TOPIC: Possible Changes to 15th Street Adjacent to the University of Wyoming Campus

BACKGROUND: During the 2017 legislative session, footnote 12 in the University’s 067 budget requires UW to request a meeting with the City of Laramie, “to address the need for vacating Fifteenth Street between East Willett Drive and East Iverson Street to unify the campus and protect pedestrian traffic.” UW shall report to the Joint Appropriations Committee not later than November 1, 2017, “regarding the findings, costs and impacts, including possible mitigation actions.”

No decisions are required to be made by November. There is much more information to be gathered and further study needs to occur. There will be additional opportunities to provide input to the City and UW concerning this topic in the future. SPEAKING TIPS:

Free expression of all points of view is an important democratic value in Laramie.

To allow all persons to speak who may wish to do so, speakers may be asked to limit their time at the podium.

An effective approach is to lead with your key point or concern and then explain the reasons underlying it.

If others have already expressed your views, you may simply indicate that you agree with the previous speaker. If appropriate, a spokesperson may present the views of a group.

To encourage and respect expression of all views and speakers, meeting rules prohibit clapping, booing, or shouts of approval or disagreement from the audience.
