 2025. The lease has been extended for an additional three years. The lease requires annual payments of \$1.00. As such, the Organization recorded an in-kind donation and occupancy expense of \$21,600 and \$21,600 for the years ended June 30, 2025 and 2024, respectively.

**6. RETIREMENT PLAN**

The Organization maintains a defined contribution retirement plan that covers all employees that have reached 21 years of age and with at least one year of service.

The Plan states that the Organization will match contributions by employees at 100 percent up to seven percent of the eligible employees' annual compensation. Expense from contributions to the Plan totaled \$199,682 and \$172,924 for the years ended June 30, 2025 and 2024, respectively.

**7. NET ASSETS WITH DONOR RESTRICTIONS (CONTINUED)**

The Organization has interpreted Wyoming’s Uniform Prudent Management of Institutional Funds Act (UPMIFA) as requiring the preservation of the fair value of the original gift as of the gift date of the donor-restricted endowment funds, absent the explicit donor stipulation to the contrary.

In accordance with UPMIFA, the Organization considers the following factors in making a determination to appropriate or accumulate donor-restricted endowment funds:

1. The duration and preservation of the endowment fund;
2. The purposes of the Organization and the donor-restricted endowment fund;
3. General economic conditions;
4. The possible effect of inflation and deflation;
5. The expected total return from income and the appreciation of investments;
6. Other resources of the Organization; and
7. The investment policies of the Organization.

Funds with deficiencies

From time-to-time, the fair value of assets associated with individual donor-restricted endowment funds may fall below the level that the donor or UPMIFA requires the Organization to retain as a fund of perpetual duration. As of June 30, 2025, there were no underwater donor-restricted endowment funds.

Endowment return objectives, risk parameters and spending policy

The Organization has adopted investment and spending policies for endowment assets that attempt to provide a predictable stream of funding to programs supported by its endowment, while seeking to maintain the purchasing power of the endowment assets. Endowment assets include those assets of donor-restricted funds that the Organization must hold in perpetuity or for a donor-specified period. The Organization’s policy is to invest the endowments in fixed income and equities. The investment returns are used to support the purpose of the endowment as specified by donor restriction.

We have audited, in accordance with the auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards* issued by the Comptroller General of the United States, the financial statements of Cathedral Home for Children (a nonprofit organization), which comprise the statement of financial position as of June 30, 2025, and the related statements of activities, functional expense, and cash flows for the year then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements, and have issued our report thereon dated August 28, 2025.

**Report On Internal Control Over Financial Reporting**

In planning and performing our audit of the financial statements, we considered Cathedral Home for Children's (the Organization) internal control over financial reporting (internal control) to determine the audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Organization's internal control. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of the Organization's internal control.

*A deficiency in internal control* exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent, or detect and correct, misstatements on a timely basis. A *material weakness* is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control, such that there is a reasonable possibility that a material misstatement of the entity's financial statements will not be prevented, or detected and corrected on a timely basis. A *significant deficiency* is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control that is less severe than a material weakness, yet important enough to merit attention by those charged with governance.

Our consideration of internal control was for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph of this section and was not designed to identify all deficiencies in internal control that might be material weaknesses or significant deficiencies. Given these limitations, during our audit we did not identify any deficiencies in internal control that we consider to be material weaknesses. We did identify a deficiency in internal controls, described in the accompanying schedule of findings and responses as item 2025-001, that we consider to be a significant deficiency.

## **Report On Compliance and Other Matters**

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether the Organization's financial statements are free from material misstatement, we performed tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements, noncompliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the determination of financial statement amounts. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit, and accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed no instances of noncompliance or other matters that are required to be reported under *Government Auditing Standards*.

## **Cathedral Home for Children's Response to Findings**

The Organization's response to the finding identified in our audit is described in the accompanying schedule of findings and responses. The Organization's response was not subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the financial statements and, accordingly, we express no opinion on it.

## **Purpose of this Report**

The purpose of this report is solely to describe the scope of our testing of internal control and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the effectiveness of the Organization's internal control or on compliance. **Finding 2025-001**

**Significant Deficiency in Internal Control over Financial Reporting:  
Inadequate Segregation of Duties**

*Criteria:* Segregation of duties is a basic, key internal control and often one of the most difficult to achieve, especially in a small organization. The concept is that one individual should not be able to handle or dominate transactions for initiation to posting, having access to both assets and accounting records.

*Condition and Cause:* The Organization has a limited number of administrative staff and accordingly a proper segregation of duties does not exist. Neither is it practicable for the Organization to maintain such segregation.

*Effect:* Certain personnel often handle the recording of transactions and the control of assets or results of those transactions. As it relates to the financial statements, this is a significant deficiency. Reviews by management, the Board and others are in place to help mitigate this condition. The Organization should be aware of and continue to evaluate the impact of this deficiency.

*Views of Responsible Official(s) and Planned Corrective Actions:* Due to the small size of the Organization's administrative staff, it is not practical for the Organization to maintain an adequate segregation of duties. To compensate for the small number of administrative staff, the Executive Director reviews financial statements, bank statements, and investment statements every month.

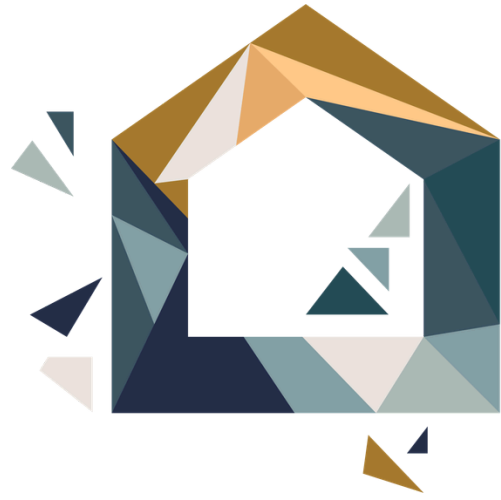

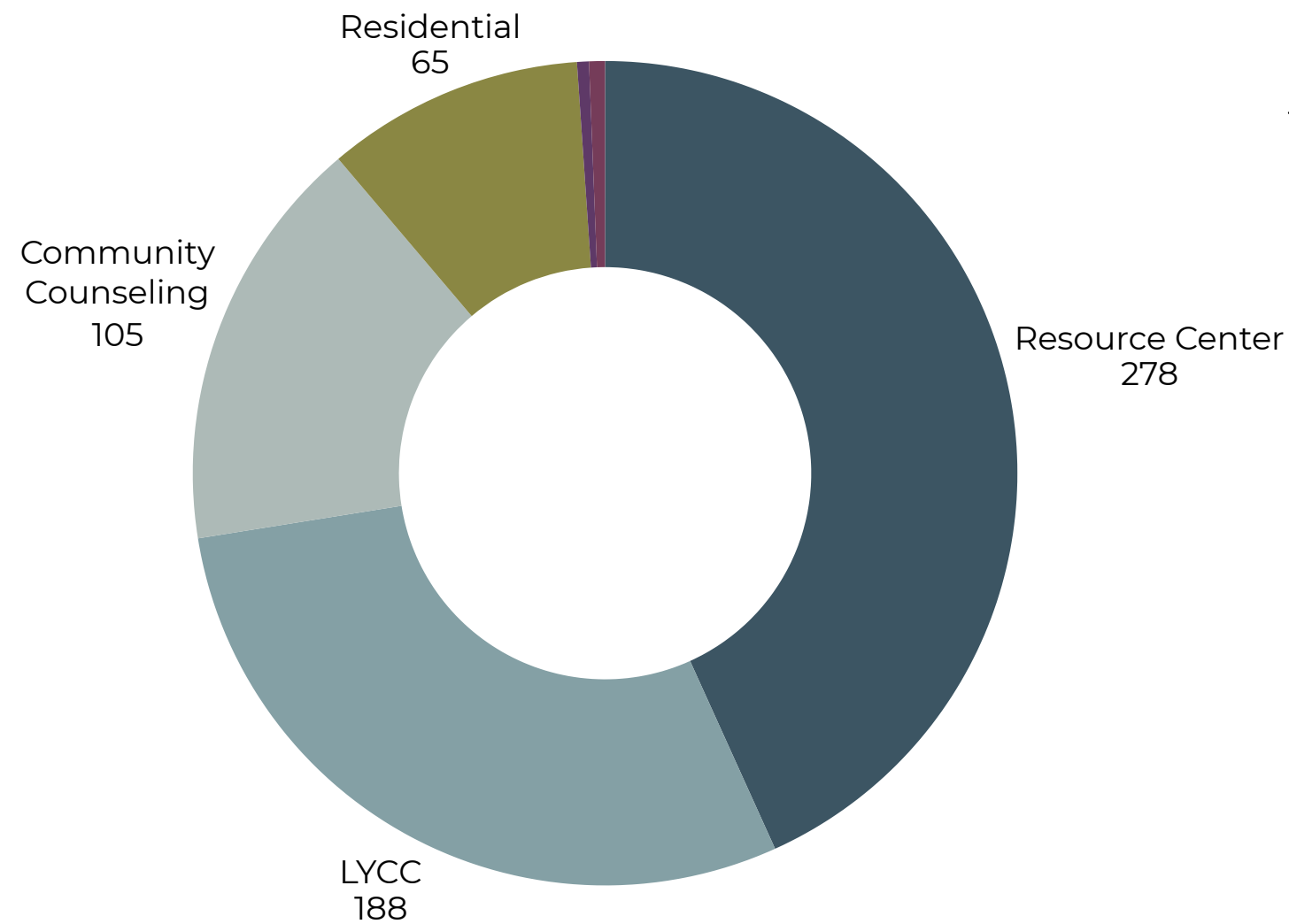

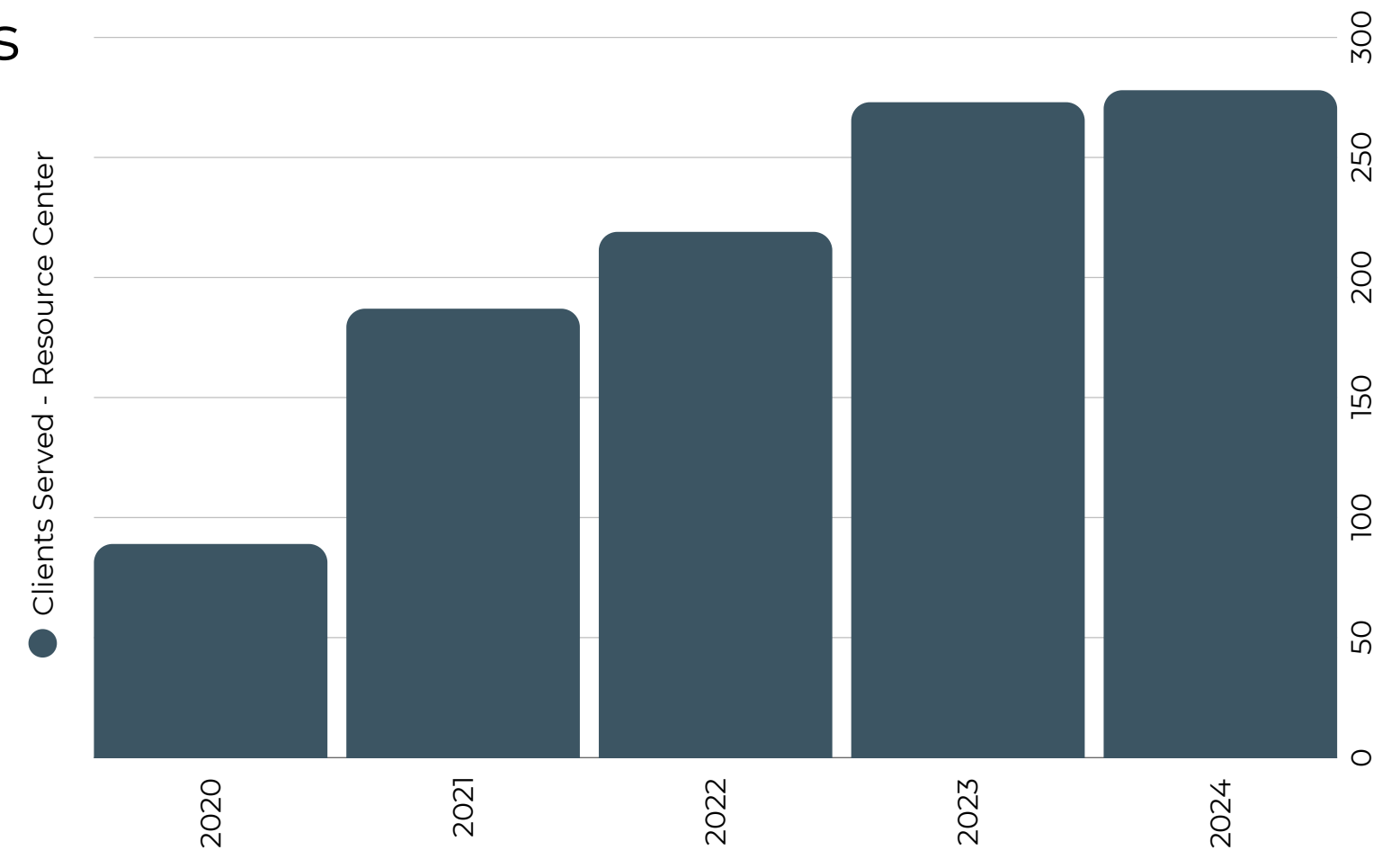

The City of Laramie and Albany County provide funding to local community partner organizations through their annual budget making processes. Organizations receiving these funds do not operate within the formal structure of city or county governments but may utilize support from these governments to achieve their missions or fund special projects. Community partner organizations generally have a strong presence within the community and provide vital services, products, or activities that serve to improve the community in a variety of ways. Only non-profit/not-for-profit entities are eligible to apply for funding. For-profit entities are ineligible.

Historically, organizations requesting funding fall within the following three categories:

***Recreational/Arts and Culture:*** These organizations exist to promote, sustain, and develop recreational, cultural, and leisure activities within the community. These organizations may also sponsor educational and community events and celebrations designed to encourage a diverse cultural and active lifestyle while promoting a strong sense of community.

***Social Services:*** The primary objective of these organizations is to support or engage in activities designed to enhance the wellbeing of individuals and families within the community. These organizations provide a variety of services that focus on basic human needs, access to programs and services designed to maintain human dignity and health, and the overall welfare of citizens.

***Civic Organizations/Quasi-Governmental:*** These organizations have been established within our community to A) work for the overall improvement, advancement, and economic health through civic involvement, economic development initiatives, and fostering community spirit; or B) provide services, programs and other opportunities for the betterment of the community through the organization of Joint Powers Boards or other Quasi-Governmental Organizations that work collaboratively with the City of Laramie and/or Albany County on shared goals, concerns, and interests.

This Community Partner Funding is available from funds collected via Albany County's 5th Penny Tax and historically has funded approximately \$250,000 in County requests and \$235,000 in City requests. In their sole discretion, the City and County each reserve the right to waive any informality in any application and/or reject any application.

Organizations can submit a request to both the City and County. If an organization is awarded funding, the organization is solely responsible for its costs including, but not limited to, operations, personnel, taxes,

maintenance, and insurance coverage against public liability and property damage.

**Priority of requests is as follows:**

- Requests that improve the community.
- Requests that are not more than 20% of organization's general operating budget and do not exceed \$20,000 each from City or County.
- Requests to either City or County that are less than 20% of organization's general operating budget but in excess of \$20,000 are considered on a case by case basis and may affect the priority of the organization's request.
- Demonstration of multiple revenue sources for organization.
- The number of people served by organization.
- Clear identification of those who benefit from the organization's work.
- Demonstration of the organization's partnership with other organizations in the community.
- Requests that do not duplicate efforts already existing in the community.

For-profit entities are not eligible to apply. Only non-profit/not-for-profit entities are eligible to apply for funding.

Developmental Preschool and Day Care Center (DPDC) is funded primarily through state and federal IDEA dollars to serve children with developmental disabilities. This annual request will help us meet the required 3% local match tied to those funds. We are respectfully requesting \$7,000 from each entity—an increase from last year's award. While we recognize the budget pressures both entities face, we are required to secure local funding for the 2026–27 cycle to maintain access to continued state and federal support. For the upcoming cycle, our required local match is projected at \$80,000, a \$3,000 increase over last year due to significant growth in the number of children we serve. Over the past three years, we have experienced a 20% increase in children with disabilities enrolled in our programs—serving 233 children this year compared to 193 in 2023.

To help meet this obligation, we have planned a Murder Mystery Dinner fundraiser with a goal of raising \$20,000 and anticipate approximately \$25,000 in support from United Way. Even with those efforts, we still need to secure roughly \$35,000 to fulfill our match requirement.

A combined investment of \$14,000 from your entities will leverage approximately \$466,666 in state and federal funding. These dollars directly support the salaries of approximately nine staff members who provide hands-on therapeutic services to children with disabilities. Overall, DPDC invests nearly \$2.8 million annually in salaries for employees who live, work, and reinvest in our local community.

Describe the positive effects and benefits the requested funds would provide to the organization and the community, including goals the organization hopes to accomplish. \*

The requested funding will enable our organization to continue delivering critical early intervention and special education services to children under age six in our community who have disabilities. For 63 years, DPDC has proudly served families in Albany County, providing comprehensive developmental services at no cost to children and their families.

Extensive research demonstrates that intervention before age five significantly improves lifelong health outcomes. High-quality early childhood programs also generate a substantial return on investment—up to \$16 for every \$1 invested over the course of a child’s life. Beyond improved health, these programs contribute to long-term societal benefits, including higher educational achievement, increased lifetime earnings, and lower crime rates.

In short, investing in high-quality services for our youngest community members not only strengthens individual outcomes but also reduces the long-term demand for other community services, creating lasting benefits for the entire community.

DPDC collaborates closely with a wide range of organizations throughout Laramie to ensure coordinated, comprehensive support for children and families. We maintain ongoing memorandums of understanding with Head Start, enabling them to access federal funding for their operations. This past fall, when a federal government shutdown threatened their ability to remain open, we partnered with Head Start leadership to develop a plan to ensure continuity of services for enrolled children.

We also work with Basic Beginnings to expand TANF-funded preschool placement options for low-income families in our community. In addition, DPDC partners with all licensed child care providers in the area to conduct developmental screenings for enrolled children and delivers special education services to those who qualify.

Our organization both makes referrals to and receives referrals from numerous community partners, including Family Promise, Interfaith, Cathedral Home/Youth Crisis Center, Feeding Laramie Valley, the Soup Kitchen, SAFE Project, Laramie Connections, Parents as Teachers, and others. As the sole provider of federally mandated early intervention and special education services in our area, DPDC helps prevent duplication of services while ensuring children receive the support they need.

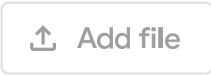

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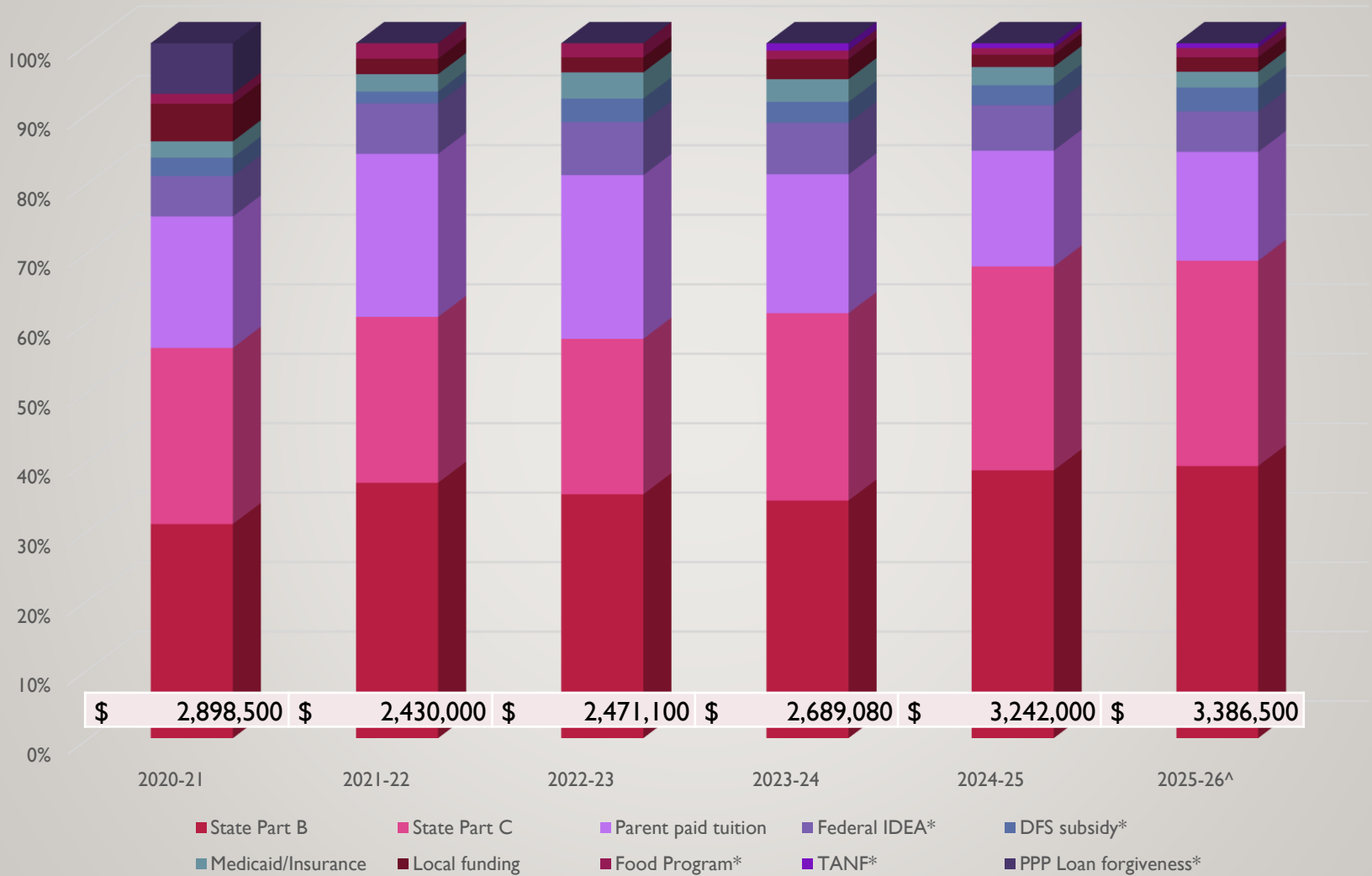

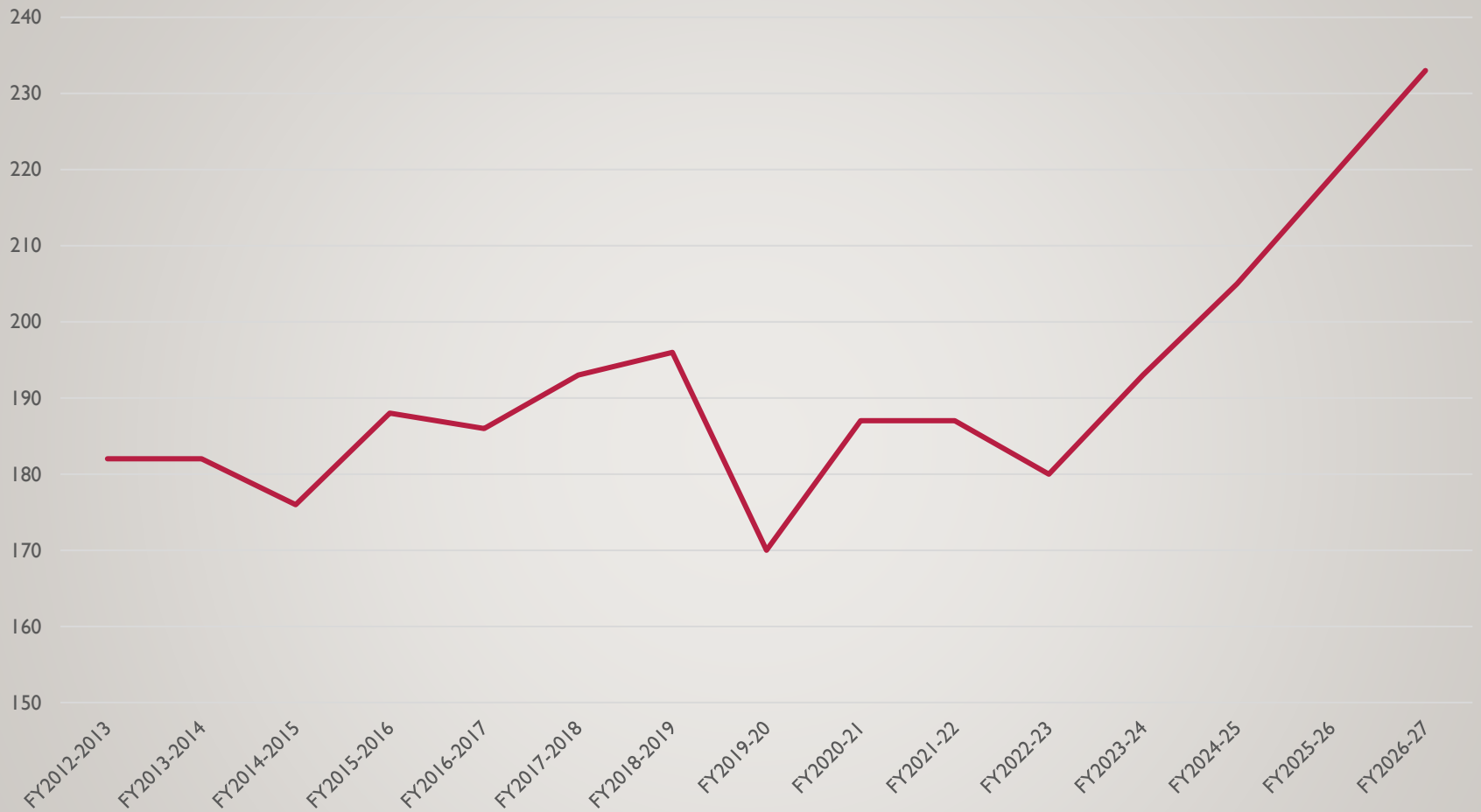

The City of Laramie and Albany County provide funding to local community partner organizations through their annual budget making processes. Organizations receiving these funds do not operate within the formal structure of city or county governments but may utilize support from these governments to achieve their missions or fund special projects. Community partner organizations generally have a strong presence within the community and provide vital services, products, or activities that serve to improve the community in a variety of ways. Only non-profit/not-for-profit entities are eligible to apply for funding. For-profit entities are ineligible.

Historically, organizations requesting funding fall within the following three categories:

***Recreational/Arts and Culture:*** These organizations exist to promote, sustain, and develop recreational, cultural, and leisure activities within the community. These organizations may also sponsor educational and community events and celebrations designed to encourage a diverse cultural and active lifestyle while promoting a strong sense of community.

***Social Services:*** The primary objective of these organizations is to support or engage in activities designed to enhance the wellbeing of individuals and families within the community. These organizations provide a variety of services that focus on basic human needs, access to programs and services designed to maintain human dignity and health, and the overall welfare of citizens.

***Civic Organizations/Quasi-Governmental:*** These organizations have been established within our community to A) work for the overall improvement, advancement, and economic health through civic involvement, economic development initiatives, and fostering community spirit; or B) provide services, programs and other opportunities for the betterment of the community through the organization of Joint Powers Boards or other Quasi-Governmental Organizations that work collaboratively with the City of Laramie and/or Albany County on shared goals, concerns, and interests.

This Community Partner Funding is available from funds collected via Albany County's 5th Penny Tax and historically has funded approximately \$250,000 in County requests and \$235,000 in City requests. In their sole discretion, the City and County each reserve the right to waive any informality in any application and/or reject any application.

Organizations can submit a request to both the City and County. If an organization is awarded funding, the organization is solely responsible for its costs including, but not limited to, operations, personnel, taxes,

maintenance, and insurance coverage against public liability and property damage.

**Priority of requests is as follows:**

- Requests that improve the community.
- Requests that are not more than 20% of organization's general operating budget and do not exceed \$20,000 each from City or County.
- Requests to either City or County that are less than 20% of organization's general operating budget but in excess of \$20,000 are considered on a case by case basis and may affect the priority of the organization's request.
- Demonstration of multiple revenue sources for organization.
- The number of people served by organization.
- Clear identification of those who benefit from the organization's work.
- Demonstration of the organization's partnership with other organizations in the community.
- Requests that do not duplicate efforts already existing in the community.

For-profit entities are not eligible to apply. Only non-profit/not-for-profit entities are eligible to apply for funding.

BikeNet's Safe Routes to School (SRTS) Program helps students build confidence, independence, and lifelong healthy habits through early bicycle education and access. To expand this program, BikeNet is launching a Mobile Bike Fleet Initiative to serve all six elementary schools throughout Laramie. The biggest need for this program to be implemented is a 25-foot bike trailer and a fleet of 30–40 bicycles in varying sizes. Additional costs include safety equipment, maintenance tools and hiring bike maintenance personnel, and program delivery support. Although we plan on initially running this program through volunteer efforts, Fort Collins has successfully administered SRTS for over 20 years, and their program reaches 5,000 elementary students each year, and they said they have had much better success paying their bike instructor volunteers, which is the ultimate goal in Laramie.

BikeNet is partnering with Albany County School District and the Laramie Police Department to deliver a bike safety curriculum to all six Albany County elementary schools (Linford, Slade, Spring Creek, Indian Paintbrush, Montessori, and Snowy Range Academy). Modeled after the long-standing Safe Routes to School Bike Safety Curriculum successfully implemented for more than 20 years in Fort Collins, our vision is to bring tried bike safety programming to our community in the hopes of fostering bike education, healthy lifestyle skills, and a self-propelled transportation skill for youth wellness. This support from Albany County and the City of Laramie would enable equitable access to safety education for all elementary students in our community. In a bicycle-forward community like ours, this partnership demonstrates the city and county's leadership in supporting safe, active lifestyles and highlights its dedication to being a trusted partner in building a healthier, safer future for Albany County's children. The City of Fort Collins and Nancy Nichols have provided great mentorship and information to us, and some of the many benefits and goals we have are 1) Instruct all K-2nd graders, regardless of cycling ability and/or ability to own a bicycle. Also included will be children with disabilities, who can be accommodated in bike trailers or bike tagalongs.

This program will be supported by BikeNet, Albany County School District PE teachers and the ACSD Extension Team, and the Laramie Police Department through Chip (Louis) Cirillo. There is not a single, organized, free effort in the community for elementary age students which provides both access to bicycles, instruction by certified bike instructors, and bicycle safety education. This educational opportunity in Laramie would deliver this programming to all students, with the target age right now being kindergarten through second grade.

Ark Regional Services is seeking ongoing funding to sustain wage increases for Direct Support Professionals (DSPs) in response to inflation and the continued gap between Medicaid reimbursement rates and the true cost of providing services. DSPs are the backbone of Ark's workforce, delivering approximately 20,000 hours of direct care each month to individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities. Their responsibilities include residential support, assistance with hygiene and daily living skills, medication assistance, transportation, and advocacy.

The primary funding source for Ark's services comes from Medicaid which does not provide adequate funding for the services Ark provides. This has led Ark to find additional funding sources. In November 2021, Ark implemented a \$2 per hour wage increase, raising the starting wage for DSPs to \$14 per hour. To continue addressing inflation and retention challenges, Ark added an additional \$1 increase in 2023 and another \$1 increase in 2025, bringing the current starting wage to \$16 per hour.

These increases reflect Ark's commitment to fairly compensating DSPs and strengthening workforce stability. Sustaining this wage level is critical to attracting and retaining qualified staff, reducing turnover, and maintaining high-quality services. By supporting competitive wages for DSPs, grant funding will help enhance quality of life for those served, and reinforce a stable, skilled workforce that benefits the community.

Families will have increased confidence that their loved ones are supported by trained, reliable professionals. Additionally, investing in DSP wages promotes local economic resilience by supporting essential workers with fair compensation, allowing them to remain in the workforce and contribute to the local economy.

Ark's primary goals are to maintain a stable and skilled DSP workforce, reduce turnover, ensure uninterrupted high-quality services, and continue strengthening community-based supports for individuals with disabilities. Sustaining competitive wages is a critical step toward achieving these goals and reinforcing a healthier, more inclusive community.

HORAH has a two-fold purpose: returning animals to sound physical, social, and emotional health while providing a forever home; and working with community organizations to enhance the well-being, sense of purpose, and self-worth of their individuals.

Our focus on caring for and connecting animals with people acknowledges the importance of mental health wellness across Wyoming. According to the Wyoming Department of Health, about 32.4% of adults in the state report symptoms of anxiety and depression.\*

In addition to providing a sanctuary for animals, HORAH directly engages many Wyoming youth. Through volunteering and interaction with the animals, these young individuals develop team-building skills, learn about sustainability, and gain a sense of pride and accomplishment from their contributions.

Established in 2012, HORAH is the only large animal sanctuary in Albany County. We began with a focus on neglected, abused, and abandoned animals with nowhere else to go, and have evolved into a haven not only for animals but also a unique refuge for humans searching for hope and healing through the unconditional, non-judgmental love of an animal.

Currently, 18 animals, including three horses, four ponies, five donkeys, five goats, and one sheep, live on 40+ acres of leased pasture along with a caregiver.

Many of our animals are older, have significant health issues, or have been passed from owner to owner without experiencing a secure home. They are not available for adoption and will spend the rest of their lives at HORAH.

We provide community members with multiple opportunities to volunteer and interact with the animals.

Organizations such as the Cathedral Home for Children, Peak Wellness Center, Big Brothers Big Sisters, ARK Regional Services, and others send volunteers to help under the guidance of adult volunteers and their own staff.

Much like the animals, many of the individuals served by these organizations come from backgrounds of neglect, abuse, and/or trauma. HORAH offers opportunities to complete volunteer work and hands-on therapeutic time with the animals. At the end of workdays, the youth spend quality time with the animals, forming a unique connection: receiving love, acceptance, and a sense of purpose and accomplishment.

Additionally, we provide volunteer and educational opportunities to students from the University of Wyoming, WyoTech, and local elementary and middle schools that are not available elsewhere. Students learn about the responsibility of caring for animals, giving to something larger than themselves, and the importance of community.

Relative Theatrics (RT) is seeking funding to produce our 14th season of high quality theatrical experiences and community events for Albany County residents from July 2026 to June 2027 and to conduct arts education for 5th graders in five Albany County schools.

Our request is consistent with last year's. Our studio rent has stayed consistent at \$884 a month. Theatre rental for our productions are currently a flat rate of \$3000 per production and we are seeking new venue spaces to keep costs down. It has always been important for us to prioritize the people who make our programming successful and as such we plan to increase pay for our Technical Director and Production Manager. We currently employ an Artistic & Executive Director, Technical Director, Production Manager, Education Director and 3 Teaching Artists. Beyond the Artistic & Executive Director, our staff is part-time. These part-time employees take care of education, production, technical needs, communication, and liaisons with community organizations. Our Artistic & Executive Director is a full time position that focuses on the creation and organizing of any given production as well as day to day operations including donor and patron management.

Like most arts agencies, RT obtains its funding from a combination of ticket sales, private donations, and grants. We have recently received \$10,000 from Wyoming Humanities for our general programming. We are applying for funds from the Wyoming Arts Council for fiscal year 27. These grants require matching funds so Community Partner funding will be used toward those matches as well as leveraging other sources. We apply for foundation grants and those funders like to see city and county support for our programming. We have increased our donor base but public funding is still required to help cover the costs of arts programming. Relative Theatrics desires to keep ticket prices at a reasonable and accessible level while finding ways to pay for production costs and to compensate actors and the production team for their valuable work. We have requested Community Partner funding for the past eight years. The amount requested reflects our consistent costs. We plan to make ongoing requests in future years as we look forward to providing continuing cultural and educational opportunities for Laramie and Albany County.

The City of Laramie and Albany County provide funding to local community partner organizations through their annual budget making processes. Organizations receiving these funds do not operate within the formal structure of city or county governments but may utilize support from these governments to achieve their missions or fund special projects. Community partner organizations generally have a strong presence within the community and provide vital services, products, or activities that serve to improve the community in a variety of ways. Only non-profit/not-for-profit entities are eligible to apply for funding. For-profit entities are ineligible.

Historically, organizations requesting funding fall within the following three categories:

***Recreational/Arts and Culture:*** These organizations exist to promote, sustain, and develop recreational, cultural, and leisure activities within the community. These organizations may also sponsor educational and community events and celebrations designed to encourage a diverse cultural and active lifestyle while promoting a strong sense of community.

***Social Services:*** The primary objective of these organizations is to support or engage in activities designed to enhance the wellbeing of individuals and families within the community. These organizations provide a variety of services that focus on basic human needs, access to programs and services designed to maintain human dignity and health, and the overall welfare of citizens.

***Civic Organizations/Quasi-Governmental:*** These organizations have been established within our community to A) work for the overall improvement, advancement, and economic health through civic involvement, economic development initiatives, and fostering community spirit; or B) provide services, programs and other opportunities for the betterment of the community through the organization of Joint Powers Boards or other Quasi-Governmental Organizations that work collaboratively with the City of Laramie and/or Albany County on shared goals, concerns, and interests.

This Community Partner Funding is available from funds collected via Albany County's 5th Penny Tax and historically has funded approximately \$250,000 in County requests and \$235,000 in City requests. In their sole discretion, the City and County each reserve the right to waive any informality in any application and/or reject any application.

Organizations can submit a request to both the City and County. If an organization is awarded funding, the organization is solely responsible for its costs including, but not limited to, operations, personnel, taxes, maintenance, and insurance coverage against public liability and property damage.

**Priority of requests is as follows:**

- Requests that are not more than 20% of organization's general operating budget and do not exceed \$20,000 each from City or County.
- Requests to either City or County that are less than 20% of organization's general operating budget but in excess of \$20,000 are considered on a case by case basis and may affect the priority of the organization's request.
- Demonstration of multiple revenue sources for organization.
- The number of people served by organization.
- Clear identification of those who benefit from the organization's work.

The requested funds will provide critical operational support for the Laramie Plains Civic Center (LPCC), a 150,000-square-foot community hub and Wyoming's oldest brick school building. As a vital infrastructure provider, LPCC houses over 95 tenant organizations, acting as a specialized incubator for the nonprofit, human service, and creative sectors.

City and County funding serves as the essential bridge between our earned revenue and the rising costs of maintaining a historic, high-traffic public facility. Specifically, these funds will be utilized for:

**Facility Stewardship:** Covering 24/7 utility costs, preventative maintenance, and modern property management systems to ensure a safe, professional environment for the public.

**Professional Staffing:** Supporting the team that manages complex facility scheduling, public safety, and tenant relations for nearly 100 diverse entities.

**Tenant Accessibility:** Funding allows LPCC to keep rental rates significantly below market value. In 2025, LPCC rent averaged \$10.80/sq. Ft. while local commercial rates average between \$12.00 and \$16.00 per square foot (Laramie Main Street/LoopNet 2026).

This subsidized overhead, including a 20% rental relief to all nonprofit organizations, ensures that tenants like Wyoming Children's Law and local artists can focus their limited budgets on community programming rather than real estate costs

LPCC utilizes a diversified funding model to ensure long-term resilience, generating approximately 60% of its annual budget through earned revenue (tenant leases and event rentals). The remaining 40% is secured through a robust mix of state and regional grants (including the Wyoming Arts Council and Wyoming Community Foundation), local partnerships (such as the Albany County Recreation Board and Visit Laramie), and private philanthropy from individual and corporate donors.

Public investment is the catalyst that allows LPCC to leverage these diverse sources. By funding the "backstage" operations of the Civic Center, the City and County are securing a centralized, affordable home for the dozens of organizations that serve Albany County daily.

Investment in LPCC yields a high social return by providing the "third-space" infrastructure necessary for a healthy, connected community. The primary benefit of these funds is the preservation of low-barrier access to culture, wellness, and essential human services in a centralized location.

**Community Benefits:**

**Equitable Recreation:** Programs like the Play Library and Open Gym provide families with over 2,300 hours of free, indoor movement space annually—an indispensable resource during Laramie's long winters.

**Cultural Incubation:** Specialized spaces like Siren Studios and the Gorgon Gallery lower the barrier to entry for marginalized voices and emerging creators, ensuring Laramie remains the "Cultural Capital of Wyoming."

**Social Service Synergy:** By acting as a central hub for agencies like United Way and Parents as Teachers, we ensure residents can access multiple layers of support in a single, familiar, and non-stigmatized location.

**2026/2027 Strategic Goals:**

**Expand Public Reach:** Grow annual foot traffic by deepening connections with the Eppson Center, UW, LCCC, and WyoTech. We will host high-impact collaborative events such as the Laramie Zine Fest and unique regional programming featuring the Jackrabbit Workshop and Jackalope Cult Cinema.

**Preserve & Enhance Historic Assets:** Protect the building's longevity by executing critical preventative maintenance on the South Gym and Gorgon Gallery floors. Simultaneously, we will enhance the facility's public face through a sculptural theater signage partnership with the UW Art Department and a public art installation featuring archived pieces in coordination with the Laramie Public Art Coalition.

**Catalyze Tenant Success:** Maximize the collective impact of our 95+ organizations through cost-sharing educational programming and unified marketing campaigns. By pooling resources for audience growth and fundraising, we ensure that our nonprofit and creative tenants spend less on administration and more on their core missions.

LPCC operates on a philosophy of “many hands,” acting as both a critical infrastructure provider and a collaborative catalyst. We avoid duplicating services by providing specialized, affordable space that allows existing organizations to thrive rather than creating competing programs.

Nonprofit Infrastructure: By housing essential agencies such as the United Way of Albany County, Wyoming Coalition Against Domestic Violence and Sexual Assault, and Parents as Teachers, we eliminate the need for these organizations to manage independent facilities. This allows them to pool resources and direct more of their funding toward direct client services.

Public/Private Partnerships: We collaborate with partners like Laramie Main Street Alliance, Common Outdoor Ground, and local sports teams. By hosting signature events like the Artists Sunday Market and rehabilitating public assets like the Civic Center Courtyard, we drive foot traffic downtown and provide a measurable boost to the local creative economy.

Strategic Gap Filling: Before launching initiatives, LPCC identifies unmet community needs. For example, our Play Library fills a specific void for free, indoor, non-membership-based toddler play that was previously unavailable in the downtown core—complementing, rather than duplicating, city parks or private gyms.

Cultural Hub: Our work directly advances Thrive Laramie’s goal of becoming the "Cultural Capital of Wyoming." We provide the "backstage" support—affordable studios, gymnasiums, and venues—that makes the success of Laramie’s arts and recreation scenes possible.

Through these partnerships, LPCC serves as a force multiplier, ensuring that public funds are used efficiently to support a wide network of providers rather than a single siloed entity.

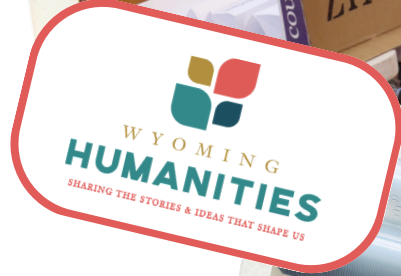

# Albany County and City of Laramie Community Partner Organization Funding Request Application FY2027

The City of Laramie and Albany County provide funding to local community partner organizations through their annual budget making processes. Organizations receiving these funds do not operate within the formal structure of city or county governments but may utilize support from these governments to achieve their missions or fund special projects. Community partner organizations generally have a strong presence within the community and provide vital services, products, or activities that serve to improve the community in a variety of ways. Only non-profit/not-for-profit entities are eligible to apply for funding. For-profit entities are ineligible.

Historically, organizations requesting funding fall within the following three categories:

***Recreational/Arts and Culture:*** These organizations exist to promote, sustain, and develop recreational, cultural, and leisure activities within the community. These organizations may also sponsor educational and community events and celebrations designed to encourage a diverse cultural and active lifestyle while promoting a strong sense of community.

***Social Services:*** The primary objective of these organizations is to support or engage in activities designed to enhance the wellbeing of individuals and families within the community. These organizations provide a variety of services that focus on basic human needs, access to programs and services designed to maintain human dignity and health, and the overall welfare of citizens.

***Civic Organizations/Quasi-Governmental:*** These organizations have been established within our community to A) work for the overall improvement, advancement, and economic health through civic involvement, economic development initiatives, and fostering community spirit; or B) provide services, programs and other opportunities for the betterment of the community through the organization of Joint Powers Boards or other Quasi-Governmental Organizations that work collaboratively with the City of Laramie and/or Albany County on shared goals, concerns, and interests.

This Community Partner Funding is available from funds collected via Albany County's 5th Penny Tax and historically has funded approximately \$250,000 in County requests and \$235,000 in City requests. In their sole discretion, the City and County each reserve the right to waive any informality in any application and/or reject any application.

Organizations can submit a request to both the City and County. If an organization is awarded funding, the organization is solely responsible for its costs including, but not limited to, operations, personnel, taxes,

maintenance, and insurance coverage against public liability and property damage.

**Priority of requests is as follows:**

- Requests that improve the community.
- Requests that are not more than 20% of organization's general operating budget and do not exceed \$20,000 each from City or County.
- Requests to either City or County that are less than 20% of organization's general operating budget but in excess of \$20,000 are considered on a case by case basis and may affect the priority of the organization's request.
- Demonstration of multiple revenue sources for organization.
- The number of people served by organization.
- Clear identification of those who benefit from the organization's work.
- Demonstration of the organization's partnership with other organizations in the community.
- Requests that do not duplicate efforts already existing in the community.

For-profit entities are not eligible to apply. Only non-profit/not-for-profit entities are eligible to apply for funding.

**Schedule for Decision Making Process and Availability of Funds:**

**City:** Laramie City Council intends to make its preliminary funding decisions in early to mid-April 2026 and final funding decisions will be announced upon adoption of the City's FY2026/2027 Budget in June 2026. The City's award payments to successful organizations will be made on or around August 1, 2026, pending receipt of the fully executed agreement.

**County:** The Albany County Commissioners make their final funding decisions upon the adoption of the County's FY2026/2027 Budget in June 2026. Agreements will be sent to successful organizations in July 2026. Pending the County's receipt of the fully executed Agreement, the County's award payments to successful organizations will only be made on a reimbursement basis.

All information on this form and all requested documentation must be complete and submitted before the application will be considered. Applications that are incomplete or are missing required materials may be rejected. If there are additional questions from City Council or the Albany County Commissioners after review of the applications Nancy Oakland-Potter or Bailey Quick will reach out to the organization for additional information.

The \$50,000 CPG request (\$25,000 City / \$25,000 County) funds the core annual obligations that keep Pilot Hill's 7,100 acres open, safe, and free of charge to all users. Specifically, funds are allocated as follows:

Annual Lease Fees & Liability Insurance – \$68,093 total budget. CPG funds cover a proportionate share of the long-term lease payments to Wyoming State Lands and liability insurance required to maintain public access across all 7,100 acres.

Direct Client Services – \$1,042,459 total budget. Supports contract trail crews and services responsible for day-to-day operations, user safety, and ongoing trail maintenance across 50+ miles of multi-use trails. This funding also covers maintenance of fencing, wayfinding signage, trailhead facilities (restrooms, shelter, water, gathering space amenities), and ADA-accessible infrastructure serving users of all abilities. These services attract additional revenue and drive the 150,000+ annual visits generating regional economic activity.

Pilot Hill Inc. maintains a diversified funding model. The CPG request represents approximately 4.8% of the \$1,042,459 annual direct client services portion of the budget. Additional confirmed and anticipated revenue sources include:

Private Foundations & Major Donors – including the reserved grant funds from the Hughes Foundation and other regional philanthropic partners; historically the largest single funding category.

Wyoming Outdoor Recreation & State Grants – competitive grants supporting trail maintenance and infrastructure and recreation programming statewide.

Individual Donations & Community Fundraising – Albany County residents have contributed over \$1.8M cumulatively since inception, demonstrating exceptional grassroots commitment from our community.

Corporate Sponsors & In-Kind Contributions – local businesses provide cash sponsorships, equipment, and services; volunteer labor contributes thousands of hours annually toward trail and property maintenance.

Earned Revenue – event fees and program partnerships (races and events, branded merchandise) generate supplemental operating income and broaden community engagement.

CPG funds are not a standalone subsidy – they are a catalyst. Every dollar from the City and County leverages multiple dollars from foundations, state grants, donors, and earned revenue, sustaining free access to 7,10 acres for 38,000 residents and generating regional economic activity.

Describe the positive effects and benefits the requested funds would provide to the organization and the community, including goals the organization hopes to accomplish. \*

CPG funding directly stabilizes Pilot Hill Inc.'s ability to fulfill its mission. Annual lease fees and liability insurance are non-negotiable obligations – without them, public access to all 7,100 acres would be untenable. Ongoing maintenance ensures a safe and accessible community resource. Securing a portion of these costs through CPG allows Pilot Hill to direct donor and grant revenue toward capital goals: finishing the trailhead, and enhancing the amenities needed to attract and manage 150,000+ annual users. CPG funds also strengthen Pilot Hill's credibility with major funders by demonstrating sustained municipal investment – a key factor in qualifying for state and private matching grants that could unlock thousands of additional dollars for the region.

For Albany County's 38,000+ residents, Pilot Hill provides what no other resource can: free, immediate access to 50+ miles of trails, wildlife habitat, and open space in their own backyard. The community benefits are wide-ranging and well-documented:

**Physical & Mental Health.** Accessible trails reduce barriers to outdoor exercise for residents of all ages and abilities, including 2+ miles of ADA routes. Regular outdoor activity is directly linked to improved cardiovascular health, reduced anxiety and depression, and stronger community bonds.

**Education & Youth Development.** K–12 students engage in science-based field trips, wildlife research, and aquifer education. Youth programs – including at-risk youth groups and school mountain bike teams – use Pilot Hill weekly as a safe, restorative outdoor classroom.

**Economic Growth.** UW's CBEA estimates that Pilot Hill generates \$5.8M in annual regional economic value, supports 150 jobs, and produces \$1.3M in local tax revenue. Outdoor amenities attract workforce talent, remote workers, and retirees – a proven economic development strategy for rural communities.

**Environmental Stewardship.** Operational funding protects the Casper aquifer recharge zone – Laramie's primary drinking water source – by maintaining a managed growth buffer on the city's eastern edge and supporting the joint City-County Aquifer Protection Plan.

With CPG support, Pilot Hill Inc. will maintain uninterrupted free public access and grow educational and community events. Pilot Hill is one of the most-used and most-valued community assets in Albany County. A significant CPG investment demonstrates the commitment of the City and County as foundational partners.

Describe your organization's partnerships with other organizations in the community and how your organization avoids duplication of efforts while carrying out impactful work in your service area. \*

Partnerships have been a cornerstone of Pilot Hill Inc.'s success since inception, and they continue to grow each year. Board members serve by appointment from partnering organizations including the University of Wyoming (UW), Albany County, City of Laramie, WY State Parks, WY Game & Fish Department, USFS/Med Bow Natl. Forest and Laramie Rivers Conservation District. Elected Board members represent Rocky Mountain Elk Foundation, Laramie BikeNet, and High Plains Harriers. This governance structure ensures active collaboration and eliminates duplication by keeping key agencies and organizations at the decision-making table.

With the Pilot Hill trailhead within two miles of Laramie Middle School, High School, and several elementary schools, this unique positioning allows Pilot Hill to serve as a community third space, and a hub that complements – rather than duplicates – existing community resources.

Recent partnership examples include a collaborative erosion control project with Laramie Rivers Conservation District, WY Game & Fish, USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service, and UW Extension/Barnyards & Backyards, engaging 20+ volunteers to install Zeedyke reclamation structures. UW also partnered in reactivating an abandoned well to install a solar water pump supporting wildlife in critical winter habitat.

Pilot Hill is partnering with the City of Laramie to support its role as host of the Wyoming Association of Municipalities Conference this spring, providing the venue for a 5K fun run that showcases Pilot Hill's trails and Laramie's unique outdoor assets to municipal leaders from across the state.

Through partnerships with local schools and community clubs, Pilot Hill coordinates guided hikes on topics including the Casper aquifer, regional geology, and other nature-focused themes. These programs connect students and residents directly to the landscape in their backyard, supporting site-based learning while leveraging the expertise of partner organizations – ensuring efforts are coordinated and impactful rather than duplicative.

Pilot Hill's Executive Director serves on the City Parks & Recreation Board, the SE WY Great Divide Outdoor Recreation Collaborative, and the Albany County Tourism Board – ensuring Pilot Hill's work aligns with and strengthens broader community initiatives. Regular engagement at state conferences further multiplies Pilot Hill's reach and impact beyond Laramie.

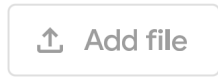

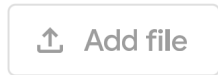

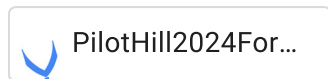

Laramie Public Art Coalition (LPAC) is requesting support for a community program manager staff position. LPAC has historically received generous community partner support for staff, so we can continue to grow our impact on the community through our projects and programs. As a growing organization, we rely on funds like the Community Partner grant to ensure we can do the work. This funding would help us match salary support from

funding sources including the Wyoming Cultural Trust Fund and the NEA Our Town grant.

A community program manager position is essential to sustaining LPAC's community-centered programming during a period of organizational transition. This role will coordinate our artist-led workshop series and Creative Aging program, guide the public engagement process for several art installations around town, and help LPAC begin new community art initiatives that directly serve residents while providing paid opportunities for local artists.

We have additional funding to support this position and related programming costs from our fundraising efforts, which included individual donations (around \$15,000 yearly), a Wyoming Arts Council Community Support grant (\$8,000), Wyoming Community Foundation Intertie Grant (\$10,000), and remaining funds from a \$75,000 National Endowment of the Arts grant, as well as multiple pending grant applications.

LPAC is a Wyoming-based nonprofit organization that cultivates belonging, joy, and curiosity through public art in Albany County. Our work brings community members, local artists, and businesses together to improve shared spaces and build community through inclusive and low-cost artistic programming. Public art is our platform for strengthening social connection, supporting the creative economy, and enhancing economic vitality.

Over the past year, LPAC engaged more than 500 community members, paid 92 artists, and invested over \$71,000 directly into the local creative economy. Our programming included artist-led workshops in topics from willow basket-weaving to professional development for artists, Creative Aging courses for residents 55+, public art installations (murals and sculptures) tied to community identity and place, and large-scale events such as Laramie Winterfest, which brought art, music, and commerce into downtown Laramie through partnerships with local businesses. These efforts not only enrich cultural life but also generate foot traffic, support artists as small business owners, and contribute to a vibrant local economy.

LPAC plays a crucial role in advancing the local creative economy, a priority reflected in Resolution 2024-10 and the Albany County Comprehensive Plan's goal to diversify economic opportunities. We provide artists with fair compensation, professional development, and new opportunities to engage with the public. In 2025, we paid 92 artists to create for our community.

LPAC's work in the City of Laramie and Albany County strengthens community bonds, enhances public spaces, supports local artists, and expands access to meaningful arts experiences for our community. Together, we are shaping a Laramie and Albany County where art is an essential part of daily life, enriching culture, economy, and overall quality of life for all residents.

In 2025, LPAC experienced a reduction in federal grant funding, and lost our community program manager position. While our board has remained active and committed, this absence limits our ability to meet community demand, steward partnerships, and deliver inclusive programming at the scale our community has come to expect. Staff salary support would allow LPAC to continue serving as a cultural connector stabilize at a pivotal moment.

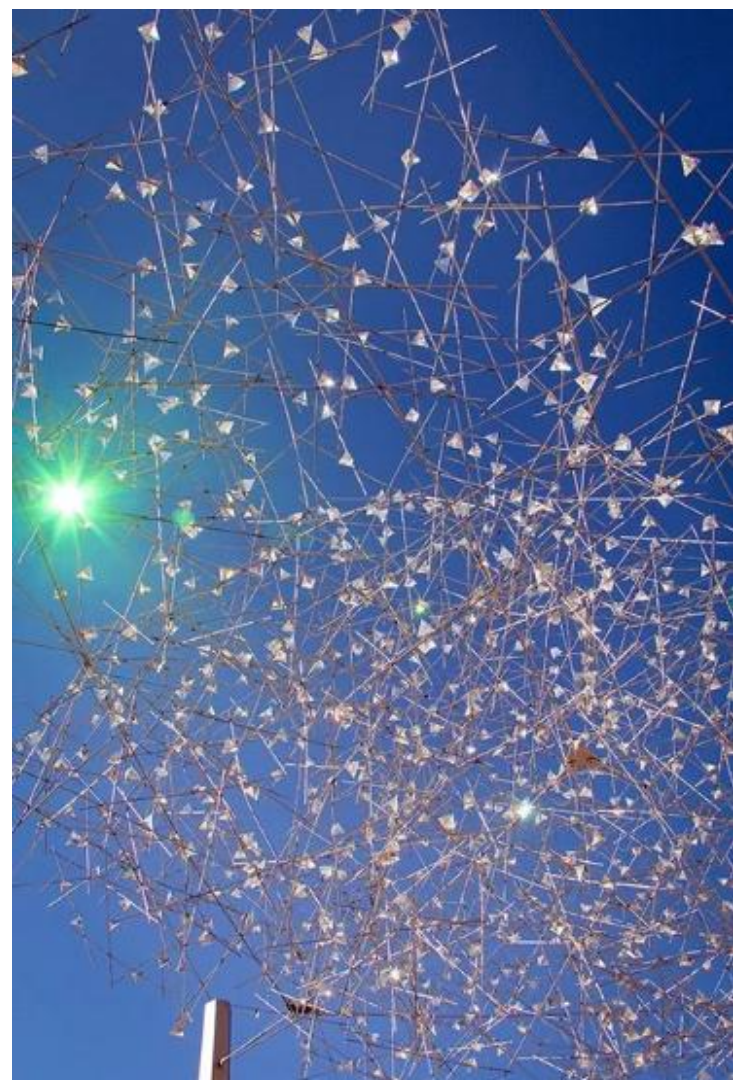

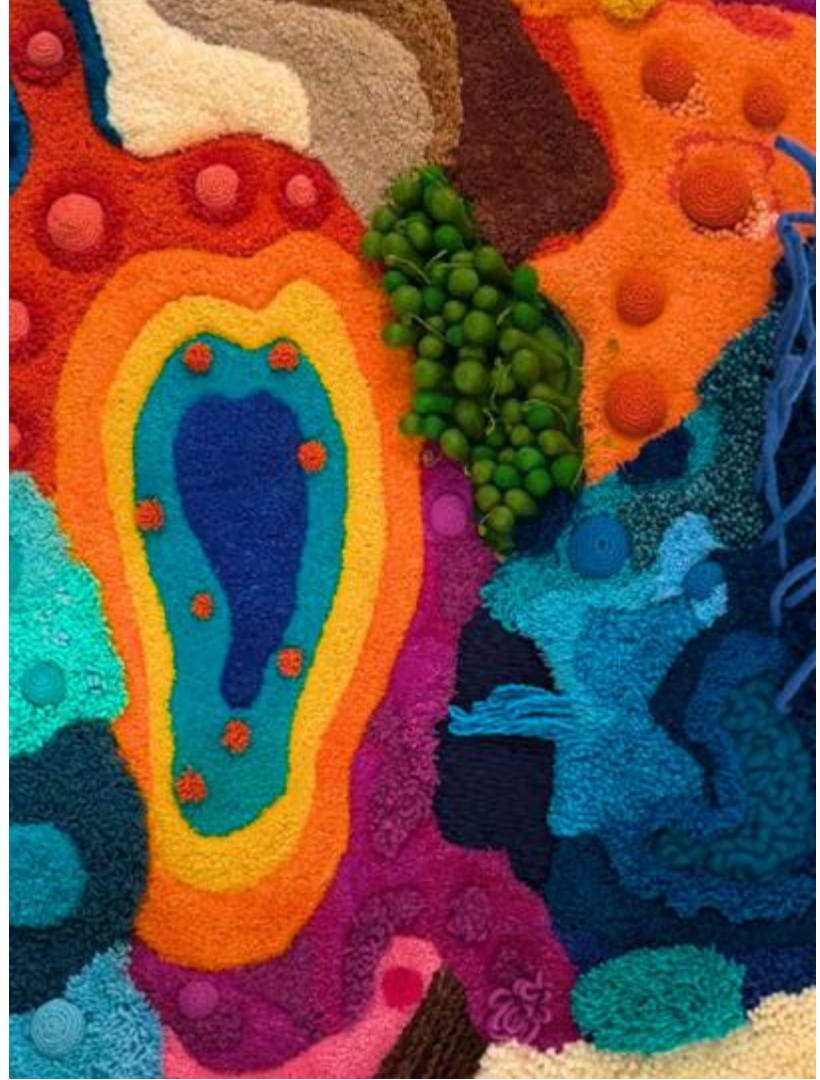
### 3<sup>rd</sup> Street Beautification

The first steps of a multi-year project in the making were made this past year when the artist team, HaddadDrugan (Laura Haddad and Tom Drugan) were selected from a pool of applicants to create gateway artwork for the 3rd Street Corridor. A local committee interviewed five outstanding applicants to select the artist team. The City of Laramie and WYDOT were able to complete much needed work on the strip of road with future art coming soon. Since their selection, Haddad and Drugan have visited twice and met with constituents and stakeholders of the project to begin developing an artwork that honors our community.

## Artist-led Workshops

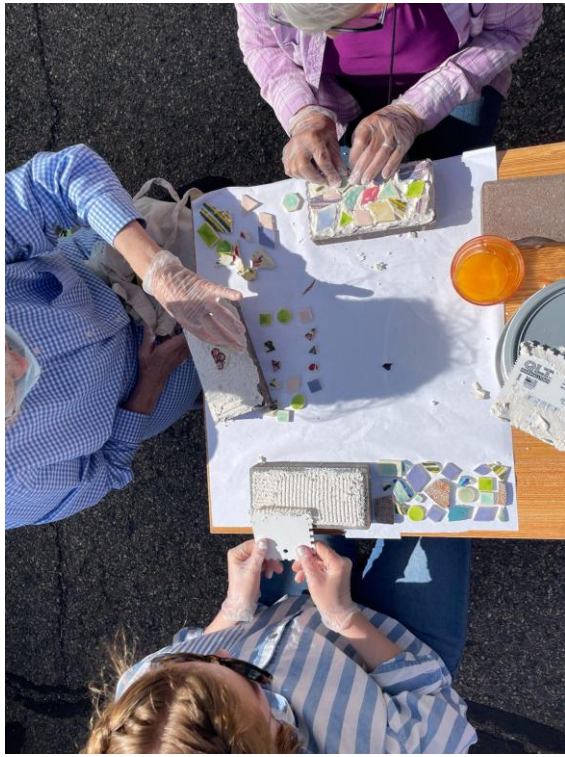

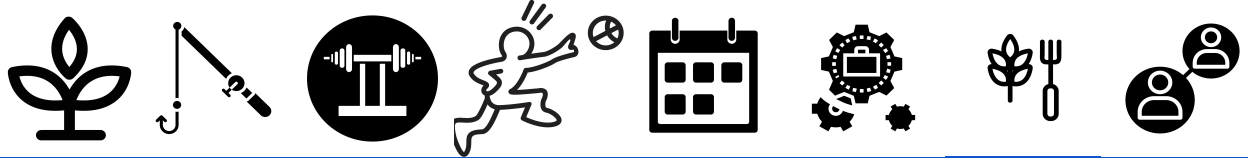

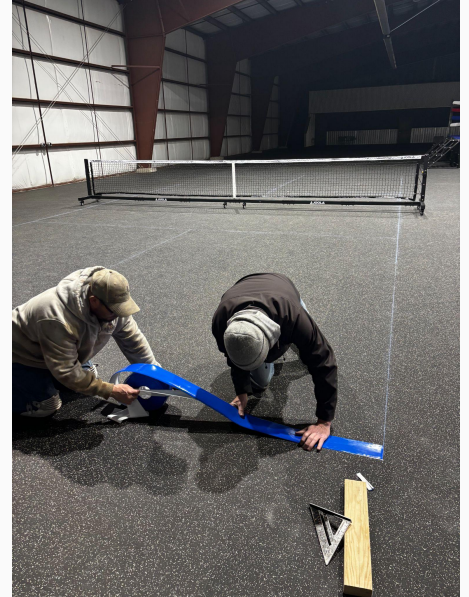

Utilizing volunteer and professional mentors, BBBS helps ensure that every young person in our community has the support they need to reach their full potential. In addition to our one to one mentoring services, BBBS also provides after-school programming for 4 local elementary schools as well as middle and high schoolers, and juvenile justice programming based on a restorative justice model that keeps kids out of the court system and helps them make healthier choices.

BBBS utilizes funds for at-risk youth to engage them in mentoring services, as well as provide support to families. Approximately 50% of youth served in 2025 lived at or below the poverty line. Over 38% of BBBS youth served have two or more Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACES) and 20% shared they have a diagnosed mental health condition like anxiety or depression.

Mentoring services for Albany County/Laramie youth have been shown to improve academics, mental health, and social skills for youth. Carefully trained professional and volunteer mentors can help youth learn, cope, and grow in safe, supportive environments. And, BBBS Case Managers can also provide support services to families and connect them to other organizations/services in the area. Staff work to build connections and trust with youth and families and are often the first person parents/guardians will reach out to when additional support services are needed. Since 2020, there has been an increase in parents and guardians reaching out to BBBS for help finding additional resources.

Research shows that kids in mentoring relationships tend to do better in school and have higher levels of academic engagement, get along better with peers and families, have more positive attitudes towards avoiding risky behaviors, show improvement in mental health symptoms such as anxiety and depression, and develop healthier mental and physical health habits that last into adulthood. Children with mentors also tend to set bigger, better goals for themselves and their futures and believe that they will be capable of accomplishing the things that matter most to them.

Data from the Harvard Business Review indicates that the number one factor in a child's ability to develop the resilience they need to overcome and challenges life throws their way is whether or not they have a caring adult in their life. BBBS's main goal is to ensure that every child has that kind of support. With the support of the City of Laramie and Albany County, we hope to continue serving vulnerable populations of young people in our community and to reach additional kids and families by increasing numbers of volunteers. In 2025, we served 430 kids and their family members in the Laramie area.

BBBS also seeks to continue improving outcomes for the youth in our programs. BBBS utilizes the Youth Outcome Survey tool that was developed and tested by Big Brothers Big Sisters of America to analyze the progress of each child in our programs. In 2025, data showed that youth surveyed showed improvement in academic performance and expectations, emotional regulation, social connectedness, and having a trusted adult in their life.

BBBS maintains close, collaborative relationships with other nonprofits in town, including but not limited to the Soup Kitchen, Laramie Interfaith, Parents and Teachers, Family Promise, the Wyoming Children's Law Center, United Way, the Cathedral Home, and Laramie Youth Crisis Center. We also work closely with Albany County School District 1 as well as the County Attorney's Office to provide additional programming.

Big Brothers Big Sisters has become a trusted expert in the field of youth mentoring, and as such has had several groups reach out to us about the possibility of expanding mentoring services or creating additional programming. To the best of our knowledge, no other such program exists in the Laramie area and there is no duplication of efforts.

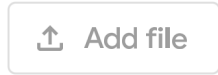
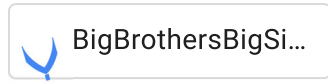

The City of Laramie and Albany County provide funding to local community partner organizations through their annual budget making processes. Organizations receiving these funds do not operate within the formal structure of city or county governments but may utilize support from these governments to achieve their missions or fund special projects. Community partner organizations generally have a strong presence within the community and provide vital services, products, or activities that serve to improve the community in a variety of ways. Only non-profit/not-for-profit entities are eligible to apply for funding. For-profit entities are ineligible.

Historically, organizations requesting funding fall within the following three categories:

***Recreational/Arts and Culture:*** These organizations exist to promote, sustain, and develop recreational, cultural, and leisure activities within the community. These organizations may also sponsor educational and community events and celebrations designed to encourage a diverse cultural and active lifestyle while promoting a strong sense of community.

***Social Services:*** The primary objective of these organizations is to support or engage in activities designed to enhance the wellbeing of individuals and families within the community. These organizations provide a variety of services that focus on basic human needs, access to programs and services designed to maintain human dignity and health, and the overall welfare of citizens.

***Civic Organizations/Quasi-Governmental:*** These organizations have been established within our community to A) work for the overall improvement, advancement, and economic health through civic involvement, economic development initiatives, and fostering community spirit; or B) provide services, programs and other opportunities for the betterment of the community through the organization of Joint Powers Boards or other Quasi-Governmental Organizations that work collaboratively with the City of Laramie and/or Albany County on shared goals, concerns, and interests.

This Community Partner Funding is available from funds collected via Albany County's 5th Penny Tax and historically has funded approximately \$250,000 in County requests and \$235,000 in City requests. In their sole discretion, the City and County each reserve the right to waive any informality in any application and/or reject any application.

Organizations can submit a request to both the City and County. If an organization is awarded funding, the organization is solely responsible for its costs including, but not limited to, operations, personnel, taxes,

maintenance, and insurance coverage against public liability and property damage.

**Priority of requests is as follows:**

- Requests that improve the community.
- Requests that are not more than 20% of organization's general operating budget and do not exceed \$20,000 each from City or County.
- Requests to either City or County that are less than 20% of organization's general operating budget but in excess of \$20,000 are considered on a case by case basis and may affect the priority of the organization's request.
- Demonstration of multiple revenue sources for organization.
- The number of people served by organization.
- Clear identification of those who benefit from the organization's work.

As a true community effort, 97% of 2025 revenue was private/non-governmental with 13% from grants and foundations, including several private family foundations, the Hilton-Garden Inn, Wyoming Hunger Initiative, Wyoming Community Foundation, Episcopal Diocese of Wyoming, and Walmart. The Soup Kitchen does not charge any fees for service. The requested Community Partner funding will help offset a portion of the operational and personnel expenses of the Laramie Soup Kitchen's Food Recovery Team (~\$66,000 + benefits). This team consists of two highly capable individuals who manage the complex logistics of recovery, sorting, and redistribution of all food donations. These team members must be personable and dependable to successfully create and maintain the critical partnerships formed with over 20 local retailers and restaurants, while also receiving items from many other donors. Funding also includes a mileage reimbursement (\$3,000/yr) for the team's 350 collective miles driven each month as they pick up an average of 780 pounds of food each day and share that resource with 20 to 30 nonprofit programs across the community.

Through the efforts of the Food Recovery Team, the Laramie Soup Kitchen spends nearly no general funds to purchase food. Even with the financial contributions specifically designated for food purchases, only \$1,300 was spent in 2025 – 2 to 4 cents per meal! In comparison, the value of food resources donated annually is conservatively estimated to be over \$800,000, but potentially over \$1 million, far exceeding the entire operating budget of the organization. Without this team, the Laramie Soup Kitchen could not afford to purchase the ingredients necessary to provide the 35,000 hot meals and 30,000 additional prepackaged meals that are now distributed each year.

Furthermore, by managing nearly 200,000 pounds of donated food annually, this team ensures that quality, perishable items, which make up 78% to 86% of all donations, are diverted from the landfill toward feeding the people who are most in need of nutritious food. However, not all donated food is in good condition, so the Soup Kitchen's zero food waste commitment ensures that vegetarian items not fit for human consumption are shared with local ranchers, converting it into a new food supply.

To promote a positive workplace culture and improve retention, the Laramie Soup Kitchen further invests in the wellbeing of its team by providing qualifying employees with additional benefits including group health insurance, SIMPLE IRAs, paid holidays & sick leave, and professional development opportunities. The focus of Community Partner funding will be for salaries, payroll taxes, and mileage reimbursement for the Food Recovery Team.

The Laramie Soup Kitchen is the only agency in the region providing regular, hot, restaurant-quality meals with no questions asked and no paperwork required. This low-barrier approach ensures that the most vulnerable residents, including the working class, seniors, individuals with disabilities, and those struggling with mental illness, receive immediate support. These efforts improve both the financial stability and the physical health of those on limited incomes, as not having to pay for at least one nutritious meal a day significantly impacts a household's budget. Beyond nutrition and financial stability, the Soup Kitchen addresses emotional needs and loneliness, fostering a community where guests check in on one another and pick up meals for neighbors. Such a community of support can make all the difference!

The Food Recovery Team also creates a multiplier effect throughout the community by sharing 35,000 to 50,000 pounds of food with area nonprofits. Providing nutritious produce and proteins ensures healthy options that are often too expensive for low-income residents to purchase are available through multiple organizations.

Another item that is distributed through this network is genuine Bombas socks (the ones donated each time a person purchases a pair) and will give out 5,000+ more pairs this year through multiple agency partners!

As the Laramie Soup Kitchen works toward the goal of building a new facility that will serve as a collaborative hub for multiple nonprofits all providing services to the same vulnerable population, it will also remain focused on meeting immediate needs. The organization will strive to offer another 65,000 hot and prepackaged meals in 2026, while the Food Recovery Team continues to work towards a zero-food-waste community. Giving local retailers, restaurants, and caterers avenues to donate edible food provides the resource necessary to improve food security for the entire community.

The Laramie Soup Kitchen operates as a central hub for food security, intentionally designed to complement rather than duplicate other area services. While local pantries provide ingredients for home cooking, the Laramie Soup Kitchen is the only provider of daily, ready-to-eat hot and prepackaged meals available without qualification. This fills a specific gap for those who are unhoused and individuals who may lack the utilities, time, or physical ability to cook. Additionally, the Soup Kitchen helps to stock the shelves of local pantries and supports other programs through a redistribution model rooted in a mindset of collaboration and abundance. When the Food Recovery Team secures a surplus, many of the freshest items are immediately delivered to the nonprofit program that will benefit the most, and never at any cost to that organization. This also extends the Soup Kitchen’s reach to thousands more than the 1,088 served annually through its primary meal program.

At the Laramie Soup Kitchen, success isn't just about serving food. It's about welcoming every person, building community in a place of safety, and feeding all people who arrive hungry or in need of a friendly place. It's a place of dignity, where neighbors are reminded that they are valued and always welcome.

The 5th Penny Sales Tax is a community-funded investment, and the Soup Kitchen takes the stewardship of these funds seriously. By providing financial support for the Food Recovery Team, the City and County are effectively securing nearly 200,000 pounds of food for the hungry for a fraction of the retail cost. 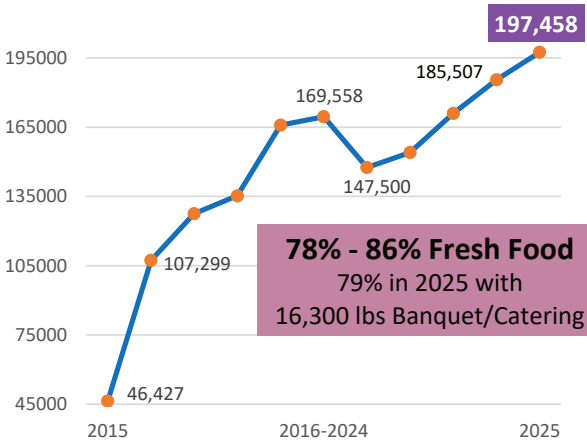

## NUMBER OF MEALS SERVED (2014 - 2025)



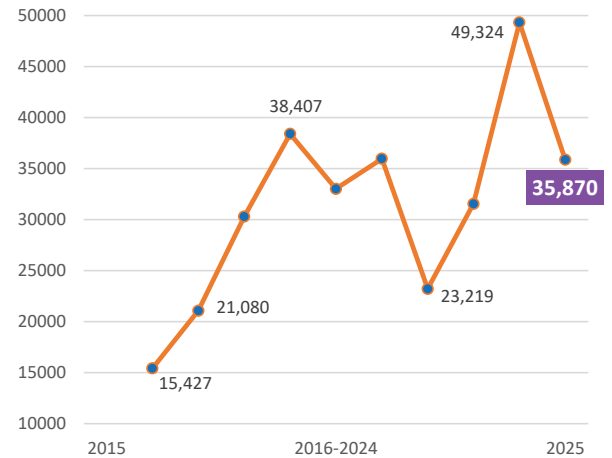
### DONATED FOOD (by weight in lbs)

### REDISTRIBUTED FOOD (by weight in lbs)



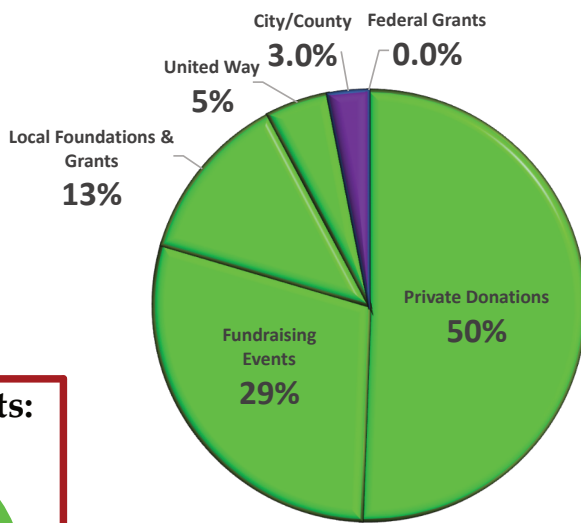

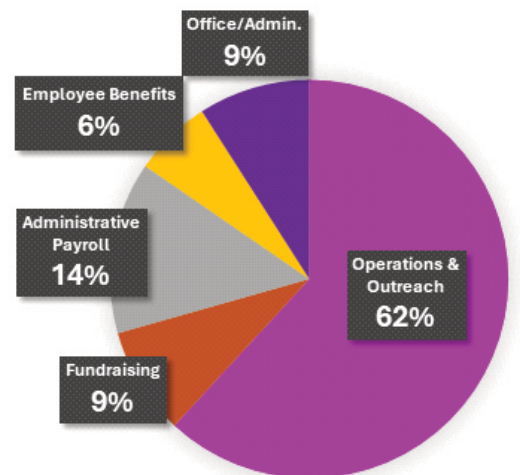

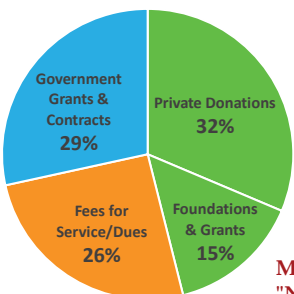

Laramie Interfaith will use these funds to continue working with low-income households in Albany County. Albany County is the poorest county in Wyoming. According to the most recent Census Bureau facts, nearly 16% of the population lives in poverty.

City funds would be used to provide short-term rental and utility assistance to keep people in their homes while they work with our case managers to set and achieve goals that will help them create a stable household, whether it be finding employment, signing up for job training, or getting connected to other resources such as mental health counseling.

Additional funding sources that will support this mission include other grant revenue United Way (\$20,000) TANF (\$45,000) CSBG (\$48,500) ESG (\$60,000) Wyoming Community Foundation(\$10,000), donations (\$330,000) and fundraisers (\$50,000).

Low incomes and high housing costs are widespread in the Laramie community, with many referring to the current situation as a 'housing crisis'. A 2024 Statewide Housing Needs Assessment stated that the county needs between 2,500-3,700 new homes to meet the demand – a tall order. Solving the housing issue in our community will require a multi-faceted, community-wide approach, and Laramie Interfaith is working to be part of the solution by keeping people in their homes and preventing homelessness in our community. Many low-income residents are facing rising costs in rental and mobile home housing; from \$300 a month up to close to \$700 a month or higher in recent years. City funding gives Laramie Interfaith the ability to assist these households in addressing immediate needs before they can work on longer term strategies for stability. By helping our neighbors build resiliency and self-sufficiency, we are also helping to build a more resilient community.

Laramie Interfaith partners with many community organizations such as the VOA, Soup Kitchen, Climb, Albany County School District and the Eppson Center for Seniors. Laramie Interfaith utilizes our close partnerships with other organizations to provide well-rounded assistance to clients. Referrals are a useful part of our toolkit when building self-sufficiency in clients. Some barriers to self-sufficiency, such as mental health issues, cannot be addressed by Laramie Interfaith. In these circumstances, providing referrals to our partners such as the VOA increases the chances of our clients' ongoing success. Our close relationship with other organizations means that we are familiar with our partners' mission and activities and can avoid duplication of services, adjusting when necessary. Last month, Laramie Interfaith announced that it is merging with Family Promise of Albany County, with the latter organization continuing to provide its services as a program offered through Interfaith. This partnership demonstrates a commitment to supporting families experiencing housing instability while improving efficiency and collaboration between local service providers. This move provides an opportunity for greater collective impact by reducing overhead and administrative costs for providing services.

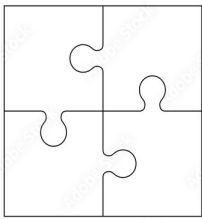
## Pantry Statistics

For the second year in a row, roughly half a million pounds of food moved through our building and out to the community. Our thanks to the Gov. Gordon and our community for providing us with the funding to order nearly 50,000 lbs for the month of November alone during the SNAP shutdown. On average our food costs have nearly doubled for the past three years; placing us into a situation where supply cannot meet demand.

## The Growing Costs to Our Community

Housing and utility assistance are among the most critical services we provide—and also the most vulnerable to rising costs. Unlike many program areas, being a nonprofit does not reduce the price of rent or utilities. Laramie Interfaith pays the same housing and energy costs that our clients face every day.

Since 2020, the average cost of rent in our community has increased by more than 50%. Today, more than 55% of renters are considered cost-burdened, all while Albany County remains the poorest county in Wyoming. These trends have placed tremendous strain on households already living on the financial edge.

As housing and utility prices continue to climb, the purchasing power of our assistance dollars has steadily declined. At the same time, many federal funding sources remain tied to pre-COVID funding levels, leaving fewer resources available to respond to a growing number of families in crisis. Even after securing new grant funding, the rising cost of housing and utilities makes it difficult to keep

pace with demand.

Despite these challenges, Laramie Interfaith has expanded its impact. Today we are serving nearly twice as many households as we did in 2020. Yet the need in our community continues to grow, widening the gap between what families require to remain safely housed and the resources available to support them.

To address this challenge, Laramie Interfaith is strengthening its capacity through the integration of the Family Promise program. By aligning programs and leveraging additional grant funding, we are expanding the resources available for housing stabilization and utility assistance. This collaboration will allow us to respond more effectively when families face the risk of eviction, utility shutoffs, or sudden financial emergencies.

With continued investment, we can ensure that a temporary financial crisis does not become a long-term housing disaster for families in our community.

# Client Services



Our Client Services case workers assisted over 200 households with emergency rent and utilities assistance working through multiple grants. On average we have seen rents continue to rise with most requests for apartments exceeding \$800 for single bedroom and lot-rents for trailer homes closing in on \$700.

We continue to provide application assistance for programs and benefits such as LIEAP, WAP, Energy Share, SNAP, CLIMB, SSI/SSDI, VA, and Medicaid/Medicare.



**1500+ Hours of Dedicated Case Management and Crises Support Hours**

Working closely with our numerous partners locally and statewide, we have been able to help clients through challenging situations to find and receive the help they need. In 2025, we worked with numerous individuals to help support them through job training and reskilling programs. Our case managers filed more than 50 applications with clients for Cheyenne Housing vouchers, 82 SNAP applications, 110 LIEAP applications, 50 Energy Share of Wyoming applications, 4 Social Security Disability applications, and more than 100 jobs applications among the rest of their work on housing and utilities.

## Our Impact

While we pride ourselves on meeting clients wherever they are in their journey, some challenges require the coordinated efforts of many partners. In those moments, collaboration becomes our greatest strength.

In the summer of 2025, we were contacted by a family facing a medical emergency with their child. Due to the severity of the condition, the child had to be transferred to Children's Hospital in Denver for specialized care. At first, the parents attempted to commute back and forth so they could maintain their jobs while staying close to their child.

As the situation worsened, however, maintaining that balance became impossible. The parents were forced to leave their jobs, relying on their savings to get by. When those resources were exhausted, the family turned to Laramie Interfaith for help. With no income and their savings depleted, the family faced eviction from their home—on top of the unimaginable stress of their child's medical crisis. Our case manager worked closely with the family and helped coordinate support among multiple agencies across the state that had become involved in their care.



Together, we ensured the family would still have a home waiting for them when their child was finally able to leave the hospital—which they did near Christmastime. By working together, we prevented one of the most difficult experiences a family can face from becoming even more devastating through the added trauma of homelessness.

The requested funds will support the transportation and secure installation of a historically significant model railroad exhibit depicting the Laramie Engine Terminal during the steam era. The model, constructed in the United Kingdom by modeler Peter Kirmond, has been displayed at exhibitions for more than a decade and has been offered as a donation to the Laramie Railroad Depot Museum as a permanent interpretive exhibit.

Grant funds will be used in three areas. First, funds will assist with safely transporting the model from the United Kingdom to Laramie, Wyoming. This includes professional crating, international freight, customs processing, and final delivery. Because the layout contains intricate hand-built structures and mechanical components, proper packing and specialized transport are essential to ensure the exhibit arrives safely.

Second, funds will support preparation of a secure exhibit space within the Depot by installing upgraded locking hardware on the doors to the display room, ensuring controlled access and protection of the artifact.

Third, funds will allow the museum to install a small monitoring system consisting of discreet webcams to help staff monitor the exhibit area and prevent theft, vandalism, or accidental damage.

The model itself is being donated to the Laramie Railroad Depot Museum at no cost by the artist and builder. Grant funds are requested solely to cover the transportation and protective measures needed to responsibly receive and preserve the exhibit. Once installed, the layout will become a permanent interpretive exhibit that helps visitors understand the scale and complexity of Laramie's historic rail operations. It will support educational programming for school groups, enhance the museum experience for residents and tourists, and further the Depot's mission of preserving and interpreting Laramie's railroad heritage.

Funding for this project will allow the Laramie Railroad Depot Museum to preserve, protect, and publicly display a unique historical exhibit that directly interprets Laramie's railroad heritage. The donated model provides a detailed visual representation of how the Laramie Engine Terminal operated during the steam era, helping visitors understand the scale and complexity of railroad operations that shaped the community.

Once installed, the exhibit will become a permanent educational feature within the museum. It will allow visitors—including students, families, and tourists—to visualize the workings of a major railroad facility that played a critical role in Laramie's history. The exhibit will support the museum's educational programming for school groups and provide a hands-on visual learning tool that complements the Depot's existing artifacts, photographs, and historical displays.

The project will also strengthen the Depot's role as a regional cultural destination. Laramie receives visitors from across Wyoming and the Rocky Mountain region who are interested in railroad history, western expansion, and Union Pacific heritage. A permanent, professionally displayed model of the Laramie Engine Terminal will enhance the visitor experience and provide a compelling interpretive centerpiece within the museum.

For the organization, the project represents an opportunity to responsibly steward a significant donated exhibit and expand the quality of exhibits available to the public. For the community, it preserves and interprets an important part of local history while providing an engaging educational experience for residents and visitors alike.

Ultimately, the goal of this project is to ensure that this detailed historical interpretation of Laramie's railroading past can be safely brought to the community and shared with the public for many years to come.

The Laramie Railroad Depot Museum works collaboratively with a number of local organizations, businesses, and community groups to preserve and interpret Laramie’s railroad history while strengthening the cultural and educational resources available to the community.

The Depot regularly partners with the City of Laramie and Albany County Government to provide space for community meetings, cultural programming, and regional events that benefit residents and visitors. As part of its mission to serve the public, the Depot periodically provides the facility at no charge for important civic and community functions. Examples include hosting the 2026 Wyoming Association of Municipalities (WAM) conference activities organized by Albany County, supporting community events such as Brewfest, and providing space for the City of Laramie to present downtown planning initiatives and community updates to residents.

The Depot also collaborates with organizations such as Visit Laramie, local schools, and the University of Wyoming to support tourism, educational programming, and historical interpretation. These partnerships help expand access to local history while strengthening the Depot’s role as a cultural and educational resource.

To avoid duplication of efforts, the Depot maintains a clear focus on railroad history, transportation heritage, and stewardship of the historic Union Pacific passenger depot building. Other museums and historical organizations in Albany County focus on broader regional or cultural history, while the Depot specializes in interpreting Laramie’s railroad legacy. This clear mission allows the organization to complement the work of other institutions while contributing a unique historical perspective to the community.

Through these partnerships and a focused mission, the Laramie Railroad Depot Museum maximizes community impact, supports local education and tourism, and ensures resources are used efficiently to benefit residents and visitors throughout the region.

The City of Laramie and Albany County provide funding to local community partner organizations through their annual budget making processes. Organizations receiving these funds do not operate within the formal structure of city or county governments but may utilize support from these governments to achieve their missions or fund special projects. Community partner organizations generally have a strong presence within the community and provide vital services, products, or activities that serve to improve the community in a variety of ways. Only non-profit/not-for-profit entities are eligible to apply for funding. For-profit entities are ineligible.

Historically, organizations requesting funding fall within the following three categories:

***Recreational/Arts and Culture:*** These organizations exist to promote, sustain, and develop recreational, cultural, and leisure activities within the community. These organizations may also sponsor educational and community events and celebrations designed to encourage a diverse cultural and active lifestyle while promoting a strong sense of community.

***Social Services:*** The primary objective of these organizations is to support or engage in activities designed to enhance the wellbeing of individuals and families within the community. These organizations provide a variety of services that focus on basic human needs, access to programs and services designed to maintain human dignity and health, and the overall welfare of citizens.

***Civic Organizations/Quasi-Governmental:*** These organizations have been established within our community to A) work for the overall improvement, advancement, and economic health through civic involvement, economic development initiatives, and fostering community spirit; or B) provide services, programs and other opportunities for the betterment of the community through the organization of Joint Powers Boards or other Quasi-Governmental Organizations that work collaboratively with the City of Laramie and/or Albany County on shared goals, concerns, and interests.

This Community Partner Funding is available from funds collected via Albany County's 5th Penny Tax and historically has funded approximately \$250,000 in County requests and \$235,000 in City requests. In their sole discretion, the City and County each reserve the right to waive any informality in any application and/or reject any application.

Organizations can submit a request to both the City and County. If an organization is awarded funding, the organization is solely responsible for its costs including, but not limited to, operations, personnel, taxes,

maintenance, and insurance coverage against public liability and property damage.

**Priority of requests is as follows:**

- Requests that improve the community.
- Requests that are not more than 20% of organization's general operating budget and do not exceed \$20,000 each from City or County.
- Requests to either City or County that are less than 20% of organization's general operating budget but in excess of \$20,000 are considered on a case by case basis and may affect the priority of the organization's request.
- Demonstration of multiple revenue sources for organization.
- The number of people served by organization.
- Clear identification of those who benefit from the organization's work.
- Demonstration of the organization's partnership with other organizations in the community.
- Requests that do not duplicate efforts already existing in the community.

Funds provided with this grant would be used for our Back2School Event and supporting events in Laramie. Last year, New Life Church handed this event over to For the Good of Laramie. This year will be our 9th annual event! Last year we served over 1200 people, giving out over 400 backpacks and 400 pairs of shoes. Each year, this event grows exponentially. This year, we are expecting to give out 450 backpacks and 450 pairs of shoes for free to those who attend. Funds would be allocated to age appropriate backpacks and age appropriate school supplies. They would also be allocated to candy donations to Easter Egg Hunts and Trunk or Treats, assisting Laramie Connections Church with their weekly meals, and Night to Shine. Night to Shine is a prom style event for individuals with special needs and disabilities. This event is locked in every year through 2029. In 2024, Skate Laramie purchased land with a bold but achievable vision: constructing a 4000 square foot indoor Skatepark with an additional 1000 square feet dedicated to community gathering space.

This facility will:

- Provided structured after school programming in a safe environment.
- Offer mentorship and positive youth development opportunities.
- Host summer camps, blending skating, art, and creative expression.
- Serve university students and adults seeking recreation, fitness and connection.
- Provide a welcoming, substance free social space during Laramie's long winter months.

This project is not simply a Skatepark. It is a youth development center built around recreation, creativity and community.

Skate Laramie has completed a comprehensive business plan, architectural drawings and feasibility planning to ensure operational sustainability and long-term success.

Because the organization owns the land, it can manage overhead responsibly while maintaining affordable access for the community.

Funding from the city of Laramie and Albany County will be used directly toward the completion of the capital campaign needed to construct the indoor facility. Early governmental investment provides both financial momentum and community validation, demonstrating that local leadership recognizes the importance of year-round recreation space for Albany County and Laramie residents.

As of early March, our feasibility study and silent campaign have secured a \$250,000 matching commitment toward our \$500,000 campaign goal, along with \$16,000 in additional commitments. We have submitted a \$50,000 request to ACRB and are actively pursuing additional major gifts and grant funding.

Our goal is to secure 70% of project funding before launching the public phase of this campaign. Community Partner Support will help close the remaining funding gap and allow Skate Laramie to move forward with construction of this long needed year-round community resource.

Skate parks are among the most accessible forms of recreation available. With only a skateboard or scooter, young people can enter a community that values, perseverance, creativity, resilience, and mutual respect. Skaters learn from one another, develop independence, and build confidence through practice, failure, and persistence.

Each winter, our volunteers shovel the 12,000 ft.<sup>2</sup> Laramie Skatepark simply to keep the space usable during the brief hours above freezing. As one volunteer, put it, "if you shovel, they will come, but only for a few minutes."

When winter eliminates access, participation drops dramatically. Youth lose a healthy outlet to recreation and social connection, and some drift toward less positive environments. For decades, Laramie's young people have voiced the same need: year-round recreational space that provides structure, belonging, and positive activity during the winter months.

The proposed indoor skatepark will provide a permanent solution.

Skate Laramie's goal is to create a year-round community hub that supports youth development, physical activity, and social connection. The skate community already functions as a powerful, informal support network, particularly for youth who may feel marginalized in traditional athletics or school activities. Mentorship, shared learning, and creative expression, our central to skate culture.

With a permanent indoor facility, Skate Laramie will expand existing programs, offer consistent winter programming, and increase access for youth and families across Albany County.

We envision the space becoming a second home for many young people: a safe, accessible, and welcoming environment, where they can recreate, build friendships, and grow.

We also collaborate with the university of Wyoming skate club, which helps connect university students with the broader community and contributes volunteer leadership for events and programming.

## 1. Executive Summary

**Organization:** Skate Laramie

**Legal Status:** 501(c)(3) Non-Profit Organization

**Location:** South Kiowa Street 132'x125' lot between 287 and Ft. Sanders Rd.

**Mission:** Educate and empower through wheeled sports

**Vision:** A thriving, sustainable training facility and community hub. Space that empowers at-risk youth, engages young adults and connects Albany County residents through recreation, mentorship and shared experience.

**History:** Since 2014 Skate Laramie founders have focused on making outdoor recreation accessible and fun. 2026 will be our 12th season offering free learn to skate programming. This training facility is our 6th infrastructure upgrade to Albany county's wheeled sports offerings. We have spearheaded over \$350K in infrastructure investment and have volunteered thousands of hours teaching and building this community.

### Why this?

**Mission:** Wyoming is the best place for outdoor recreation. Many of our favorite sports have prohibitive costs of entry as well as safe practices that need to be taught. The skatepark is the most accessible and cost effective outdoor recreation for those traditionally left out of these spaces. We are creating a pathway for at risk and low income youth of our community to access

Several deterrents endemic to public spaces counteract our goals.

1. Uncontrollable elements: Weather and People. Our high altitude location leads to long cold winters and limits our ability to offer sustained outdoor programming throughout the year. 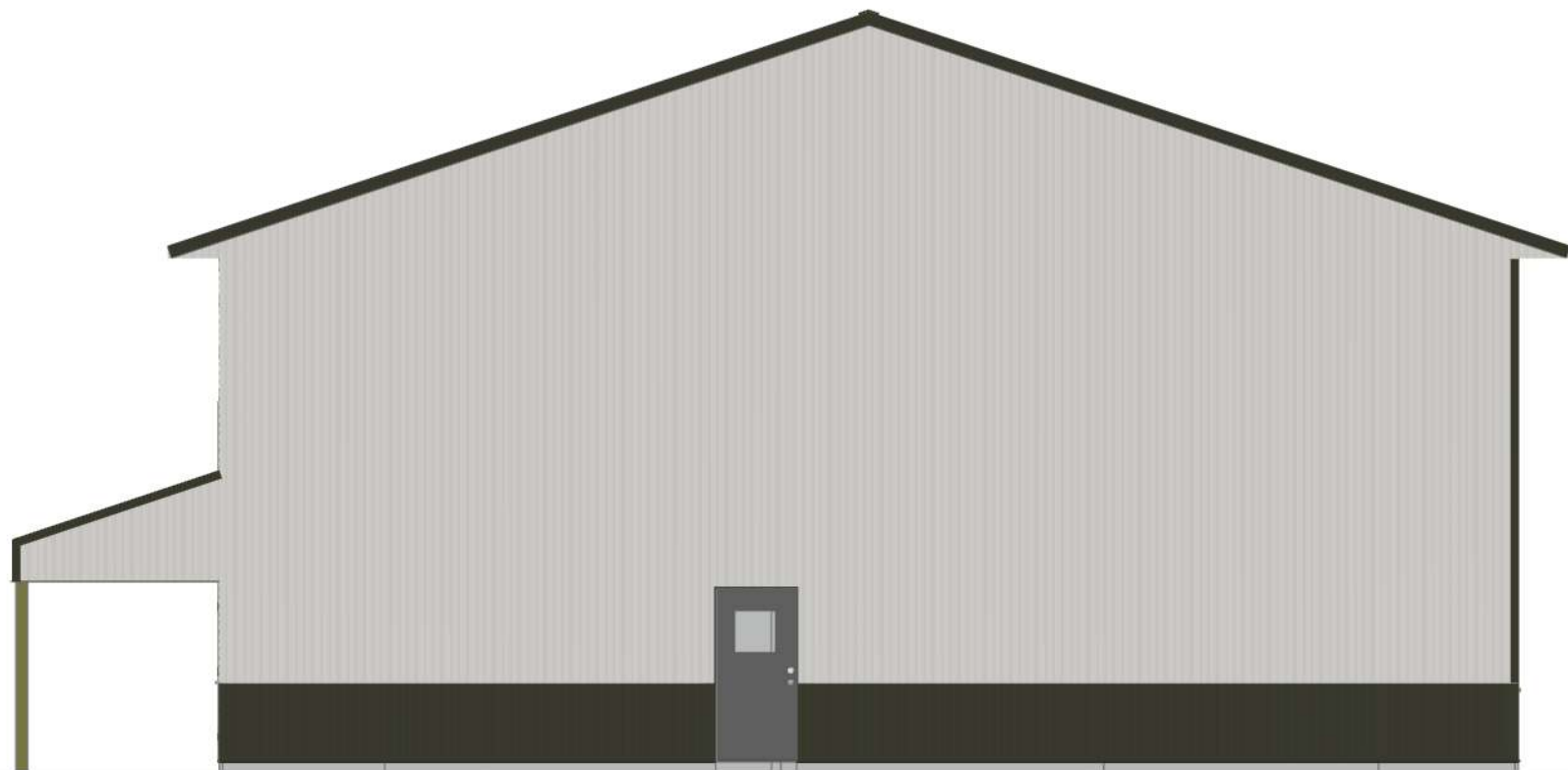

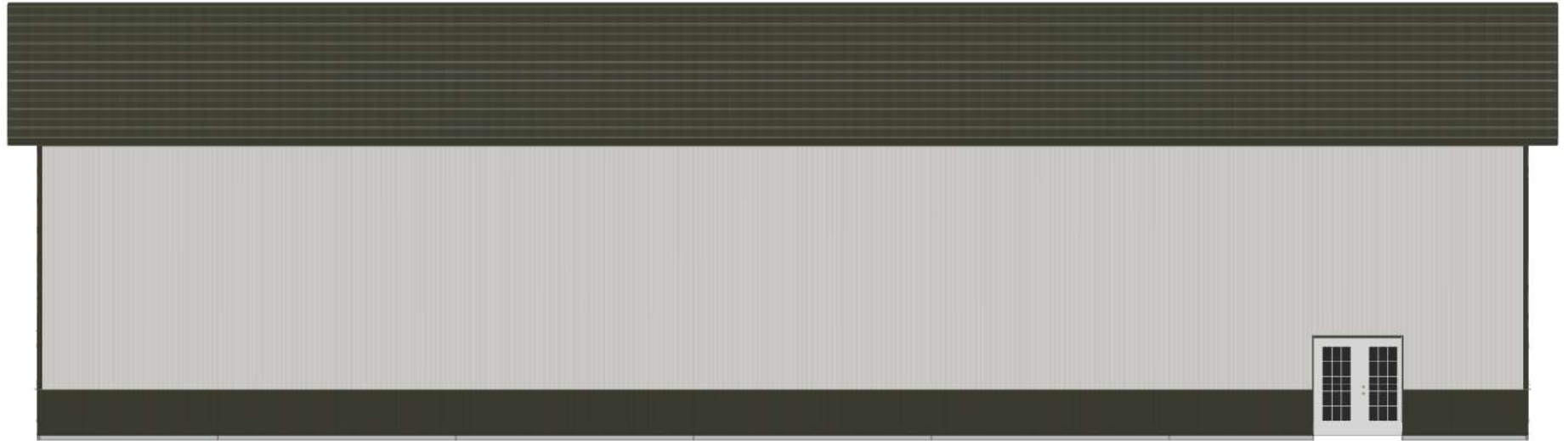

The City of Laramie and Albany County provide funding to local community partner organizations through their annual budget making processes. Organizations receiving these funds do not operate within the formal structure of city or county governments but may utilize support from these governments to achieve their missions or fund special projects. Community partner organizations generally have a strong presence within the community and provide vital services, products, or activities that serve to improve the community in a variety of ways. Only non-profit/not-for-profit entities are eligible to apply for funding. For-profit entities are ineligible.

Historically, organizations requesting funding fall within the following three categories:

***Recreational/Arts and Culture:*** These organizations exist to promote, sustain, and develop recreational, cultural, and leisure activities within the community. These organizations may also sponsor educational and community events and celebrations designed to encourage a diverse cultural and active lifestyle while promoting a strong sense of community.

***Social Services:*** The primary objective of these organizations is to support or engage in activities designed to enhance the wellbeing of individuals and families within the community. These organizations provide a variety of services that focus on basic human needs, access to programs and services designed to maintain human dignity and health, and the overall welfare of citizens.

***Civic Organizations/Quasi-Governmental:*** These organizations have been established within our community to A) work for the overall improvement, advancement, and economic health through civic involvement, economic development initiatives, and fostering community spirit; or B) provide services, programs and other opportunities for the betterment of the community through the organization of Joint Powers Boards or other Quasi-Governmental Organizations that work collaboratively with the City of Laramie and/or Albany County on shared goals, concerns, and interests.

This Community Partner Funding is available from funds collected via Albany County's 5th Penny Tax and historically has funded approximately \$250,000 in County requests and \$235,000 in City requests. In their sole discretion, the City and County each reserve the right to waive any informality in any application and/or reject any application.

Organizations can submit a request to both the City and County. If an organization is awarded funding, the organization is solely responsible for its costs including, but not limited to, operations, personnel, taxes,

maintenance, and insurance coverage against public liability and property damage.

**Priority of requests is as follows:**

- Requests that improve the community.
- Requests that are not more than 20% of organization's general operating budget and do not exceed \$20,000 each from City or County.
- Requests to either City or County that are less than 20% of organization's general operating budget but in excess of \$20,000 are considered on a case by case basis and may affect the priority of the organization's request.
- Demonstration of multiple revenue sources for organization.
- The number of people served by organization.
- Clear identification of those who benefit from the organization's work.
- Demonstration of the organization's partnership with other organizations in the community.
- Requests that do not duplicate efforts already existing in the community.

For-profit entities are not eligible to apply. Only non-profit/not-for-profit entities are eligible to apply for funding.

Community Partner funding will offset the wages of the Downtown Clinic's (Clinic) part-time Primary Care Provider (PCP). The PCP ensures Albany County's most vulnerable residents, those facing poverty and living without insurance, have access to high-quality healthcare. By providing vital and trust-based access, the PCP serves as a consistent healthcare provider to those in our community unable to afford care and this service produces better health outcomes and improved community health. This position delivers comprehensive clinical management, including end-to-end diagnosis and complex testing, while treating clients as partners by developing care plans through education and mutual agreement. For those facing historical barriers to healthcare, the PCP serves as a stabilizing force by utilizing motivational interviewing and shared decision-making to foster the therapeutic relationships essential for long-term chronic condition management.

Beyond the exam room, the PCP provides integrated case management by bridging clinical care and social support, managing referrals and follow-ups to ensure no patient falls through the cracks. The PCP must possess an elevated level of technological sophistication; she is required to navigate electronic health records and use telehealth and virtual interpretation platforms to remove language and mobility barriers. The Clinic's PCP also provides vital operational leadership, as she consults on process changes and healthcare programs to ensure the Clinic remains innovative and client centered.

The systemic and economic value of this position is significant; by managing acute and chronic issues, the PCP increases treatment adherence and reduces costly, non-emergent emergency room utilization. This work directly lowers the uncompensated care burden at the local hospital, strengthening its financial bottom line and helping to stabilize health insurance premiums for the entire community. Currently, the Clinic PCP has no designated funding, relying solely on general fund donations, to offset the PCP's daily wages. Community Partner funding will help provide the stability needed to maintain this critical healthcare safety net, improving the quality of life for Albany County's most vulnerable people and families, while benefiting the health of the community.

Community Partner funding will offset a portion of the wages of the Downtown Clinic's (Clinic) part-time Primary Care Provider (PCP), helping to secure a critical healthcare safety net for Albany County's most vulnerable residents. Currently, the Clinic relies entirely on fundraising, donations, and competitive grants to cover operations, yet few grants permit funding for essential staff wages. Community Partner funding support will provide the stable financial foundation necessary to maintain a 6% year-over-year growth in patient appointments and ensure that those facing poverty or lack of insurance do not suffer from preventable health conditions.

By providing a consistent source of care, the Clinic's PCP drives measurable improvements in client health. The Clinic's PCP has played an integral role in the number of completed appointments, and the Clinic is likely to add an additional two hundred in-clinic appointments. The PCP's presence reduces delayed care, which prevents the progression of disease severity and permanent physical damage. For clients, this stability leads to less time missed from work, reduced personal stress, and stronger family ties. When patients feel supported and healthy, they are more consistent workers and reliable wage-earners, which strengthens the local economy.

The systemic and economic impact of this role reaches the entire community. By managing acute and chronic illnesses within the Clinic, the PCP significantly reduces costly, non-emergent emergency room utilization and uncompensated care at local pay for service healthcare entities. Protecting the hospital's and other healthcare clinic's financial bottom line helps mitigate the charity care costs that are often passed on to the public through higher health insurance premiums.

Community Partner funding will help support the Clinic's operational budget while providing the leadership needed to keep the Clinic innovative and client centered. Offsetting a piece of the Clinic's PCP's wages is an investment in a more financially stable local healthcare system and healthier, more resilient neighbors and families in Albany County

For 27 years, the Downtown Clinic has provided high-quality care to Albany County by utilizing a broad definition of health that integrates traditional healthcare clinical services with the social determinants of health. By viewing food, housing, connection, and transportation as essential medical supports, the Clinic ensures that vulnerable neighbors and families receive holistic care. Central to this mission is a determined effort to avoid duplicating existing services. Through formal operating agreements with both nonprofit and for-profit entities, the Clinic fills specific community gaps, negotiating reduced-rate services to ensure scarce resources are deployed effectively.

This collaborative strategy is driven by a robust Social Work Program and an active presence in the local nonprofit community. Clinic staff and volunteers routinely attend monthly coordination meetings and conduct annual site visits to partner agencies. These relationships foster innovation and ensure that the Clinic’s internal programming, made possible by dedicated volunteers and staff members, complements rather than competes with other local resources. This integrated approach allows the Clinic to navigate the complex healthcare system while serving those experiencing poverty and without access to care.

The impact of this model is both measurable and deeply personal. In 2025 alone, the Clinic provided over 3,300 in-clinic visits and dispensed 4,200 prescriptions at no cost, delivering over \$1 million in healthcare services to Albany County. However, the Clinic’s true value is found in qualitative outcomes: the relief of a patient whose chronic pain is finally managed or the resolution of a debilitating dental infection. By maintaining fidelity to these individual success stories while driving systemic efficiency, the Clinic remains a vital partner in the community healthcare safety net.

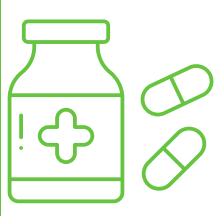

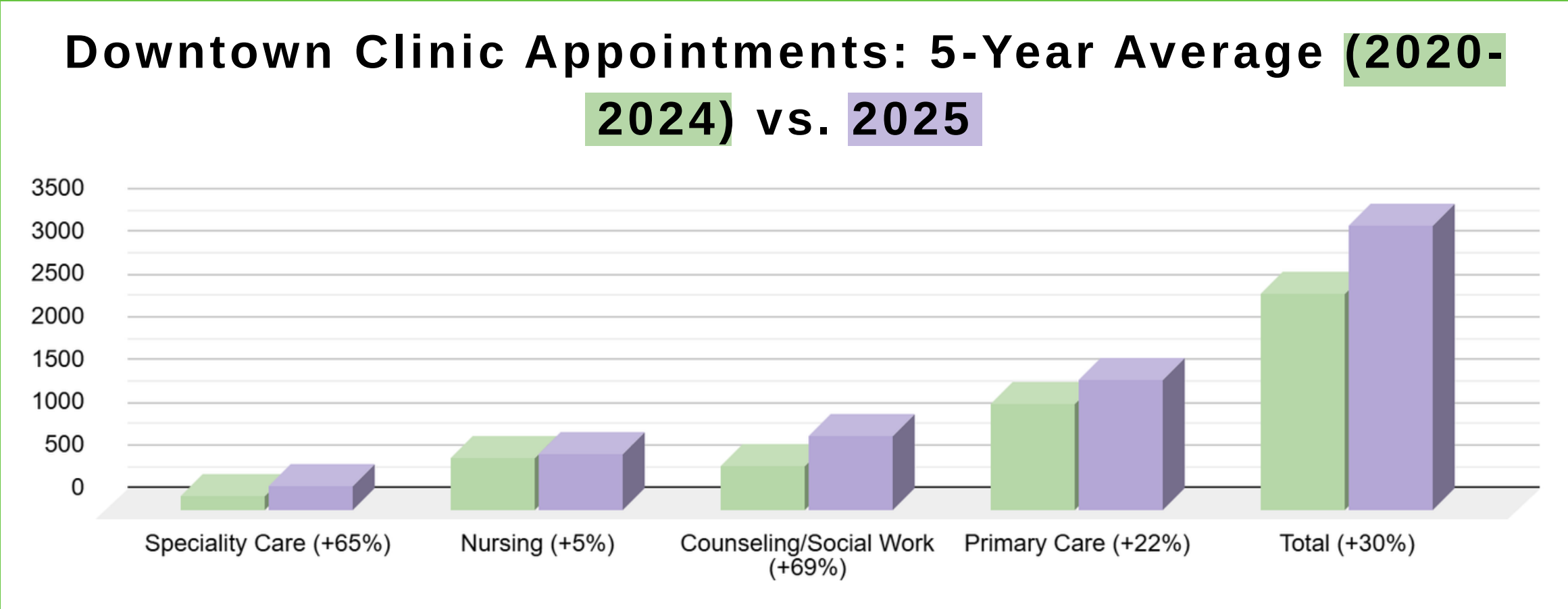

The City of Laramie and Albany County provide funding to local community partner organizations through their annual budget making processes. Organizations receiving these funds do not operate within the formal structure of city or county governments but may utilize support from these governments to achieve their missions or fund special projects. Community partner organizations generally have a strong presence within the community and provide vital services, products, or activities that serve to improve the community in a variety of ways. Only non-profit/not-for-profit entities are eligible to apply for funding. For-profit entities are ineligible.

Historically, organizations requesting funding fall within the following three categories:

***Recreational/Arts and Culture:*** These organizations exist to promote, sustain, and develop recreational, cultural, and leisure activities within the community. These organizations may also sponsor educational and community events and celebrations designed to encourage a diverse cultural and active lifestyle while promoting a strong sense of community.

***Social Services:*** The primary objective of these organizations is to support or engage in activities designed to enhance the wellbeing of individuals and families within the community. These organizations provide a variety of services that focus on basic human needs, access to programs and services designed to maintain human dignity and health, and the overall welfare of citizens.

***Civic Organizations/Quasi-Governmental:*** These organizations have been established within our community to A) work for the overall improvement, advancement, and economic health through civic involvement, economic development initiatives, and fostering community spirit; or B) provide services, programs and other opportunities for the betterment of the community through the organization of Joint Powers Boards or other Quasi-Governmental Organizations that work collaboratively with the City of Laramie and/or Albany County on shared goals, concerns, and interests.

This Community Partner Funding is available from funds collected via Albany County's 5th Penny Tax and historically has funded approximately \$250,000 in County requests and \$235,000 in City requests. In their sole discretion, the City and County each reserve the right to waive any informality in any application and/or reject any application.

Organizations can submit a request to both the City and County. If an organization is awarded funding, the organization is solely responsible for its costs including, but not limited to, operations, personnel, taxes,

maintenance, and insurance coverage against public liability and property damage.

**Priority of requests is as follows:**

- Requests that improve the community.
- Requests that are not more than 20% of organization's general operating budget and do not exceed \$20,000 each from City or County.
- Requests to either City or County that are less than 20% of organization's general operating budget but in excess of \$20,000 are considered on a case by case basis and may affect the priority of the organization's request.
- Demonstration of multiple revenue sources for organization.
- The number of people served by organization.
- Clear identification of those who benefit from the organization's work.
- Demonstration of the organization's partnership with other organizations in the community.
- Requests that do not duplicate efforts already existing in the community.

For-profit entities are not eligible to apply. Only non-profit/not-for-profit entities are eligible to apply for funding.

Wyoming Singer-Songwriters (WYSS) is requesting funding for the 2nd Annual Snow Train Music Festival, which will take place in Laramie over a (non-football game) weekend in October 2026. Similar to last year, this event will feature over 100 Wyoming-based/connected artists on a dozen stages in venues throughout downtown Laramie. Last year, the event featured a return by Wyoming-native and GRAMMY Award-winning bluegrass bassist, Shelby Means. Similarly, this year, Wyoming Singer-Songwriters hopes to have the necessary funding to invite another acclaimed and Wyoming-connected headlining artist. In addition to featuring nationally successful artists, Snow Train Music festival provides opportunities to showcase local and regional musicians and bands as they build their careers or passion. Snow Train Music Festival is a weekend-long event that includes family-friendly venues (such as the Train Depot and St. Matthew Episcopal Church) and late night venues, making it accessible and open to all. Funding for this event would cover the venue rentals, sound engineers and staff required to run each stage, the cost of scheduling, marketing and promotion, but mostly funding will be distributed to the artists performing.

Wyoming Singer-Songwriters (WYSS) seeks to address the lack of resources, opportunities and community connection for aspiring singer-songwriters and musicians in Wyoming so that they can develop their talent and contribute to Wyoming's unique and creative culture. Snow Train Music Festival is one way that WYSS seeks to accomplish its mission: by providing opportunities for musicians and fostering a regional music scene for the entire community to enjoy. WYSS believes that diverse story-telling and community-building through the art of songwriting is a powerful vehicle for not only understanding, celebrating, and growing Wyoming's unique culture and heritage, but essential for a strong, vibrant, pluralistic society. Last year, the first Snow Train Music Festival surpassed the organization's expectations regarding ticket sales, audience sizes, and general public reception. It became clear that there is a great desire and need for more music-centered community festivals like Snow Train, and WYSS is committed to meeting that need. This year, WYSS hopes to replicate the success of last year by drawing even larger audiences to each venue and making it more accessible by lowering the cost of tickets. This is only possible with the support of grants and funding. In addition, WYSS hopes that Snow Train will support the local economy by becoming an attraction for new and returning tourists from the region.

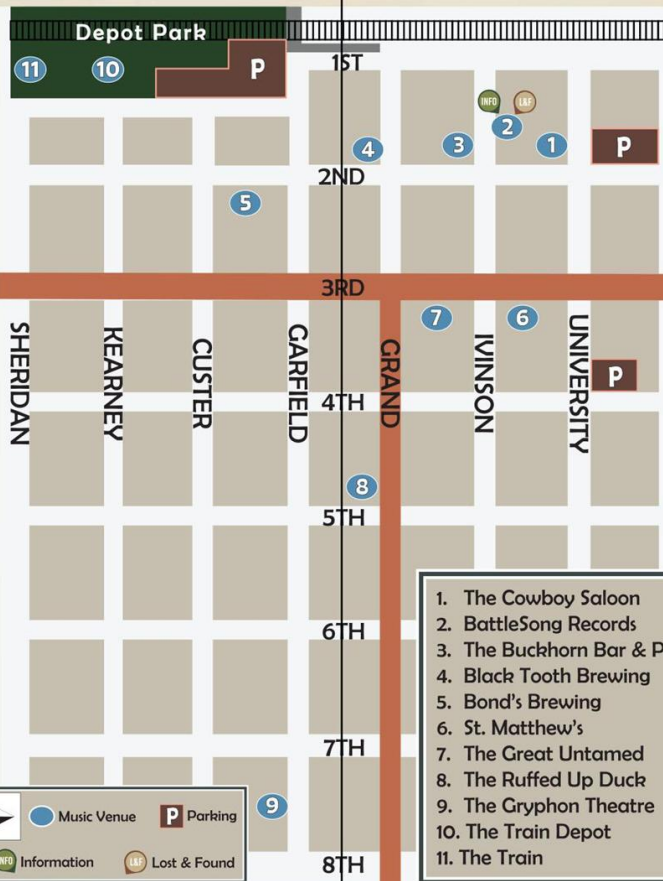

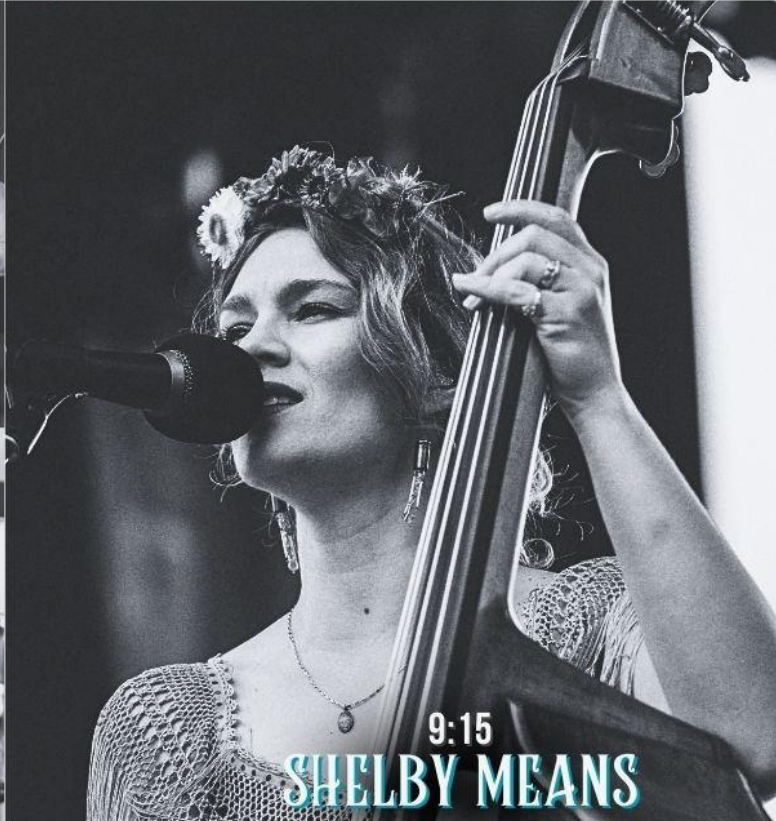

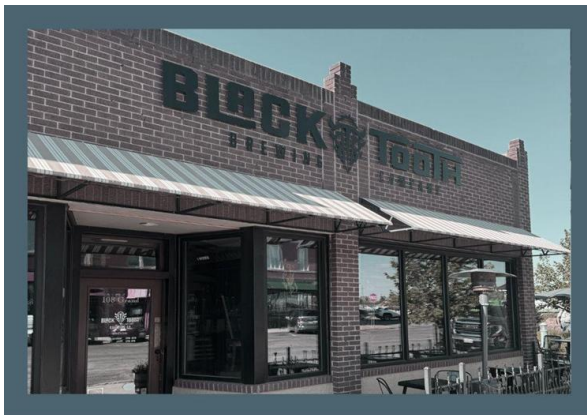

# Albany County and City of Laramie Community Partner Organization Funding Request Application FY2027

**ALL APPLICATIONS ARE DUE ON OR BEFORE 5:00 P.M. ON WEDNESDAY, MARCH 11TH 2026 AND WILL ONLY BE CONSIDERED IF ALL PREVIOUS FINAL REPORTS HAVE BEEN COMPLETED.**

The City of Laramie and Albany County provide funding to local community partner organizations through their annual budget making processes. Organizations receiving these funds do not operate within the formal structure of city or county governments but may utilize support from these governments to achieve their missions or fund special projects. Community partner organizations generally have a strong presence within the community and provide vital services, products, or activities that serve to improve the community in a variety of ways. Only non-profit/not-for-profit entities are eligible to apply for funding. For-profit entities are ineligible.

Historically, organizations requesting funding fall within the following three categories:

***Recreational/Arts and Culture:*** These organizations exist to promote, sustain, and develop recreational, cultural, and leisure activities within the community. These organizations may also sponsor educational and community events and celebrations designed to encourage a diverse cultural and active lifestyle while promoting a strong sense of community.

***Social Services:*** The primary objective of these organizations is to support or engage in activities designed to enhance the wellbeing of individuals and families within the community. These organizations provide a variety of services that focus on basic human needs, access to programs and services designed to maintain human dignity and health, and the overall welfare of citizens.

***Civic Organizations/Quasi-Governmental:*** These organizations have been established within our community to A) work for the overall improvement, advancement, and economic health through civic involvement, economic development initiatives, and fostering community spirit; or B) provide services, programs and other opportunities for the betterment of the community through the organization of Joint Powers Boards or other Quasi-Governmental Organizations that work collaboratively with the City of Laramie and/or Albany County on shared goals, concerns, and interests.

This Community Partner Funding is available from funds collected via Albany County's 5th Penny Tax and historically has funded approximately \$250,000 in County requests and \$235,000 in City requests. In their sole discretion, the City and County each reserve the right to waive any informality in any application and/or reject any application.

Organizations can submit a request to both the City and County. If an organization is awarded funding, the organization is solely responsible for its costs including, but not limited to, operations, personnel, taxes,

maintenance, and insurance coverage against public liability and property damage.

**Priority of requests is as follows:**

- Requests that improve the community.
- Requests that are not more than 20% of organization's general operating budget and do not exceed \$20,000 each from City or County.
- Requests to either City or County that are less than 20% of organization's general operating budget but in excess of \$20,000 are considered on a case by case basis and may affect the priority of the organization's request.
- Demonstration of multiple revenue sources for organization.
- The number of people served by organization.
- Clear identification of those who benefit from the organization's work.
- Demonstration of the organization's partnership with other organizations in the community.
- Requests that do not duplicate efforts already existing in the community.

For-profit entities are not eligible to apply. Only non-profit/not-for-profit entities are eligible to apply for funding.

**City:** Laramie City Council intends to make its preliminary funding decisions in early to mid-April 2026 and final funding decisions will be announced upon adoption of the City's FY2026/2027 Budget in June 2026. The City's award payments to successful organizations will be made on or around August 1, 2026, pending receipt of the fully executed agreement.

**County:** The Albany County Commissioners make their final funding decisions upon the adoption of the County's FY2026/2027 Budget in June 2026. Agreements will be sent to successful organizations in July 2026. Pending the County's receipt of the fully executed Agreement, the County's award payments to successful organizations will only be made on a reimbursement basis.

All information on this form and all requested documentation must be complete and submitted before the application will be considered. Applications that are incomplete or are missing required materials may be rejected. The grant request submitted to Albany County and City of Laramie Community Partner Organization Funding for FY2027 is for quality-of-life improvements at the Hospice of Laramie facility and for the patients under our care. Hospice provides end-of-life care in both the six-bed inpatient facility and out in the community (patients' homes, nursing home, and assisted living).

Presently, the kitchen is stocked with appliances, cookware, and tableware's that have been generously donated from individuals over the ~10 years that the Hospice House has been open. While the Hospitality Specialist (the employee who prepares the weekly meals) has made do; streamlined, commercial quality items would provide increased food safety, ease of preparation, and overall improved appearance of the kitchen facilities.

This grant will specifically cover eight (8) different areas aimed at improving the quality of life for the Hospice of Laramie team and the patients served. These eight areas include kitchen equipment, cookware, prep ware, tableware, kitchen accessories, adaptive supplies, outside spaces, and miscellaneous. In the creation of these categories, staff made a full inventory of current kitchen supplies and determined a reasonable list of items needing replacement. From there, high quality and highly rated replacements were determined and that is what has been quoted as part of this grant application.

While it would be possible to go line by line the purchases that Hospice of Laramie intends to make if awarded this grant (please see Project Budget for line-item view), all the items will provide value added to patient experience in the Hospice House facility and to patients in the community. Melamine dinnerware provides unbreakable food safe eating surfaces, lidded plastic tumblers provide spill proof drinking, adaptive tools promote prolonged independence, outdoor upgrades provide beautification and safe outdoor spaces to be enjoyed, battery powered essential oil diffusers provide comfort, and luggage hand trucks make facility move in and supply deliveries easier for patient families and staff.

All these items will go a long way in improving the quality of life for the staff employed at Hospice of Laramie and the patients that are served here. Whether through a homemade meal in the hospice kitchen, supporting independent eating for an individual, or giving space to enjoy the outside these items provide comfort, joy, and harmony to the Hospice House facility.

With this grant funding, Hospice of Laramie hopes to see a benefit to three areas. Patient autonomy, safety of the facility, and ease/quality of food preparation. Patient autonomy and support of desires are areas that hospice works to support during a patient's journey. Desire to continue being able to feed themselves, drink their own beverages, and communicate with family and friends are all common themes the staff see among patients. While it is clear how adaptive supplies (silverware, bowls/plates, and cups) might provide this, even unbreakable traditional plates can provide a huge amount of dignity and self sufficiency to patients. Bright colored plates that aren't tan or white are also important as the food is easier to see and are enjoyed by those with visual impairment. The safety of the facility will mainly be improved with new cookware, prep ware, and supplies. By seeking out commercial kitchen quality, items should have a long-life span and stackable items reduce risks of falling out of the cabinets or clogging drawers. It is a goal of Hospice of Laramie to keep the kitchen inviting but also maintain food safety and ease of use. Lastly, by making food prep easier with items like prep bowls that fit needs, the quality of the food can be increased and maintained by decreasing time to accomplish tasks, provide safe and reasonable tools for each job, and suitable serving solutions. It would be the goal of Hospice of Laramie to complete all purchases and upgrades within sixty (60) days of grant award to get these quality-of-life upgrades into place as quickly as possible.

Hospice of Laramie has numerous partnerships in the community that provide value to patients and their families. Non-profits organizations including the Laramie Soup Kitchen (provides food items to supplement in house meals for patients), Eppson Center (a partner in DME 'rental' and storage), Laramie Interfaith (commonly referenced to patients/families by a social worker), Wyoming 211 (assistance with referrals and a common resource for social work), and United Way (Hospice of Laramie is a proud partner agency) provide immeasurable value to our patients/families and staff who rely on these services for resources and references when working with families. Additionally, Hospice of Laramie works with Laramie Health and Rehab, Spring Wind Assisted Living, Ivinson Hospital, Regency Retirement Community, Downtown Clinic, and local doctors' offices for referrals to hospice care and support through that journey. Hospice of Laramie is also supported by a strong team of community volunteers who do a variety of tasks including making meals, talking with patients, skilled volunteer work (PT/OT, Pharmacist, Nutritionist), playing the piano or other music, and cleaning/tidying around the facility or in patients' homes. A special partnership is one shared with Developmental Preschool. As next-door neighbors, Hospice has been fortunate to work with Developmental Preschool to provide opportunities for joy, learning, and laughter. Events like easter egg hunts, Halloween trick-or-treating, and holiday singing have provided so much value to Hospice's patients and staff.

Organizations receiving these funds do not operate within the formal structure of city or county governments but may utilize support from these governments to achieve their missions or fund special projects. Community partner organizations generally have a strong presence within the community and provide vital services, products, or activities that serve to improve the community in a variety of ways. Only non-profit/not-for-profit entities are eligible to apply for funding. For-profit entities are ineligible.

Historically, organizations requesting funding fall within the following three categories:

***Recreational/Arts and Culture:*** These organizations exist to promote, sustain, and develop recreational, cultural, and leisure activities within the community. These organizations may also sponsor educational and community events and celebrations designed to encourage a diverse cultural and active lifestyle while promoting a strong sense of community.

***Social Services:*** The primary objective of these organizations is to support or engage in activities designed to enhance the wellbeing of individuals and families within the community. These organizations provide a variety of services that focus on basic human needs, access to programs and services designed to maintain human dignity and health, and the overall welfare of citizens.

***Civic Organizations/Quasi-Governmental:*** These organizations have been established within our community to A) work for the overall improvement, advancement, and economic health through civic involvement, economic development initiatives, and fostering community spirit; or B) provide services, programs and other opportunities for the betterment of the community through the organization of Joint Powers Boards or other Quasi-Governmental Organizations that work collaboratively with the City of Laramie and/or Albany County on shared goals, concerns, and interests.

This Community Partner Funding is available from funds collected via Albany County's 5th Penny Tax and historically has funded approximately \$250,000 in County requests and \$235,000 in City requests. In their sole discretion, the City and County each reserve the right to waive any informality in any application and/or reject any application.

Organizations can submit a request to both the City and County. If an organization is awarded funding, the organization is solely responsible for its costs including, but not limited to, operations, personnel, taxes,

maintenance, and insurance coverage against public liability and property damage.

**Priority of requests is as follows:**

- Requests that improve the community.
- Requests that are not more than 20% of organization's general operating budget and do not exceed \$20,000 each from City or County.
- Requests to either City or County that are less than 20% of organization's general operating budget but in excess of \$20,000 are considered on a case by case basis and may affect the priority of the organization's request.
- Demonstration of multiple revenue sources for organization.
- The number of people served by organization.
- Clear identification of those who benefit from the organization's work.
- Demonstration of the organization's partnership with other organizations in the community.
- Requests that do not duplicate efforts already existing in the community.

For-profit entities are not eligible to apply. Only non-profit/not-for-profit entities are eligible to apply for funding.

The VITA program is volunteer based through a collaboration with the University of Wyoming's Accounting Dept, so funding we receive allows us to rent a space that is big enough for our growing group, is ADA compliant and easily accessible for the elderly. It is heated and has an internet connection that allows for multiple tables to operate simultaneously. Funding also allows us to replace one or two laptops each year as they become older and obsolete. We go through several toner kits each year and it has allowed us to replace an older and well-used printer. Funding also allows us to keep routine supplies on hand as well as a great deal of paper.

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Describe the positive effects and benefits the requested funds would provide to the organization and the community, including goals the organization hopes to accomplish. \*

The VITA program eases the financial burden of a mandatory, annual cost. The average cost of a basic tax preparation is about \$200, and offering this service at no cost to clients means a savings of well over \$100,000. Those dollars are now able to be spent on basic necessities like food, rent, and childcare. VITA clinics are held in the evenings and on the weekends to accommodate working individuals with an average of seventeen clinics offered each year. Each clinic is four hours long and with the program's positive outcomes, more students have volunteered each year. A few years ago, the program worked with eight volunteers and this year we are up to twenty-four students. The students appreciate getting hands-on experience and learn in real time what tax preparation is like, and then return to the next year's class and encourage students to sign up to volunteer at VITA.

Describe your organization's partnerships with other organizations in the community and how your organization avoids duplication of efforts while carrying out impactful work in your service area. \*

Currently, we do not know of any other programs offering free tax prep for low income families and individuals in Albany County. We partner with the University of Wyoming as well as offer support other nonprofits by paying rent to the Lincoln Community Center. We send out flyers to our nonprofit group so they can offer the information to their guests and clients. We have partnered with Eppson Center for Seniors to offer a specific "Senior's Tax Day" which has been very successful. We would like to begin a small traveling team in order to accommodate other businesses in town that are unable to transfer their residents to our facility, such as Laramie Health and Rehab.

The City of Laramie and Albany County provide funding to local community partner organizations through their annual budget making processes. Organizations receiving these funds do not operate within the formal structure of city or county governments but may utilize support from these governments to achieve their missions or fund special projects. Community partner organizations generally have a strong presence within the community and provide vital services, products, or activities that serve to improve the community in a variety of ways. Only non-profit/not-for-profit entities are eligible to apply for funding. For-profit entities are ineligible.

Historically, organizations requesting funding fall within the following three categories:

***Recreational/Arts and Culture:*** These organizations exist to promote, sustain, and develop recreational, cultural, and leisure activities within the community. These organizations may also sponsor educational and community events and celebrations designed to encourage a diverse cultural and active lifestyle while promoting a strong sense of community.

***Social Services:*** The primary objective of these organizations is to support or engage in activities designed to enhance the wellbeing of individuals and families within the community. These organizations provide a variety of services that focus on basic human needs, access to programs and services designed to maintain human dignity and health, and the overall welfare of citizens.

***Civic Organizations/Quasi-Governmental:*** These organizations have been established within our community to A) work for the overall improvement, advancement, and economic health through civic involvement, economic development initiatives, and fostering community spirit; or B) provide services, programs and other opportunities for the betterment of the community through the organization of Joint Powers Boards or other Quasi-Governmental Organizations that work collaboratively with the City of Laramie and/or Albany County on shared goals, concerns, and interests.

This Community Partner Funding is available from funds collected via Albany County's 5th Penny Tax and historically has funded approximately \$250,000 in County requests and \$235,000 in City requests. In their sole discretion, the City and County each reserve the right to waive any informality in any application and/or reject any application.

Organizations can submit a request to both the City and County. If an organization is awarded funding, the organization is solely responsible for its costs including, but not limited to, operations, personnel, taxes,

maintenance, and insurance coverage against public liability and property damage.

**Priority of requests is as follows:**

- Requests that improve the community.
- Requests that are not more than 20% of organization's general operating budget and do not exceed \$20,000 each from City or County.
- Requests to either City or County that are less than 20% of organization's general operating budget but in excess of \$20,000 are considered on a case by case basis and may affect the priority of the organization's request.
- Demonstration of multiple revenue sources for organization.
- The number of people served by organization.
- Clear identification of those who benefit from the organization's work.
- Demonstration of the organization's partnership with other organizations in the community.
- Requests that do not duplicate efforts already existing in the community.

For-profit entities are not eligible to apply. Only non-profit/not-for-profit entities are eligible to apply for funding.

We spend over 6,000 dollars a year on food and kitchen/ custodial supplies and utility costs. Each year we have received support from the city and county through the community partner fund to finance our vibrant meal program. Last year we started our gardening program as an adjunct to our meal program so our members could grow and eat their own produce. Through the Feeding Laramie Valley- administered USDA specialty crops grant we were able to build garden beds and a green house. From this program we ate fresh produce grown on site for our meals for many months.

With the remaining 6,000 we want to add seating and shade to our deck so more meals can be enjoyed outside, sunlight and fresh air being a great boost to the emotional wellness of people living with severe mental illness. The primary costs for this would be lumber and labor costs as well as material for the shade that needs to be taken down and put up seasonally. Additionally, the greenhouse we put up last summer did not stand up well to our Wyoming wind and snow. We would like the person who built the deck to upgrade our greenhouse to make it more sturdy, accessible, and lasting. Lastly, we want to buy a shed for storage located with the greenhouse.

Our ultimate goal is a happier, healthier Laramie. For the last 20 years Wyoming is the ONLY state in the Union to always be in the top three states for suicides per capita. This fact is shameful and we have grown so used to this tragedy that we no longer consider it a problem to fix but rather a fact of life in Wyoming. We as a state and a community MUST do better. Incorporating mental health clubhouses as nonclinical partnerships in the mental healthcare ecosystem throughout the rural communities of Wyoming WILL reduce suicides in this state and here in Laramie with operations at Robbie's House. That of course is the broad picture. Locally, we have become an important element of our community's collective wellness. We are the place that ensures no one needs to isolate. We are the place that understands and welcomes those who do not feel understood or welcomed elsewhere. Most of all, our goal is to protect the dignity of every person in Laramie, regardless of circumstances.

The positive effects and benefits of these funds are two-fold. First, we continue our meal program that has served hundreds of people thousands of meals. The meal program has the added benefit of hosting our "Lunch n Learns" wherein funding and program partners are developed and we deepen our brand recognition and community outreach. Second, we will be able to expand our operations to be more often operating outdoors with the further development of our meal program and by getting more vitamin D and fresh air during as many outdoor meals as weather will allow.

Some people have made the observation that we overlap too much with the Soup Kitchen because we both serve meals to low income individuals in Laramie. We don't see things that way. For the soup kitchen, the meal itself is the service. For us, the meal is almost secondary to the experience of the preparation and serving of the meal. The clubhouse is member-run and is only as good as its members make it. Therefore, members managing the meal program represents an opportunity for purpose, pride, and ownership.

We used to heavily use Connections to save on transportation costs. Most of our most active members did not drive. It has been a great burden losing those services. We often are approached for respite care or as a drop in center for those with cognitive disabilities. We have tried to educate the community and other local programs that our mission is focused on supporting people with emotional disabilities. With that said we are inclusive and support those with physical and/or cognitive disabilities as long as the individual has support that covers anything beyond simple accommodations. Through our Lunch n Learns we have deepened awareness and mutual goals with such entities as Feeding Laramie Valley, Voc Rehab, and the Unaccompanied Youth Initiative to name a few. Some of our most important partnerships have been local law enforcement in the form of our support of their CIT training as well as our training for Post Suicide response and our partnership with BHS at Iverson Hospital. This partnership allows us to contact patients to introduce them to our clubhouse so they have a supportive community to connect with after discharge.

The City of Laramie and Albany County provide funding to local community partner organizations through their annual budget making processes. Organizations receiving these funds do not operate within the formal structure of city or county governments but may utilize support from these governments to achieve their missions or fund special projects. Community partner organizations generally have a strong presence within the community and provide vital services, products, or activities that serve to improve the community in a variety of ways. Only non-profit/not-for-profit entities are eligible to apply for funding. For-profit entities are ineligible.

Historically, organizations requesting funding fall within the following three categories:

***Recreational/Arts and Culture:*** These organizations exist to promote, sustain, and develop recreational, cultural, and leisure activities within the community. These organizations may also sponsor educational and community events and celebrations designed to encourage a diverse cultural and active lifestyle while promoting a strong sense of community.

***Social Services:*** The primary objective of these organizations is to support or engage in activities designed to enhance the wellbeing of individuals and families within the community. These organizations provide a variety of services that focus on basic human needs, access to programs and services designed to maintain human dignity and health, and the overall welfare of citizens.

***Civic Organizations/Quasi-Governmental:*** These organizations have been established within our community to A) work for the overall improvement, advancement, and economic health through civic involvement, economic development initiatives, and fostering community spirit; or B) provide services, programs and other opportunities for the betterment of the community through the organization of Joint Powers Boards or other Quasi-Governmental Organizations that work collaboratively with the City of Laramie and/or Albany County on shared goals, concerns, and interests.

This Community Partner Funding is available from funds collected via Albany County's 5th Penny Tax and historically has funded approximately \$250,000 in County requests and \$235,000 in City requests. In their sole discretion, the City and County each reserve the right to waive any informality in any application and/or reject any application.

Organizations can submit a request to both the City and County. If an organization is awarded funding, the organization is solely responsible for its costs including, but not limited to, operations, personnel, taxes,

maintenance, and insurance coverage against public liability and property damage.

**Priority of requests is as follows:**

- Requests that improve the community.
- Requests that are not more than 20% of organization's general operating budget and do not exceed \$20,000 each from City or County.
- Requests to either City or County that are less than 20% of organization's general operating budget but in excess of \$20,000 are considered on a case by case basis and may affect the priority of the organization's request.
- Demonstration of multiple revenue sources for organization.
- The number of people served by organization.
- Clear identification of those who benefit from the organization's work.
- Demonstration of the organization's partnership with other organizations in the community.
- Requests that do not duplicate efforts already existing in the community.

For-profit entities are not eligible to apply. Only non-profit/not-for-profit entities are eligible to apply for funding.

Community Partner funds would be used to assist with personnel and program expenses to meet SAFE Project's main goal: providing fundamental services to victims/survivors of domestic violence, sexual assault, and stalking in Albany County. Advocate time is our most valuable service, so \$13,500 is requested for staff time spent on crisis, safety, and support services in person and on the 24-hour hotline, including safety planning, emergency shelter, hospital response for patients there for a sexual assault exam or due to domestic violence, help filling out and filing protection orders, court accompaniment, and more. In 2025, staff provided 2,591 services to survivors.

SAFE Project relies on volunteers to increase our program's capacity while keeping personnel costs down. For training volunteer advocates, \$1,500 is requested to fund three sessions of our 40-hour victim services training, plus central registry and background checks. We anticipate training 15-20 new volunteers to help staff the 24-hour hotline and provide services to clients by phone and in person. In 2025, volunteer advocates took 2,256 hours of hotline shifts, one volunteer spent over 100 hours picking up and delivering weekly groceries to clients in our shelter, and volunteers also met with clients at the hospital, provided shelter, and went to court.

For programs, we are requesting the following funding:

\$6,000 for weekly groceries and toiletries to clients and kids while they stay in our emergency shelter.

\$4,000 for shelter operational costs that keep the shelter safe and functional for adult clients and their kids and pets, including insurance and maintenance.

\$2,500 for outreach to share more about our services and reach more members of the community who may need our help. Our outreach efforts include brochures, newsletters, and other publications, posts and videos on social media and online, presentations to schools, organizations, and nonprofits, partnerships with the University of Wyoming, WyoTech, LCCC, and Albany County School District for student events, fairs, and orientations, tabling in the community or on campuses, partnering with the Albany County Public Library for book displays, and more.

\$2,500 promoting respect and safe relationships through prevention education with youth and young adults in local schools from pre-K through college, plus activities and camps to engage kids and teenagers starting with a basketball camp this summer.

Requested funds would benefit SAFE and the community by helping us give survivors of domestic, relationship, and family violence, sexual assault, stalking, and trafficking somewhere to turn in a crisis 24 hours/day and access to free and confidential services and resources. By providing survivors of abuse with advocacy and support while they improve their safety and work on healing and rebuilding their lives, and through awareness and education within the community to reduce and prevent violence, SAFE Project helps to make Laramie and Albany County safer.

According to a recent Uniform Crime Report, Albany County had the 5th highest number of domestic violence (DV) incidents of counties in Wyoming. DV calls are among the most frequent calls responded to by law enforcement, as well as the most dangerous for them. As the only shelter for survivors of abuse in the county, we reduce the burden to city and county law enforcement and the danger to them, victims, and neighbors by providing shelter, resources, and financial aid for housing or relocation so victims fleeing an unsafe home do not have to face homelessness. Studies show that up to 57% of homelessness among women is a result of DV. When a survivor leaves behind their home to escape an abuser, knowing a safe shelter is an option can be the difference between feeling able to leave and having no choice but to stay, and that can be a crucial step in their journey to security and independence. Our shelter gives survivors and their children and pets more than a place to sleep; it also gives them a safe place to recover from their trauma and work with advocates on their next steps, such as finding or improving employment and moving into safe, affordable housing. When our clients are able to achieve safety and financial independence with our help, that benefits the community as well as the local economy.

In 2025, we served 312 unduplicated individuals, with 65% seeking services for domestic violence (DV), 19% for sexual assault, and 16% for stalking. We also provided 3,401 bednights in our emergency shelter to 42 adults, 38 children, and 16 pets. One of our goals is to reach and serve more people who need our services. We hope to achieve additional connections through outreach, informational and awareness events, social media, and presentations to increasingly diverse groups. Progress will be measured by tracking increases in our number of outreach activities and number of unduplicated attendees.

SAFE Project collaborates with other organizations for best client outcomes and to avoid duplication of services. For example, we receive calls from people struggling with homelessness since we have a shelter, but we can only serve survivors of domestic or sexual violence or stalking. If it's a mom and children, we refer them to Family Promise, who can provide motel shelter to families, or Interfaith, who may be able to provide financial aid to avoid eviction or get into housing. On the other hand, Family Promise cannot shelter families in immediate danger, so they refer to us. This collaboration helps more women and children at risk of homelessness get help while avoiding duplication. Interfaith also will reach out or refer people to us who seek financial aid from them but also could use our services. We refer clients to Workforce Services for job searches and Climb Wyoming for job training for moms struggling to support their children with their current job prospects. We also have connections with property managers to help clients find housing. At UW, we work with the Counseling Center to place students as interns for free, on-site counseling to our clients and their children. We also team up with the UW Violence Prevention Center for our SAFE Men program to involve more male students as well as being open to men in the community. The SAFE Men program provides participants with training on domestic and sexual violence and how to be role models to men and boys and prevent gender-based violence.

Our team participates in community multidisciplinary teams. Since 2009, SAFE has been coordinating the local Sexual Assault Response Team (SART) and reviewing sexual assault and domestic violence cases with health agencies, emergency responders, law enforcement, and the justice system to improve processes and outcomes for survivors. The Sexual Assault Nurse Examiner (SANE) Program contacts us when patients are at the hospital due to sexual or domestic violence, and we work with both the Laramie Police Department and Sheriff's Office to train on trauma informed responses to improve survivor experiences. In September 2025, we brought in Jim Schmidt of the Gabby Petito Foundation – Gabby's stepdad who has 20+ years experience in emergency services as a fire officer, instructor, and emergency medical technician – to train first responders including law enforcement, EMTs, and nurses on their vital role in DV response and symptoms of strangulation.

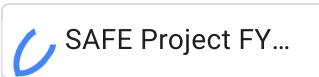

The need for emergency shelter, supportive crisis and advocacy services, and financial aid continues to rise in Albany County, and more staff and funding have been necessary to continue to best serve those clients. We sheltered 80 individuals in 2025, an increase of 48% over the 54 people sheltered in 2024. Funding from United Way has decreased due to more nonprofit organizations becoming community partners and receiving a share of the funds they raise. Federal funding continues to be uncertain and has been reduced in recent years. Support from the City and County is essential not just to help us continue providing and expanding services, but it can be used to help us secure more state and federal funding through the ability to fund required match.

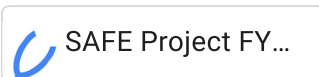

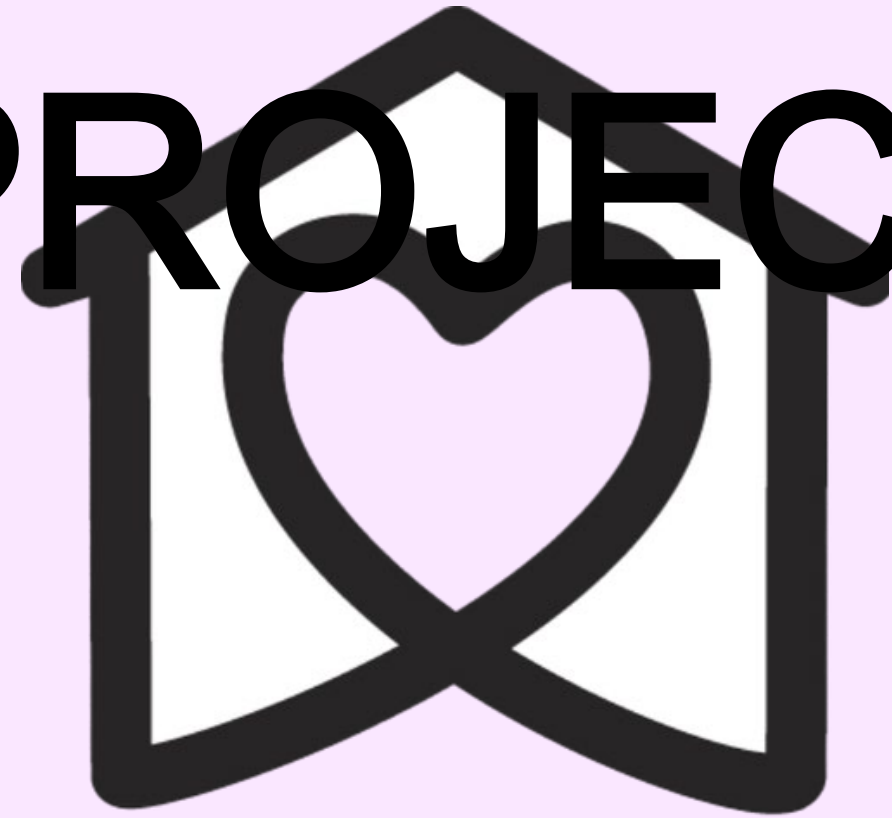
Hello, my name is Amy Haefner. I am the Executive Director at SAFE Project. For those who don't know SAFE Project is the Domestic Violence, Sexual Assault and Stalking program in Albany County. We have been fortunate to receive city and county funds over the past several years. We provide free and confidential services to survivors who are experiencing abuse. We have a 24 hour hotline, and an emergency shelter– also the only shelter in Laramie. We offer crisis counseling, safety planning, assistance with protection orders, and financial aid. We work closely with IMH and law enforcement agencies here in Albany County, and we respond when they call us for someone who is in need of an advocate. We offer support through forensic exams, interviews, and in the courtroom. At SAFE Project we have an Outreach and Prevention Program. We work with all of the youth in Albany County to teach about healthy relationships, healthy friendships, teen dating violence and many other topics. Our Outreach Program has grown and we are fortunate to have many relationships with other organizations in the community which gives survivors and SAFE all kinds of different resources. We hope to continue to achieve additional connections through outreach, informational and awareness events, social media, and presentations to increasingly diverse groups.

Our numbers continue to grow each year. In 2025 we served 312 unduplicated individuals, with 65% seeking services for domestic violence (DV), 19% for sexual assault and 16% for stalking. We also provided 3,401 bednights in our emergency shelter to 42 adults, 38 children and 16 pets.

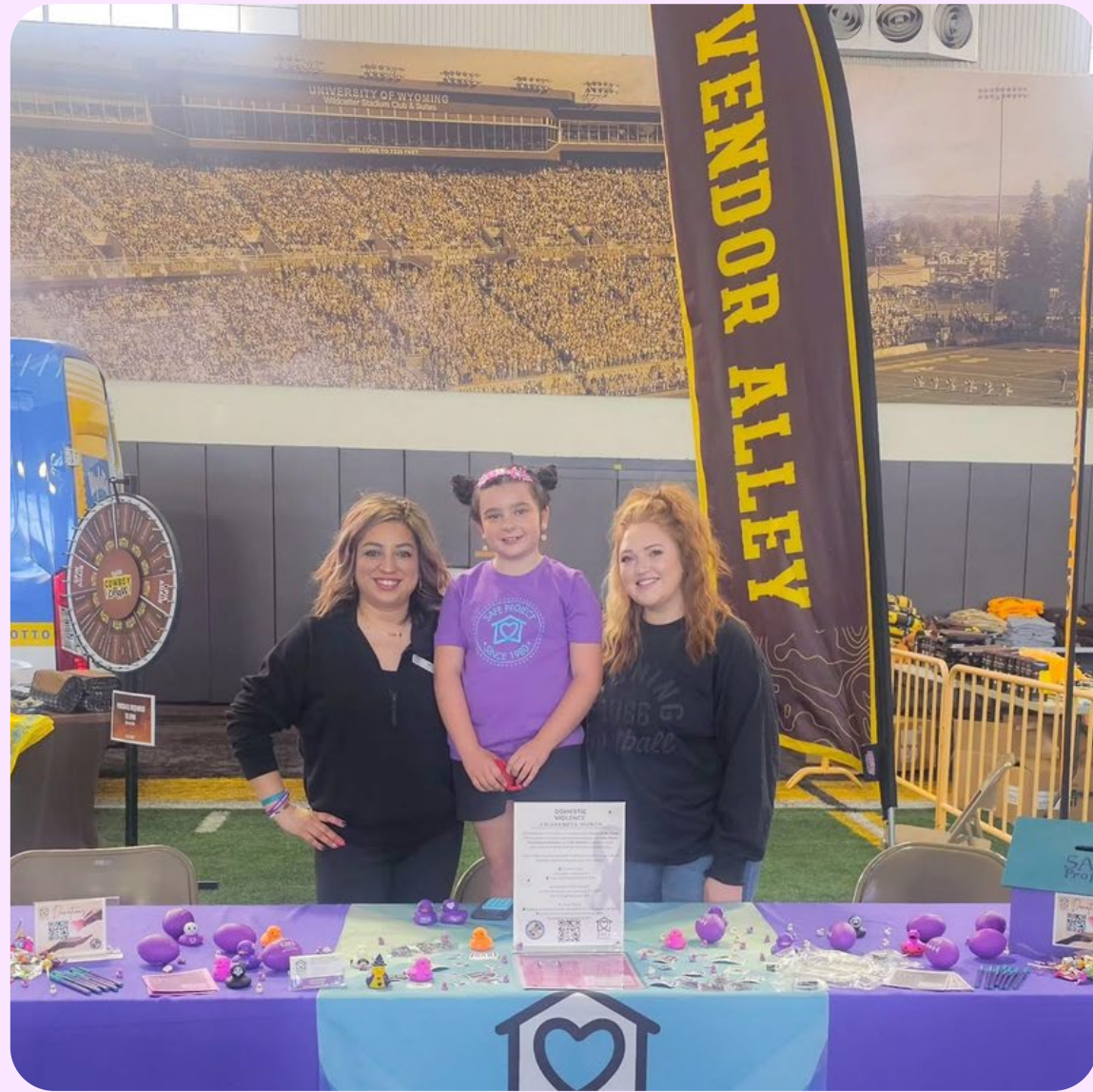
All the funding we receive will help us to continue free and confidential services to survivors in Albany County. This will help us continue to help bring them to safety and to become sustainable and independent.

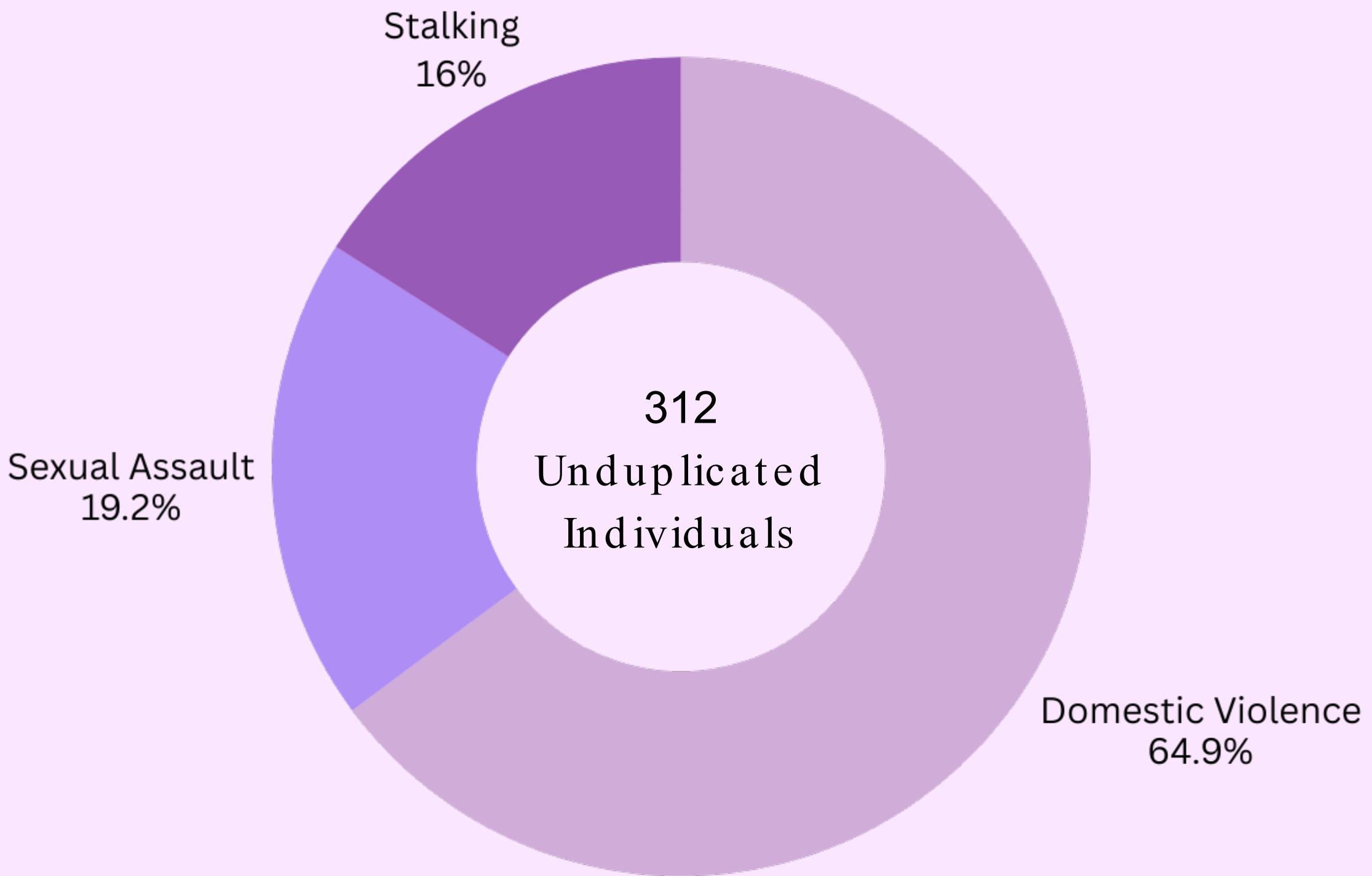

# Albany County and City of Laramie Community Partner Organization Funding Request Application FY2027

**ALL APPLICATIONS ARE DUE ON OR BEFORE 5:00 P.M. ON WEDNESDAY, MARCH 11TH 2026 AND WILL ONLY BE CONSIDERED IF ALL PREVIOUS FINAL REPORTS HAVE BEEN COMPLETED.**

The City of Laramie and Albany County provide funding to local community partner organizations through their annual budget making processes. Organizations receiving these funds do not operate within the formal structure of city or county governments but may utilize support from these governments to achieve their missions or fund special projects. Community partner organizations generally have a strong presence within the community and provide vital services, products, or activities that serve to improve the community in a variety of ways. Only non-profit/not-for-profit entities are eligible to apply for funding. For-profit entities are ineligible.

Historically, organizations requesting funding fall within the following three categories:

***Recreational/Arts and Culture:*** These organizations exist to promote, sustain, and develop recreational, cultural, and leisure activities within the community. These organizations may also sponsor educational and community events and celebrations designed to encourage a diverse cultural and active lifestyle while promoting a strong sense of community.

***Social Services:*** The primary objective of these organizations is to support or engage in activities designed to enhance the wellbeing of individuals and families within the community. These organizations provide a variety of services that focus on basic human needs, access to programs and services designed to maintain human dignity and health, and the overall welfare of citizens.

***Civic Organizations/Quasi-Governmental:*** These organizations have been established within our community to A) work for the overall improvement, advancement, and economic health through civic involvement, economic development initiatives, and fostering community spirit; or B) provide services, programs and other opportunities for the betterment of the community through the organization of Joint Powers Boards or other Quasi-Governmental Organizations that work collaboratively with the City of Laramie and/or Albany County on shared goals, concerns, and interests.

This Community Partner Funding is available from funds collected via Albany County's 5th Penny Tax and historically has funded approximately \$250,000 in County requests and \$235,000 in City requests. In their sole discretion, the City and County each reserve the right to waive any informality in any application and/or reject any application.

Organizations can submit a request to both the City and County. If an organization is awarded funding, the organization is solely responsible for its costs including, but not limited to, operations, personnel, taxes,

maintenance, and insurance coverage against public liability and property damage.

**Priority of requests is as follows:**

- Requests that improve the community.
- Requests that are not more than 20% of organization's general operating budget and do not exceed \$20,000 each from City or County.
- Requests to either City or County that are less than 20% of organization's general operating budget but in excess of \$20,000 are considered on a case by case basis and may affect the priority of the organization's request.
- Demonstration of multiple revenue sources for organization.
- The number of people served by organization.
- Clear identification of those who benefit from the organization's work.
- Demonstration of the organization's partnership with other organizations in the community.
- Requests that do not duplicate efforts already existing in the community.

For-profit entities are not eligible to apply. Only non-profit/not-for-profit entities are eligible to apply for funding.

One of the ways we work to build community is through our annual Hot Cocoa Contest, in which we invite local nonprofits to enter the contest at a reduced rate and showcase their nonprofit at their entry table. We have created an environment where community organizations can share their story with our guests as well as other organizations. We have received feedback, especially from new nonprofit organizations, that this event has spread awareness about their programs in a new way to a new audience. It is a win for everyone.

We have regular conversations with other organizations regarding services provided and how we can work together to fill the gaps. These conversations have included other related service providers, medical and mental health professionals, churches, and other nonprofits. Our staff members have worked together to collect donations for Interfaith and other local pantries, Special Olympics, United Way, and local youth sports programs as well as volunteering individually or as a group for local events. Finally, we share information on our social media sites about other nonprofit organizations' services, events, and fundraisers.

While emergency management, FEMA, emergency services, American Red Cross, and other preparedness organizations provide educational materials and training on developing emergency plans, our project makes it possible to actually sit together at the table to put all of the information into a document that can be easily and immediately implemented.

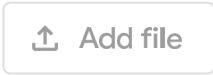

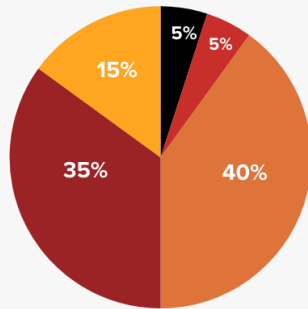

Common Outdoor Ground (COG) provides community support for the sustainability of public lands in southeast Wyoming. Funds from this grant will pay a portion of the off-season salary for our Operations Director. This key position works year-round to develop partnerships and programs so we can be "shovel ready" when our season starts each year. Thanks to sustainable and increasing funding, we have been able to expand programming into the spring and fall, developed youth programming with our incredibly successful Outdoor School, and increased the total number of volunteer hours served every year since 2020, including over 2000 hours in 2026 alone. The administrative work that this grant will help fund is difficult to fund with project-based grant sources, and that's why the support of the city and county is so vital to COG's continued growth. Last year, we were able to leverage the support we receive from community partner funds into approximately \$100,000 from other grantmakers and donors. This grant helps us demonstrate our connection to the community, making our applications to other funders much more competitive. We also receive funding from the Ellbogen Foundation (\$27,500 for Outdoor School), the Wyoming Community Foundation (\$10,000 competitive grant), the Intertie Project Fund (\$12,000 to support a recreation technician this summer), and the USFS (projected \$15,000 for a second recreation technician and management).

COG's work benefits all residents and visitors to Albany County, through our maintenance of outdoor recreation infrastructure. Outdoor recreation accounts for 4.5% of Wyoming's GDP: the third highest percentage in the nation (trailing only Montana and Hawaii). Albany County is home to several world-class recreation opportunities, including cross country skiing, snowmobiling, hiking, and wildlife viewing. Residents of Laramie and Albany County enjoy unparalleled access to these activities via public lands. COG's volunteer events focus on maintaining outdoor recreation infrastructure and supporting public land managers who are experiencing decreased budgets and staff capacity. In order to contribute to a culture of land stewardship and community building, we aim to work with 3 new volunteer groups in 2026. This will allow us to expand our base of reliable and engaged volunteers and help us connect folks who really want opportunities for land stewardship to the public lands around us. We are also expanding our conservation-based projects this year, including a new partnership with Trout Unlimited constructing beaver dam analogues. Our k-12 educational work is also actively building the public land stewards of tomorrow. Albany County Outdoor School provides a lifelong memory and a forum for kids to connect with the land that belongs to all of us together. If we foster this connection to public land at an early age, it will pay dividends for years to come. We annually donate thousands of hours of labor to public lands; last year those hours were worth over \$60,000. That kind of value is what is created when neighbors come together to take care of each other and the land that we all love.

COG is explicitly collaborative. We were founded to connect passionate public land users to the needs of Forest Service employees struggling to maintain an enormous recreation infrastructure with an ever shrinking budget. COG volunteers love the outdoors, and are driven to donate time, resources, and connections. In addition to that initial mission, we are now proud to act as connectors in our community more broadly, searching for ways to leverage existing initiatives and skill bases to achieve environmental goals in southeastern Wyoming. We are an active participant in the Southeast Wyoming Outdoor Recreation Collaborative, and we’ve worked with tons of other partners, including BikeNet, Pilot Hill, Wyoming Game and Fish, the Mule Deer Foundation, Wyoming Pathways, the Southeast Wyoming Climbers Coalition, Visit Laramie, the BLM, and more.

Our Albany County Outdoor School program is an excellent example of this philosophy. It was the perfect storm of events in the spring of 2024: we heard a desire from parents and elementary educators to re-establish a place-based outdoor learning experience into their curriculum without the logistical and financial burdens presented by past visits to the Teton Science School. At the same time, we found in our own work that it is essential to engage and teach principles of environmental stewardship at all ages in order to ensure the sustainability of public lands. We were also working with different arms of UW’s outreach efforts (including the Biodiversity Institute, the Science Initiative/ Science Roadshow, the WORTH Institute, the Wyoming Naturalists, and the Haub School), and we knew we could connect all of these partners to create something really special in our community, meeting the needs of all.

Additional Budget Narrative:

In 2025 COG exceeded income targets and simultaneously controlled costs in significant ways. Specifically, we completed several projects in the Medicine Bow Routt National Forest with funding from the National Forest Foundation. While COG had expected to complete much of this work through paid contractors (at considerable expense), we were ultimately able to recruit volunteers and use our existing staff to complete these projects. Beyond the cost savings, our volunteers completed the work in a more timely way than we could have done it with contractors while still ensuring quality workmanship and care for these recreation sites.

The strength of our volunteers, recruited, coordinated, and appreciated with our paid staff, and the windfall of funds received has allowed us to fund a reserve account and take some calculated risks in our 2026 budget. Given the uncertainty of future federal funding and economic uncertainty more broadly impacting our individual donors, we are grateful to have these financial reserves. As we navigate various transitions and stages of growth as an organization, we will continue to carefully steward our resources to ensure long-term stability and consistent program delivery.

### Additional Budget Narrative:

In 2026 COG will fund programs through a mix of donations, grant revenue, and fees for service. Specifically, we solicit public donations three times a year (spring, summer, and late fall/winter) and hope to raise \$16,500 from these efforts in 2026. Additionally, we hope to earn roughly \$15,000 through service agreements, primarily with the National Forest Foundation and the United States Forest Service. 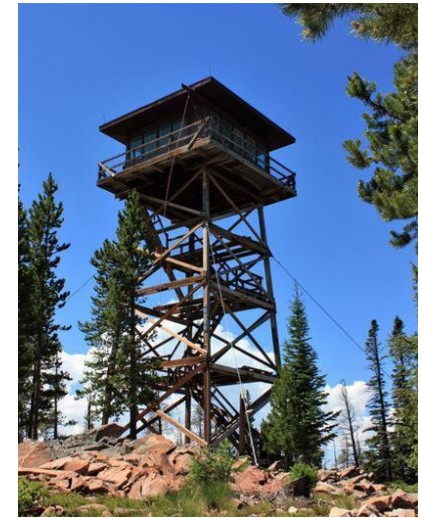

The requested funds will be used to support essential operational costs that directly enable our organization to continue providing high-quality behavioral health services to the Laramie and Albany County communities. These operational needs include maintaining adequate staffing levels for clinical, administrative, and crisis-response roles; ensuring staff have access to ongoing training and supervision; and supporting core infrastructure required to deliver safe and effective care. Funds will help cover expenses such as salary support for licensed mental health clinicians, case managers, crisis-response personnel, and support staff; facility-related costs including utilities and maintenance; technology and electronic health record systems; and supplies necessary for day-to-day service delivery. In addition to the funding requested in this application, our organization relies on a combination of state and federal grants, fee-for-service reimbursement through Medicaid and private insurance, and philanthropic contributions. As a community behavioral health provider, VOA serves individuals experiencing mental health disorders, substance use disorders, co-occurring conditions, and acute crises. Many of the people we support face multiple barriers to accessing care, including lack of insurance coverage, financial hardship, transportation challenges, or complex behavioral health needs.

The requested funds will enable us to:

- Strengthen Crisis Response and Stabilization

By maintaining adequate staffing and resources, we can continue to provide immediate, locally accessible crisis intervention services that reduce unnecessary hospitalizations, stabilize individuals more quickly, and connect them to ongoing care. Enhanced crisis capacity also reduces strain on emergency departments and law enforcement.

- Improve Care Coordination and Community Collaboration

We work closely with IMH to support effective transitions of care for individuals in crisis or at risk of hospitalization. Through this partnership, as well as collaboration with county commissioners and the county attorney, we serve as a gatekeeping entity to ensure individuals receive the most clinically appropriate level of care while reducing unnecessary inpatient admissions. This collaboration enhances continuity, improves outcomes, and streamlines community resources.

• Albany County Leadership and Justice System Partners

Our involvement with local government and justice system partners ensures that individuals encountering the legal system receive behavioral health support when appropriate. This coordinated approach reduces duplication and improves safety and wellness.

The City of Laramie and Albany County provide funding to local community partner organizations through their annual budget making processes. Organizations receiving these funds do not operate within the formal structure of city or county governments but may utilize support from these governments to achieve their missions or fund special projects. Community partner organizations generally have a strong presence within the community and provide vital services, products, or activities that serve to improve the community in a variety of ways. Only non-profit/not-for-profit entities are eligible to apply for funding. For-profit entities are ineligible.

Historically, organizations requesting funding fall within the following three categories:

***Recreational/Arts and Culture:*** These organizations exist to promote, sustain, and develop recreational, cultural, and leisure activities within the community. These organizations may also sponsor educational and community events and celebrations designed to encourage a diverse cultural and active lifestyle while promoting a strong sense of community.

***Social Services:*** The primary objective of these organizations is to support or engage in activities designed to enhance the wellbeing of individuals and families within the community. These organizations provide a variety of services that focus on basic human needs, access to programs and services designed to maintain human dignity and health, and the overall welfare of citizens.

***Civic Organizations/Quasi-Governmental:*** These organizations have been established within our community to A) work for the overall improvement, advancement, and economic health through civic involvement, economic development initiatives, and fostering community spirit; or B) provide services, programs and other opportunities for the betterment of the community through the organization of Joint Powers Boards or other Quasi-Governmental Organizations that work collaboratively with the City of Laramie and/or Albany County on shared goals, concerns, and interests.

This Community Partner Funding is available from funds collected via Albany County's 5th Penny Tax and historically has funded approximately \$250,000 in County requests and \$235,000 in City requests. In their sole discretion, the City and County each reserve the right to waive any informality in any application and/or reject any application.

Organizations can submit a request to both the City and County. If an organization is awarded funding, the organization is solely responsible for its costs including, but not limited to, operations, personnel, taxes,

maintenance, and insurance coverage against public liability and property damage.

**Priority of requests is as follows:**

- Requests that improve the community.
- Requests that are not more than 20% of organization's general operating budget and do not exceed \$20,000 each from City or County.
- Requests to either City or County that are less than 20% of organization's general operating budget but in excess of \$20,000 are considered on a case by case basis and may affect the priority of the organization's request.
- Demonstration of multiple revenue sources for organization.
- The number of people served by organization.
- Clear identification of those who benefit from the organization's work.
- Demonstration of the organization's partnership with other organizations in the community.
- Requests that do not duplicate efforts already existing in the community.

For-profit entities are not eligible to apply. Only non-profit/not-for-profit entities are eligible to apply for funding.

The Eppson Center for Seniors, Inc., respectfully requests consideration of our on-going grant request for \$20,000.00. The requested funds will be utilized to accommodate increased prices for raw food, supplies, and operational costs for the important programs we provide.

The Eppson Center has been providing services to enhance older adults' lives since 1973. We are proud to offer a place for older adults to socialize, belong, eat nutritious meals, have access to transportation, and engage in both physically and mentally challenging activities to promote overall wellness.

The City of Laramie Community Partners Funding will be divided equally to fund the following departments:

-Nutrition Program Funding – our Nutrition Program requires that we provide a daily meal that meets 1/3 RDA. We provide these meals to both patrons in our Center and on the Home Delivered Meal Program Monday through Friday, with frozen meals available on weekends, if desired.

-Activities Program Funding – our Activities Program provides daily exercise instruction, games, arts, crafts, and opportunities for education.

-Transportation Program Funding – our Transportation Program provides rides throughout Laramie Monday through Friday each week to ensure patrons can attend important medical, social, and personal appointments.

As a Wyoming Senior Center, we are recipients of Older American's Act (OAA) federal funding and Wyoming Department of Health State funding to support our mission. For FY26, we were granted \$43,153.00 for Congregate Nutrition, \$53,465.00 for Home Delivered Meals Funding, \$69,630.00 in Activities funding, \$144,352.00 WSSB Funding, \$140,609.00 WYDOT funding, \$16,279.63 United Way funding, and \$15,000 Iverson Memorial Hospital funding. We also serve Medicaid Waiver clients and anticipate about \$80,000 in FY26 for providing meals and receive funding for purchasing American produced food for about \$15,000 each year.

Describe the positive effects and benefits the requested funds would provide to the organization and the community, including goals the organization hopes to accomplish. \*

Our partnership with the City of Laramie and Albany County benefits over 1,500 patrons who utilize our services by ensuring the services they love continue to be available on a donation only basis. This funding helps to offset costs, both direct, and indirect, to support these vital programs for older adults. Our grants require matching funds, so these funds, along with program contributions and donations help us to leverage up to \$600,000 annually.

We project an increase in participation numbers for FY26 based upon the local population age growth. By 2030, every individual born within the Baby Boomer generation will have turned 65 and older, meaning one in five adults will be over the age of 65 in the US. According to July 1, 2024, Census.gov information, Albany County, Wyoming's population was 39,288 individuals and 14% (5500 individuals) were over the age of 65. This estimate is expected to grow to 20% (7,850 individuals) all of whom will be eligible to participate in our services. In FY25, we served 1521 individuals over the age of 60 in our Center or 28% of those eligible in Albany County.

We expect that with the increased number of individuals reaching age 60 and over, that our numbers will continue to increase along with those statistics. We are challenging ourselves with strategic planning and outreach to ensure we are able to extend our services to the growing numbers of older adults, and that we can meet them where they are, providing services to complement their lives.

Describe your organization's partnerships with other organizations in the community and how your organization avoids duplication of efforts while carrying out impactful work in your service area. \*

As the only Senior Center in Albany County, the services we provide are crucial to the increasing older adult population to ensure that they can live their lives independently in their own homes for as long as feasibly possible, while finding the support they need to do so successfully without isolation.

On a local level, we partner with Laramie Interfaith and Laramie Soup Kitchen's food recovery programs and utilize those donations from grocery stores to decrease food costs and increase variety for our patrons. We partner with the Hospital and local medical clinics including Premier Bone and Joint, Laramie Reproductive Health, and Albany Community Health Clinic to ensure transportation is not a barrier for individuals who need medical care.

We are a United Way Agency, and partner with 15 other agencies all who provide services to those in need in different specialties and areas in Laramie. We utilize our ability to partner with those agencies providing services to those who are living in poverty, those living alone, and those who identify as minorities to ensure that those individuals are utilizing all Laramie has to offer.

We are a member of the Wyoming Non-profit network which provides access to the annual WyoGives fundraising campaign along with many other non-profit educational resources and opportunities to ensure that we have proper policies and structure. We partner with agencies including CyberWyoming Alliance, Senior Medicare Patrol, and AARP to ensure our patrons are educated about identity theft, scams, and have education opportunities for areas relative to older adults and those targeting older adults.

Even though we work closely with other agencies that provide services, our work is targeted towards individuals, age 60+ and we combine our efforts with those agencies to ensure overall health and life satisfaction.

Laramie PrideFest is requesting Community Partner funding to support the direct costs associated with planning and producing our annual PrideFest programming, which has taken place each June since 2017 and now includes more than 15 community events across Laramie.

Requested funds would primarily support event production and infrastructure expenses required to safely host public events. These costs include venue rentals, event permits, liability insurance, sound and lighting equipment, stage and technical equipment, and other production expenses necessary for gatherings such as Pride in the Park and additional PrideFest events held throughout the city.

Funding would also support stipends for local artists, musicians, and drag performers who contribute to PrideFest programming. Laramie PrideFest prioritizes compensating queer local artists and performers whenever possible. As the community's only LGBTQ-focused nonprofit organization—and one led entirely by volunteers—PrideFest reinvests the resources it receives directly back into the local community. Supporting artists and performers strengthens Laramie's creative economy, provides opportunities for emerging talent, and fosters an arts environment that encourages young creatives to build careers and community here in Wyoming.

Importantly, nearly every PrideFest expense is paid to local businesses, venues, artists, and service providers. Infrastructure rentals, printing, supplies, and production needs are sourced from Laramie businesses whenever possible, meaning Community Partner funding circulates directly back into the local economy while creating welcoming spaces for queer residents and allies.

Additional program expenses include supplies and materials for community workshops and activities, as well as marketing and outreach costs including posters, printed materials, website hosting, digital promotion, and ticketing platform fees.

Many PrideFest events are intentionally offered free or low-cost to ensure accessibility for families, students, and community members. Community Partner funding helps offset these costs and allows PrideFest to continue offering diverse public programming.

In addition to this request, Laramie PrideFest receives support through individual donations, local sponsorships, and revenue from ticketed events, raffles, and merchandise sales. Between April and August 2025 alone, the community contributed \$23,826.62 through these sources, demonstrating strong community support.

Community Partner funding would allow Laramie PrideFest to continue providing accessible arts, cultural, and community programming that serves residents across Laramie and Albany County. As the only nonprofit in the region dedicated specifically to LGBTQ+ Pride programming, PrideFest plays an important role in creating spaces for connection, visibility, and belonging for a vibrant but historically underserved part of the community.

Since beginning in 2017 with a single event, Pride in the Park, Laramie PrideFest has grown into a multi-day celebration that now includes more than 20 events annually and welcomes over 2,000 participants each year. These events bring together residents, students, families, artists, volunteers, and local businesses through performances, workshops, outdoor activities, community discussions, and family-friendly programming.

Community feedback consistently shows that participants value PrideFest as a welcoming environment where they feel safe, respected, and included. Attendees, performers, and volunteers highlight the importance of affirming community spaces, opportunities for local artists, and events that are affordable and accessible. Feedback has also identified areas for growth, including expanding accessibility, increasing venue capacity, improving event communication, and creating more opportunities for year-round programming.

These priorities align with a growing number of requests from community members for additional events, social spaces, educational programming, mental health support, mutual aid efforts, and expanded arts programming. Demand has increased significantly following the reduction of diversity, equity, and multicultural programming at the University of Wyoming in 2024, which previously served as an important hub for community connection.

While PrideFest cannot replace those services on its own, the organization has seen a clear increase in outreach and requests for community programming. One of our core goals is to grow responsibly and sustainably so we can expand accessible events, support local artists and organizers, and respond thoughtfully to community needs.

Community Partner funding would support that work by improving accessibility, expanding event capacity, and helping PrideFest continue building programming that fosters belonging, creativity, and connection throughout Laramie.

Laramie PrideFest works in partnership with a wide range of local organizations, businesses, artists, venues, and community groups to create programming that is collaborative and distributed across Laramie rather than centered in a single location.

PrideFest events regularly take place in partnership with community spaces, faith groups, organizations, and local businesses including Cowgirl Yarn, O'Dwyer's Public House, Canterbury House, Regal Fox Theater, the Gryphon Theatre, the Ruffed Up Duck Saloon, Night Heron Books & Coffeehouse, the Laramie Railroad Depot, Washington Park, and Laramie City Hall. These partnerships allow PrideFest to host events throughout the city while supporting local venues, businesses, and community spaces.

PrideFest also collaborates with organizations such as Meadowlark Performing Arts, Wyoming Equality, the Matthew Shepard Foundation, PFLAG Laramie, SAFE Project, and the Shepard Symposium on Social Justice, along with numerous local artists, vendors, and advocacy groups. Events like Pride in the Park serve as a shared platform where nonprofits, artists, and community organizations can table, share resources, and engage directly with residents. Pride in the Park also creates opportunities for City boards, commissions, and public initiatives to connect with a broad and diverse audience of residents who may not otherwise encounter those outreach efforts.

Rather than duplicating services already offered in the community, Laramie PrideFest focuses on producing arts, cultural, and community-building events that complement the work of other organizations.

As the only nonprofit in Laramie dedicated specifically to LGBTQ+ community programming, PrideFest plays a unique role in creating visible and welcoming spaces for connection, creativity, and civic participation. In a community where the legacy of Matthew Shepard remains deeply significant, PrideFest helps ensure Laramie's story is defined not only by tragedy, but by how our community continues to build a safer, more inclusive future.

This collaborative model strengthens Laramie's broader community ecosystem by connecting organizations, artists, businesses, and civic outreach initiatives while expanding access to community programming across the city.

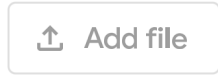
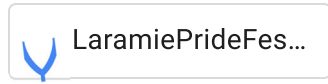

Laramie PrideFest is a volunteer-led nonprofit organization based in Laramie, Wyoming. The organization has no paid staff, and nearly all financial resources are directed toward community programming, event production, and support for local artists, performers, and small businesses. The following financial statement summarizes the organization's revenue, expenses, and financial position for the most recent fiscal year.

## Statement of Activities

**Total Revenue for FY25:** \$37,656.24

Laramie PrideFest is an all-volunteer nonprofit organization, allowing the majority of funding to be directed toward community programming and event production. PrideFest prioritizes working with local artists, venues, vendors, and service providers whenever possible so that event funding circulates directly back into the Laramie community. Many PrideFest events are intentionally offered **free or low-cost** to remain accessible to families, students, and community members. PrideFest programming annually serves more than **2,000 attendees across 20+ events**, providing opportunities for local artists, performers, small businesses, and community organizations to engage with residents and visitors. Based on projected programming costs, PrideFest operates at an estimated cost of approximately **\$11 per participant**, demonstrating efficient use of community investment while supporting Laramie’s arts, cultural, and local business ecosystem.

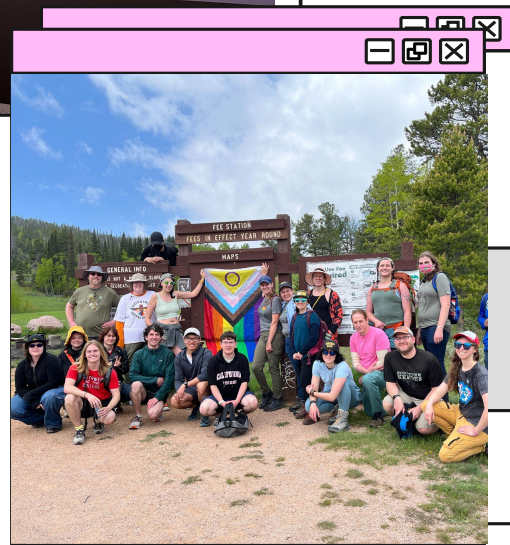

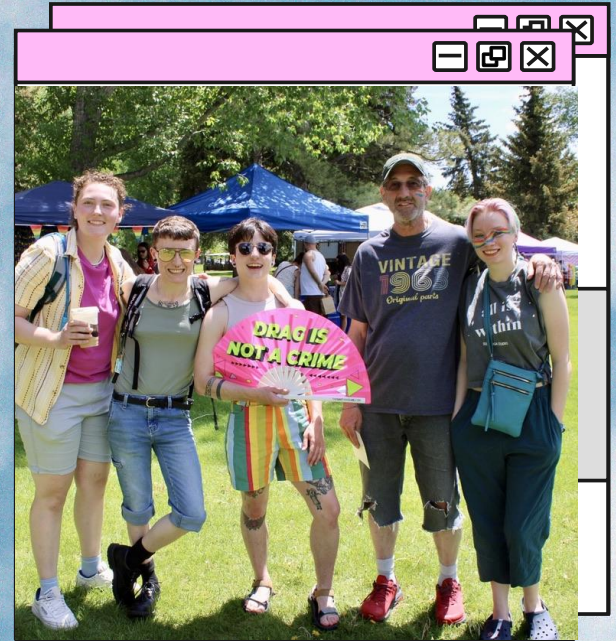

The City of Laramie and Albany County provide funding to local community partner organizations through their annual budget making processes. Organizations receiving these funds do not operate within the formal structure of city or county governments but may utilize support from these governments to achieve their missions or fund special projects. Community partner organizations generally have a strong presence within the community and provide vital services, products, or activities that serve to improve the community in a variety of ways. Only non-profit/not-for-profit entities are eligible to apply for funding. For-profit entities are ineligible.

Historically, organizations requesting funding fall within the following three categories:

***Recreational/Arts and Culture:*** These organizations exist to promote, sustain, and develop recreational, cultural, and leisure activities within the community. These organizations may also sponsor educational and community events and celebrations designed to encourage a diverse cultural and active lifestyle while promoting a strong sense of community.

***Social Services:*** The primary objective of these organizations is to support or engage in activities designed to enhance the wellbeing of individuals and families within the community. These organizations provide a variety of services that focus on basic human needs, access to programs and services designed to maintain human dignity and health, and the overall welfare of citizens.

***Civic Organizations/Quasi-Governmental:*** These organizations have been established within our community to A) work for the overall improvement, advancement, and economic health through civic involvement, economic development initiatives, and fostering community spirit; or B) provide services, programs and other opportunities for the betterment of the community through the organization of Joint Powers Boards or other Quasi-Governmental Organizations that work collaboratively with the City of Laramie and/or Albany County on shared goals, concerns, and interests.

This Community Partner Funding is available from funds collected via Albany County's 5th Penny Tax and historically has funded approximately \$250,000 in County requests and \$235,000 in City requests. In their sole discretion, the City and County each reserve the right to waive any informality in any application and/or reject any application.

Organizations can submit a request to both the City and County. If an organization is awarded funding, the organization is solely responsible for its costs including, but not limited to, operations, personnel, taxes,

maintenance, and insurance coverage against public liability and property damage.

**Priority of requests is as follows:**

- Requests that improve the community.
- Requests that are not more than 20% of organization's general operating budget and do not exceed \$20,000 each from City or County.
- Requests to either City or County that are less than 20% of organization's general operating budget but in excess of \$20,000 are considered on a case by case basis and may affect the priority of the organization's request.
- Demonstration of multiple revenue sources for organization.
- The number of people served by organization.
- Clear identification of those who benefit from the organization's work.
- Demonstration of the organization's partnership with other organizations in the community.
- Requests that do not duplicate efforts already existing in the community.

Funds help 3 Objectives: Hug-A-Tree outreach program (1st priority), search technology operational costs and ACSSAR and community medical skills. Partial/conditional funding is acceptable.

Hug-A-Tree will be taught to ~300 local students when requested by teachers. Outreach materials will be provided at local events: Freedom Has A Birthday, First Responder Youth Camp, parades and clubs. The national HaT program gives younger children skills and resources to survive until SAR finds them. ACSSAR volunteers provide instruction and demos to students; a "Hug-A-Tree Survival Kit" is given which includes printed materials, trashbag, whistle, signal mirror, flagging and glowstick. Students use this kit and their new knowledge to "be big and stay warm and dry" until found. We previously offered this program with a Community Partner grant (2019 COVID) and currently funds it from ACSSAR funds. HaT is a valuable service but self-funding decreases funds for our fundamental mission of SAR.

Objective 2 uses funds to cover 1 year of search technology. Recently, ACSSAR implemented tech to increase situational awareness of searchers and search managers to provide a better outcomes for lost subjects. We use the SARTopo app to provide realtime tracking/mapping of SAR teams, clue/POI logging, weather and other info. This helps determine likely locations of subjects, documents areas searched and how, giving an estimate of search coverage and likelihood of detection. Teams connect via cell phone and Garmin InReach. Starlink internet/WiFi was added to allow searchers to download tracks at SAR Ops and get updates of weather or external info. Managing searches with these tools has revolutionized how ACSSAR sends out teams, determines search areas and improves us finding a subject. The resource combo is unique to ACSSAR in Albany Co.

Finally, funds will be used to grow and maintain the level of medical training for ACSSAR folks by covering costs for Red Cross training. As an Authorized Training Provider with Red Cross, ACSSAR offers courses to members far cheaper than elsewhere. The more recreationists and community members with training, the better likelihood they can provide care to others in the backcountry. Funds will allow ACSSAR to offer Wilderness First Aid for 20 community members free of charge with a lottery-style signup. While other local opportunities exist for CPR, we will fill the first aid gap with this course.

Minimizing the number of individuals requiring SAR resources in Albany County through Primary Prevention is the goal of Hug-A-Tree and outreach. By offering Hug-A-Tree to students in Albany County, we hope to raise awareness of what students should do when they prepare to recreate and what to do if they get separated from their trusted adults. Hopefully, the information from this program will be remembered into adulthood and will be shared with others in/out of the student's home. General outreach and resources to the community through SAR awareness at events such as Freedom Has a Birthday, local parades, Farmer's Market, clubs and UW outreach is an opportunity to let the community know of our services, provide tips on what to do if lost and to recruit volunteer members to ensure a strong base of searchers to mobilize when needed. We hand out whistles and literature on SAR at these events with hopes that people will always remember to take a whistle and simple shelter with them when they recreate and to understand that if they are lost, members of ACSSAR will come find them.

Second, funds to cover a year's worth of operating expenses directly related to our search technologies will improve the time-to-find during searches which results in a better outcome for the subject and better utilization of personnel resources. All of the tech together improves the overall likelihood of positive outcome, provides communication in the field when radios do not function, improves situational awareness and allows other folks to support development of search strategies. The data can be analyzed by others offsite or provided to follow-on teams to ensure continuity and additional review of the operations.

The 3rd objective is to grow and maintain the number of ACSSAR members having above basic medical training (CPR/AED/FA/WFA) and grow the number of individuals who can teach these skills by certifying them as trainers. ACSSAR has a long relationship with American Red Cross to provide these types of courses as an Authorized Training Provider. We also see the need for a wilderness type first aid class in the community and would like to be able to offer this course to up to 20 community members free of charge. A typical WFA class costs \$200-400 depending on the provider. We feel this deters people from getting training that could help themselves or a member of their party or other public, thus reducing the impact to ACSSAR, ACSO and other first responders.

ACSSAR is the only non-governmental search and rescue organization in Albany county. On search incidents, we work exclusively with the Albany County Sheriff’s Office for SAR missions; the ACSO requests our services when needed for SAR operations within Albany County or through mutual-aid. While the ACSO statutorily provides SAR services in the County, ACSSAR does the bulk of the boot-on-the-ground person-intensive work allowing the ASO to concentrate on other aspects only they can do, such a law enforcement. We conduct joint training with the ACSO and neighboring SAR teams when appropriate but we rely on ACSSAR members, fundraising and leadership to direct the organization.

ACSSAR partners with the Albany County School District #1 to provide the Hug-A-Tree curriculum in classrooms. We have collaborated directly with Andrea Hayden at Spring Creek and teachers at Indian Paint Brush, Linford and others to bring the program to the students. We continue to offer this unique outreach curriculum and other SAR-focused instruction through events like First Responder’s Youth Camp and the ACSD Outdoor Survival Day. To our knowledge, we are the only local group providing SAR services and SAR outreach – how to not get lost and what to do if you are lost. There are other groups such as the [Girl] Scouts that discuss survival tactics, but this is not something we routinely do.

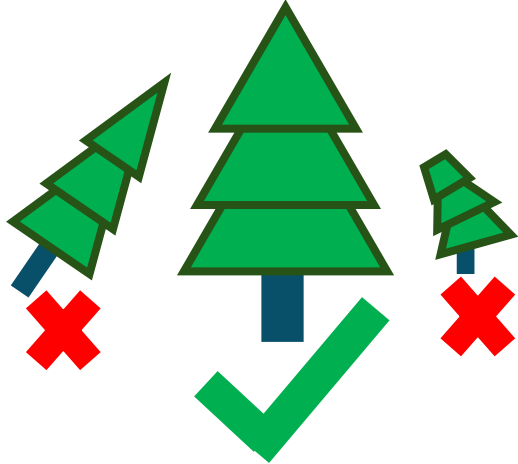

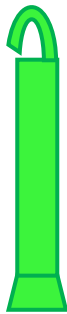

## Hug a tree

Once you think you are lost, hug a tree! One of the greatest fears a person can have is being alone. Hugging a tree or other stationary object and even talking to it can help calm you down and prevent panic. By staying in one place, you are also easier to find and won't be injured in a fall.

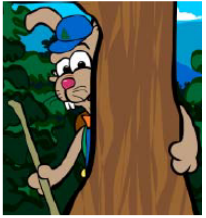
## Always carry a trash bag and whistle

Whenever you go hiking, you should always carry both a folded trash bag in your pocket and a whistle on a lanyard around your neck. By sitting down and pulling the trash bag over your entire body, after making a hole in the top front of it for your face (so you can breathe), you will stay dry and warm. The whistle can be heard from farther away than your voice, even when you are yelling very loudly, and it takes far less energy than yelling.



## Your family will not be angry with you

Sometimes children have avoided searchers because they were ashamed of getting lost, afraid of punishment, or both. Anyone can become lost, even adults; so, don't be ashamed. Just admit it, accept it and make yourself comfortable while you wait for rescuers to arrive. Your family will be so happy to see you again and to know that you are safe. So, there's no need to be frightened or worried about what your family will say. They will be proud of you for using your head—your best survival tool.



## Make yourself big

From a helicopter, people are hard to see when they are standing up, in a group of trees, or wearing dark clothing. Find your tree to hug near a small clearing (area of no trees), if possible. Wear brightly colored clothes when you go into the woods or the desert (red and orange are easy to see from far away). Lie down in your clearing when the helicopter flies over and wave your arms. If you are not too hot and you are rested, make a big X or an "SOS" using broken twigs, branches, rocks, by dragging your foot or a stick in the dirt, or by walking it out in the snow.



## Animals are afraid of humans

If you hear a noise at night, yell at it! If it is an animal, it will run away to protect itself. If it is a searcher, you will be found.

## You have hundreds of friends looking for you

If you stay in one place, finding you is much easier. This is one reason why hugging a tree is such a great idea: it keeps you in one place. Searchers will be yelling your name, but they are not angry. They are just worried about you and want to find you as quickly as possible. Don't be afraid to let them know where you are.

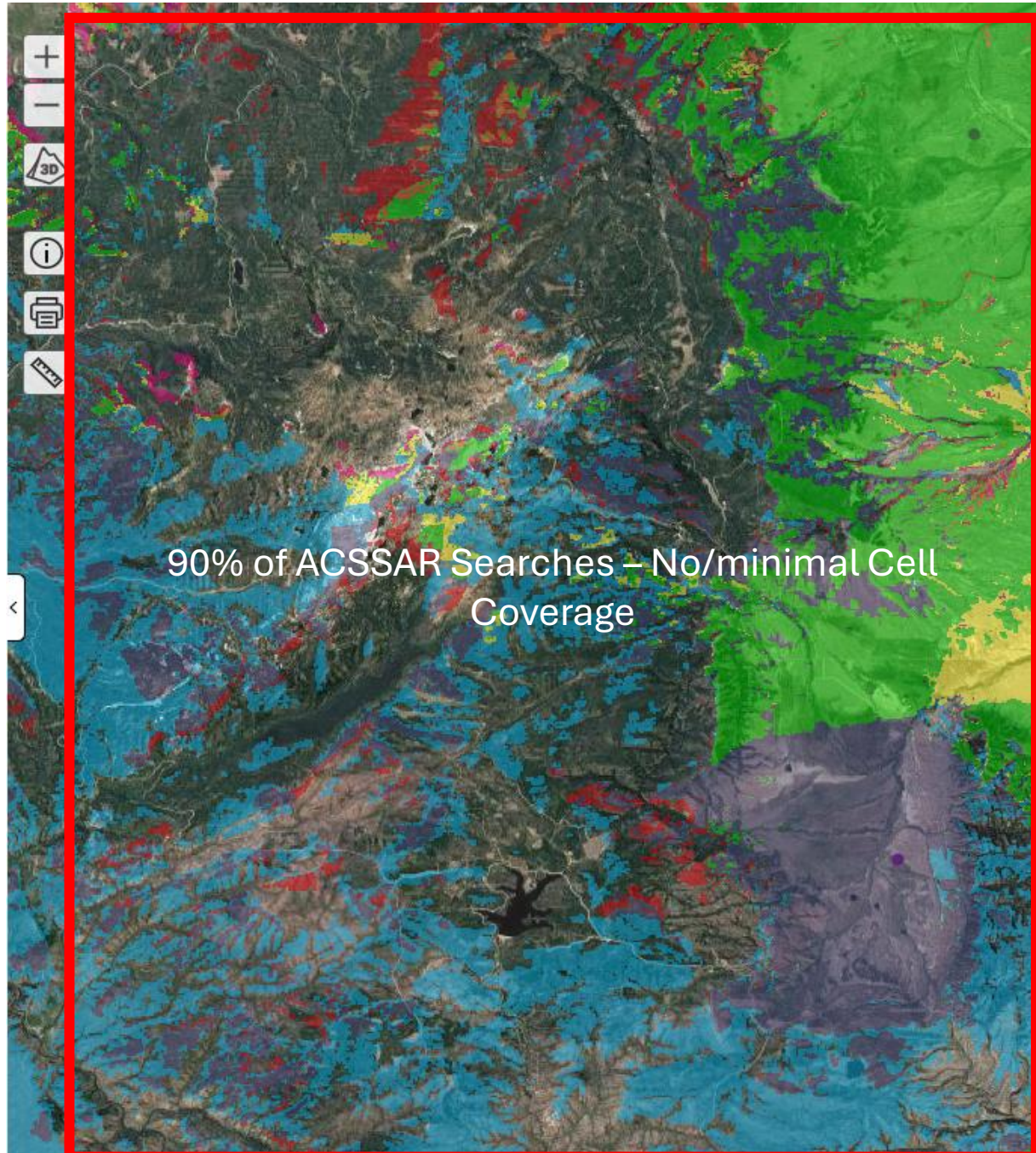

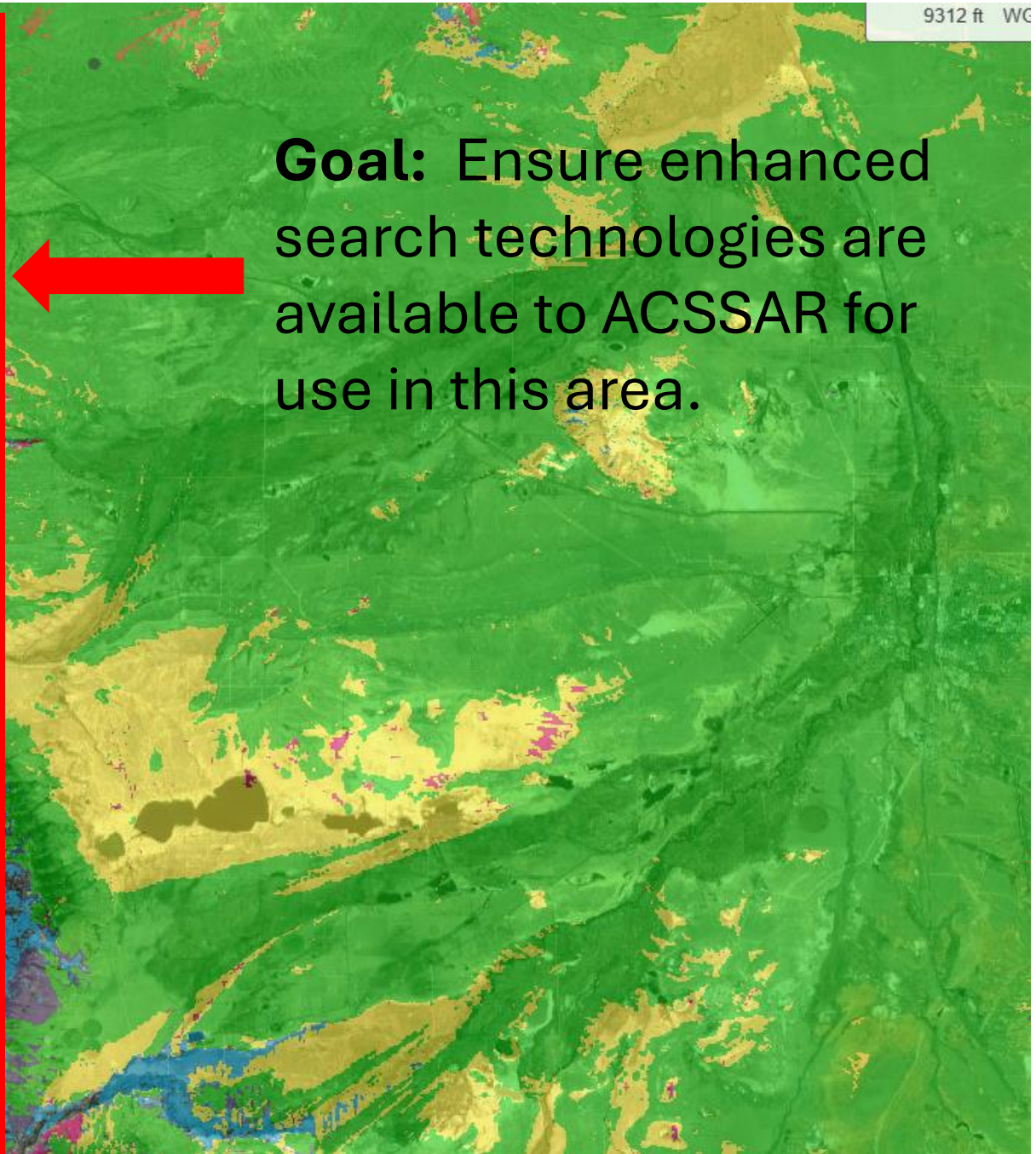

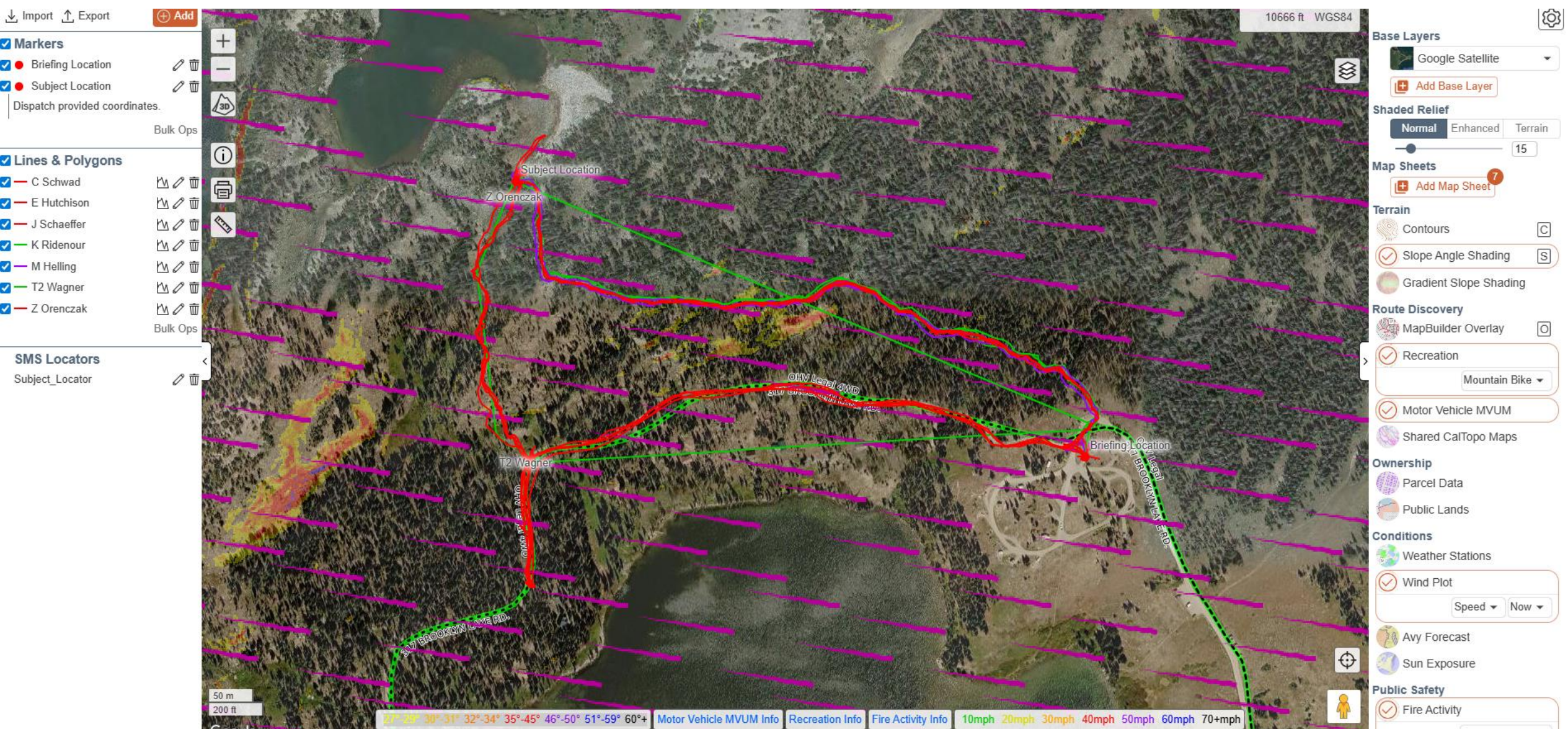

The City of Laramie and Albany County provide funding to local community partner organizations through their annual budget making processes. Organizations receiving these funds do not operate within the formal structure of city or county governments but may utilize support from these governments to achieve their missions or fund special projects. Community partner organizations generally have a strong presence within the community and provide vital services, products, or activities that serve to improve the community in a variety of ways. Only non-profit/not-for-profit entities are eligible to apply for funding. For-profit entities are ineligible.

Historically, organizations requesting funding fall within the following three categories:

***Recreational/Arts and Culture:*** These organizations exist to promote, sustain, and develop recreational, cultural, and leisure activities within the community. These organizations may also sponsor educational and community events and celebrations designed to encourage a diverse cultural and active lifestyle while promoting a strong sense of community.

***Social Services:*** The primary objective of these organizations is to support or engage in activities designed to enhance the wellbeing of individuals and families within the community. These organizations provide a variety of services that focus on basic human needs, access to programs and services designed to maintain human dignity and health, and the overall welfare of citizens.

***Civic Organizations/Quasi-Governmental:*** These organizations have been established within our community to A) work for the overall improvement, advancement, and economic health through civic involvement, economic development initiatives, and fostering community spirit; or B) provide services, programs and other opportunities for the betterment of the community through the organization of Joint Powers Boards or other Quasi-Governmental Organizations that work collaboratively with the City of Laramie and/or Albany County on shared goals, concerns, and interests.

This Community Partner Funding is available from funds collected via Albany County's 5th Penny Tax and historically has funded approximately \$250,000 in County requests and \$235,000 in City requests. In their sole discretion, the City and County each reserve the right to waive any informality in any application and/or reject any application.

Organizations can submit a request to both the City and County. If an organization is awarded funding, the organization is solely responsible for its costs including, but not limited to, operations, personnel, taxes, maintenance, and insurance coverage against public liability and property damage.

**Priority of requests is as follows:**

- Requests that improve the community.
- Requests that are not more than 20% of organization's general operating budget and do not exceed \$20,000 each from City or County.
- Requests to either City or County that are less than 20% of organization's general operating budget but in excess of \$20,000 are considered on a case by case basis and may affect the priority of the organization's request.
- Demonstration of multiple revenue sources for organization.
- The number of people served by organization.
- Clear identification of those who benefit from the organization's work.
- Demonstration of the organization's partnership with other organizations in the community.
- Requests that do not duplicate efforts already existing in the community.

ACPL will use the requested funds for Operational Costs and Direct Client Services.

For operational costs, ACPL is requesting funds for internet costs for the Laramie Branch and the ACPL Bookmobile (\$5,375), fuel costs for the library van and bookmobile (\$1,000), and subscription costs for room reservation software. Additional operation funding (excluding personnel) comes from County mill and 1% (approximately \$132k), ACPL Foundation (\$30k), and Library Revenue (15k).

For direct client services, ACPL is requesting funds to support interlibrary loan services (\$6,000) and access to e-book and e-audiobooks (\$6,000). Additional funding for direct services comes from the ACPL Foundation (\$30k) and the Friends of the ACPL (\$64k).

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Describe the positive effects and benefits the requested funds would provide to the organization and the community, including goals the organization hopes to accomplish. \*

Two pillars of the ACPL mission are building meaningful connections and enhancing community. All of the requested funds serve those two broad aims.

Internet access is key to ACPL's operations, but it is also a critical direct service. On any given day, about 100 people use the library's internet via a library computer or their own personal device. For some of those people, the library is their primary source of internet access. Internet access means connecting to friends and family, applications for essential services, job applications, and recreation, among other things.

The purchase of fuel keeps ACPL on the road and in the community. It enables ACPL to use its van and bookmobile to go out into the community to provide library services. In some cases, it allows ACPL to connect with people that otherwise would not be able to connect with the library in person. This includes delivering library materials to Laramie's care centers as well as offering tech tabling events to offer technology help to people. This also includes bringing the ACPL Bookmobile around for weekly stops at parks and participation in community events.

The annual subscription fee for room reservation software will streamline the process for Laramie residents to make use of ACPL's new community spaces. The ultimate goal of the community spaces is to provide more opportunities for residents to meet and connect.

Interlibrary Loan (ILL) services allow residents to check out items from other Wyoming libraries that are not available at ACPL because of ACPL's limited financial resources and shelving space. In 2025, ACPL patrons borrowed 1,200 items from other Wyoming libraries using ILL. This service is increasingly costly because of the continual rise in postage costs. Currently, library patrons pay \$2 for every request to supplement this cost. Without additional funding support the cost charged to patrons will need to increase substantially.

E-books and e-audiobooks provide Laramie residents with the opportunity to access educational, informational, and recreational resources from the convenience of their phone or personal device. ACPL's participation in a state-wide consortium allows patrons to access a broad range of titles purchased by libraries across the state. In FY25, ACPL patrons checked 98,500 items. Albany County are amongst the most prolific users in the state. Last year we accounted for just shy of 10% of the total checkouts.

Computer and internet access, and checkout materials are services largely unique to the public library. While community meeting spaces are not a unique service in town, they are one that continues to be in short supply.

The library stays in contact with partners throughout the community by attending a variety of nonprofit meetings and building ongoing relationships. ACPL is thoughtful in designing its programming not to overlap with free services already provided elsewhere. Frequently, our programming is based on partnerships with local organizations.

Science Loves Art continues to grow our community with outreach programs, collaborations with other nonprofit groups and providing DIY projects using nature and recycled materials. Funds from this grant will help fund community projects for all ages. Currently SLA collaborates with many Laramie and Albany County organizations to provide free or low-cost art, music and workshops to members of all ages.

SLA is providing more summer programming to our local communities and groups. We are joining in with Laramie Parks & Recreation summer programs with weekly Wild Art Camp / Create. Explore. Get Wild. — with Science Loves Art.

This summer, SLA is presenting another festival, **BumbleBrew S-L-O-W Festival**. Instead of experiencing these creative experiences in one day at a live festival as in previous years, this summer we are expanding these activities throughout the summer. Creative hosts will submit their ideas, organize their experience at 4<sup>th</sup> Street Studios & Greenhouse and receive a financial stipend. SLA will continue our support to our community, artists, gardeners, musicians and more creative experiences with this big summer project and finish the summer with an evening event to showcase the art, music and creative summer our community has shared. SLA and collaborators will offer visual art, literary art, gardening, cooking, fermenting, music, dance and more throughout the summer.

We continue to provide SLA Kits that are used by local businesses, groups, schools and nonprofits. The Kits are very helpful and allows us to reach more in our community and those that don't have the time or availability for scheduled art time.

SLA purchases equipment, tools, art supplies and designs unique art projects and programs that use eco safe products, nature inspired activities and upcycled or recycled materials. SLA uses funds from grants, sponsors, retail sales of art kits to fund these projects. Using volunteers and in-kind contributions helps SLA focus financial resources on our mission.

Science Loves Art is a grass roots local nonprofit that was created by artist Rene Williams, a UW BFA graduate. She noticed services lacking for those that have financial means for art workshops and the lack of quality art supplies and organized art projects for all ages in Laramie. Because of her own inspiration of nature and science for her work, she began coordinating community art events that brought scientists, artists and the community together. A grant from the National Science Foundation and the University of Wyoming in 2018 provided funds for the Science Loves Art to become an official nonprofit and grow the mission to bring art, nature and science to our community.

Because SLA is based in Laramie (4th Street Studios is our home base where we design, create, assemble, store and gather) we can create even more opportunities for our city and county with in-person projects. In April of 2025, our festival merged Fermentation Festival and Pollinator Festival into the BumbleBrew Fest. Over 30 local artists and musicians received financial funds for their contribution to the festival and over 350 individuals attended the afternoon festival.

SLA provides art experiences to individuals, nonprofits and businesses people in our community and we believe that what we do and how we do it is unique and fills a void. Although there are art groups that provide some services for fees, SLA focuses on collaborating with nonprofits to bring these "experiences " for free or a low cost. We help nonprofits with programs, fundraising and discovering art and science through these experiences.

Our mission supports the concept

that art and nature experiences have huge impacts on our community health, satisfaction of life and the mental health of those young and old. Research supports the importance of using our brain creatively and our SLA approach invites participants to enjoy a "no pressure" and "unintentional" art with projects that are exploring such as eco-dying, creating inks from plants, simple gardening, abstract and simple but powerful projects like Suminagashi Marbling, Paper Making, and simply painting terra cotta pots and planting a plant with friends. As a community, we need to recognize that these benefits should be valued, because based on the number of people in our community that would like these projects and ask for more indicates we are providing a valuable service.

Every year, SLA impacts over 3,000 individuals between the ages of 9-96. Our in-person activities touch local lives and the growth of SLA Kits that are shipped worldwide help match our grant funding and also introduce Wyoming and Laramie to the world through art and experiences. Shipped kits and social media/video are all part of our outreach but our focus is our local community.

Science Loves Art has established a community of like-minded collaborators and nonprofits and businesses. SLA has consistently provided services, art projects and outreach along with providing fundraising activities for nonprofits using our own art supplies, program design, artists and projects. Some examples include Big Brothers Big Sisters, Albany County Public Library, Laramie Parks & Recreation, Family Promise, Laramie Youth Crisis Center, United Way, Laramie Public Art, Epson Center, UW science outreach and many more. SLA also provides free art projects to schools in Laramie and outside Laramie to small county schools. We travel to bring art to the locations to facilitate outreach and organize art projects and supplies for these groups.

More groups are asking SLA to provide experiences for their business or their nonprofit events. We create custom projects that benefit these nonprofits and we do this for little financial gain. SLA's impact on our community is felt in low income groups, senior citizens and children communities.

There is not another nonprofit group or business in our local area that provides these creative services free or at our cost. We have social media followers and believe this form of communication is valuable and connects us to each other in ways that are personal and illustrates our goals, impact and ideas.

We look forward to creating something this year through our BumbleBrew S-L-O-W Festival that has never been offered before and will have big impact on our community.

Parents are looking for fun and creative ways to keep their families busy while keeping their children challenged and entertained with fun projects. SLA will do that all summer long with the live programs designed for the BumbleBrew Fest and ALSO the companion videos that will be shared to inspire and demonstrate some fun creative projects for all ages. Using nature and found objects, dance, or other "free" resources we all have available, we can enrich many lives by thinking outside the box with our programs and being thoughtful and resourceful with our financial funds.

***Civic Organizations/Quasi-Governmental:*** These organizations have been established within our community to A) work for the overall improvement, advancement, and economic health through civic involvement, economic development initiatives, and fostering community spirit; or B) provide services, programs and other opportunities for the betterment of the community through the organization of Joint Powers Boards or other Quasi-Governmental Organizations that work collaboratively with the City of Laramie and/or Albany County on shared goals, concerns, and interests.

- The number of people served by organization.
- Clear identification of those who benefit from the organization's work.
- Demonstration of the organization's partnership with other organizations in the community.
- Requests that do not duplicate efforts already existing in the community.

For-profit entities are not eligible to apply. Only non-profit/not-for-profit entities are eligible to apply for funding.
